

ADD SEVENTH TO PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING STAFF

Mrs. Ruth Horn Appointed
By Jackson County—Seal
Sale Figures Given.

Appointment of another public health nurse to the Jackson county staff, bringing the total to seven, was reported to the executive board of the Jackson County Public Health association Wednesday in a meeting at the home of the president, Mrs. Elwood Hedberg. She is Mrs. Ruth Horn, graduate of the University of California, who comes highly recommended in the fields of both public health nursing and maternity work.

"Jackson county is very fortunate in obtaining the services of so well trained a nurse at this time," Mrs. J. C. S. Wells, former president, told the board, "and is quite the envy of the state. There is a definite shortage of public health nurses in Oregon." Jackson county's good luck is the result of establishment here of Camp White, Mrs. Horn's husband is stationed at the camp.

Report of the annual Christmas Seal Sale was given the board by Mrs. Leonard Mayfield, county chairman. She stated that the association now has collected \$1982 and has not received returns from Ashland and some rural districts. The county must obtain over \$2500 to retain 75 per cent of the money for work here. Mrs. John S. Day, Medford chairman, reported that approximately 300 follow-up notices have been mailed those persons who have failed to respond to the drive and that early replies are anticipated.

Mrs. Mayfield gave special recognition to the Medford Junior high school for the sale of \$29.89 worth of stamps. The total set an all-time record for this particular school.

Luncheon was enjoyed by the board members while Mrs. Hedberg presided at the meeting, rushing the business session through in true war-time fashion to enable several members to return to work on schedule.

Employment Service Ordered to Observe 48-Hour Week Here

The Medford office of the United States Employment Service is now operating on a 48-hour week, according to an announcement today by Lewis Ulrich, manager. The office assumed the increased working week on December 28, Mr. Ulrich states. The employment office, located in the Holland Hotel building, is now open six days a week from 8 a. m. until 5 p. m., including the noon hour, Mr. Ulrich said.

This is the fourth set of local offices to go on the 48-hour week in the last two weeks, the others being the Rogue River National Forest, the Crater Lake National Park service and the O. & C. Administration.

Worst Mill Idle Account Fuel Lack

Boston, Jan. 7—(U.P.)—A Rhode Island worsted mill devoted entirely to war production closed today because of lack of fuel.

Officials of the Harrisville (R. I.) mill, headquarters of the huge Stillwater Worsted Co., said an oil shipment was expected "momentarily" but that it would not be enough to keep the 600 workers busy for more than a few hours and that the plant would have to close again.

ROOSEVELT TELLS CONGRESS VICTORY MAY COME IN '44

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serving in the armed forces overseas now total approximately 1,500,000, out of 7,000,000 in service.

Turning to the American productive effort in 1942, the president said the results justified the confidence in the ability of the American people to establish new records.

Explaining the goals he originally set for 1942 were altered—some upward, others downward—he cited these 1942 figures:

"About 48,000 military planes during the year—more than the airplane production of Germany, Italy and Japan put together."
56,000 combat vehicles, including tanks and self-propelled artillery.

670,000 machine guns and 21,000 anti-tank guns.
10,250,000 rounds of small ammunition and 181,000,000 rounds of artillery ammunition.

Critics Disproved
"He cited the production record as disproving certain misconceptions—'especially the one that holds that the various blocs or groups within a free country cannot forego their political and economic differences in time of crisis and work together toward a common goal.'"

Emphasizing the need for a proper "sense of proportion" in viewing the war and its needs, Mr. Roosevelt said, "we should never forget the things we are fighting for."

"But," he added, "at this critical period of the war, we should confine ourselves to the larger objectives and not get bogged down in argument over methods and details."

From the days of the first world war to the beginning of the present war, he said, "we were not living under a decent or a durable peace."

Things must be different this time, he said. The men of the armed forces "want a lasting peace, and, equally, they want permanent employment for themselves, their families and their neighbors when they are mustered out at the end of the war," he added.

Willing to Risk
"They expect the opportunity to work, to run their farms, their stores, to earn decent wages," he said. "They are eager to face the risks inherent in our system of free enterprise."

Mr. Roosevelt said he hoped the problem of granting "the right of employment and the right of assurance against life's hazards" would not be regarded "as an issue but rather as a task" for all to approach "sympathetically" and achieve "with fairness to all and with justice to none."

The president said that "this great government can and must provide" assurance desired by our young men and women "against the evils of all major economic hazards—assurance that will extend from the cradle to the grave."

Without going into any details the president said that "this great government can and must provide this assurance," in addition to making certain that the people of the country are given a stable opportunity for employment and not bogus prosperity or a dole.

Mr. Roosevelt did not, however, present the detailed and expanded social security program which some observers had expected.

Farmers Urged to Seek Adjustments

Washington, Jan. 7—(U.P.)—The Office of Defense Transportation today urged farmers and other truck operators to lose no time in approaching their county farm transportation committees or ODT field representatives if their fuel and mileage allotments require adjustment.

The present procedure, under which temporary transportation permits may be issued by local war price and rationing boards without specific authorization from ODT, expires Jan. 15.
