

CAPITAL OFFERS OPPORTUNITY TO YOUNG, IS VIEW

Woman Gives Advice on Seeking Word in Washington—Too Low Salaries Deplored.

Washington (U.P.)—Miss Augusta F. Johnston, who recently retired after working 42 years for the government, thinks the government offers a great deal of opportunity for young people. "But," she added, "I seriously question the advisability of girls coming here to work for \$1,440 a year. A few come at \$1,260, and it is too bad. Cost of living, food, and rent are too high. Small salaries don't go very far."

For the girl seeking a career in the government, Miss Johnston, who was personnel director for the Public Roads Administration from 1918, laid down these rules:

Do an A-1 job. Take responsibility for the work you do.

Go to church to make your friends.

Be neat. No dirty fingernails or twisted stocking seams.

Put up a good personal appearance.

If a government girl follows these simple rules, Miss Johnston said she is pretty certain to win promotions.

Started in 1900

Miss Johnston started out in a government job in Washington July 17, 1900, with Dr. Elwood Mead, director of the Irrigation and Drainage Section under the Department of Agriculture. She was classed as a chief clerk. She had come to Washington from her home in Cheyenne, Wyo., and in 1907 she returned to Cheyenne with the Department of Underground Water Supplies.

In 1914 she returned to Washington, with Public Roads Administration, and was promoted to personnel director four years later. She set up one of the best personnel branches in the government, without previous experience in personnel training. Since then she has trained scores of chief clerks in the 14 PRA district offices from Albany to Seattle.

"Morale of government workers will always be high if their supervisors study the individual first, then assign them work they will be responsible for. They want to feel the work they do is important."

Britain Has New Wooden Bomber



Pictured here is the "Mosquito," Britain's new twin-engine reconnaissance bomber. Developed by the De Havilland design office staff, it is of simple wood construction and lends itself to widely dispersed manufacture. In the "light little isle" that is Britain's homeland and production base, airplane factories are many and small, so that even the best-directed air raid will not cripple output.

ASSAULTS WAR SONGS

Los Angeles, Cal. (U.P.)—The failure of the present war to inspire any "good" war songs is attributed by Dr. Walter H. Rubsamen, professor of music at the University of California, to the fact that the American mu-

NEW RULES FOR SOLDIERS' MAIL

Washington, Jan. 7—(U.P.)—The large volume of mail and packages sent to troops overseas will make new army postal restrictions necessary, Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson announced today.

Effective Jan. 15, no package may be sent to a soldier overseas unless it contains an article requested by the soldier, and the request has been approved by his commander. The package will not be accepted by the post-office unless the written request bearing the commander's approval is presented, Stimson said.

The only exception will be in the case of soldiers sent abroad while packages addressed to them were in transit. Magazines and newspapers may be mailed only by the publishers.

V-mail will continue to be welcomed, Stimson continued, but ordinary letters bearing air mail stamps will be handled like regular mail.

Goebbels Threatens New War Horrors

London, Jan. 7—(U.P.)—Paul Joseph Goebbels, German propaganda minister, today threatened new horrors against the Allies "if necessity compels," but admitted the Nazis had no idea how long the war would last.

China News paper Chides America For Soft Policy

Chungking, Jan. 7—(U.P.)—To-Kung-Pao, Chinese newspaper, in an editorial today concerning the American white paper, pointed out that China was the first of the big United Nations to enter the war while the United States was the last.

The editorial said the American Pacific policy failed because America had been too soft.

"America protested not because China was attacked but because American interests suffered," it said. "America gave us sympathy but at same time gave the Japanese materials for killing us."

"When America became finally angry, it was not because of China, but because there were too many Japanese troops in Indo-China."

BOEING LAUDED

Seattle, Jan. 7—(U.P.)—Army air force procurement officers today lauded the Boeing Aircraft company for its "most heartening and encouraging achievement" in boosting production of Flying Fortress last month to approximately four times the rate at the time of the Pearl Harbor attack.

London, Jan. 7—(U.P.)—An axis ship shot down an axis bomber, but allied sailors were behind the guns. An ancient rust-heap was captured in north Africa and a prize crew was sailing it to Great Britain when the enemy plane attacked.
