More Substitutes Listed for Wheat

In addition to the eight designated war crops—potatoes, dry beans, dry edible peas, canning peas, tomatoes for processing, flax for seed or fiber and vetch for seed—the following crops may be substituted for wheat to meet 90 per cent of allotment requirements of the 1943 AAA program: Legume hay, oats and vetch or oats and peas for hay, permanent pastures, Austrian peas and barley for grain. To qualify as substitute crops, seedlings of Austrian peas, hay, barley, or permanent pastures must be above normal plantings.

Victory Tax Affects Farmers and Help

Farm operators will pay the new five per cent victory tax on their net incomes, not gross incomes. The farmer is not responsible for payment of victory tax by his hired hands. Farm workers must make their own arrangements for deducting tax from annual salary in excess of \$624.

Farm Mobilization Day To Be Observed Jan. 12

Farm and civic leaders throughout the state have been invited by R. B. Taylor, chairman of Oregon's USDA war board, to help bring about wide observance of farm mobilization

day, Tuesday, Jan. 12. This is the day proclaimed by President Roosevelt and state governors to mark the beginning of a nationwide drive to enlist every individual farmer in the 1943 food production program.

Highlights of the day will be a national broadcast over all four networks, starting at 1 o'clock Pacific war time and featuring internationally known leaders of the United Nations. Special Oregon programs will also be carried by radio stations in this state.

Farm Labor May Get Discharge from Army

Measures regarding discharge of over 38-year-old soldiers from the army requires employers and soldiers themselves to initiate action to obtain honorable discharge to return to essential jobs in war industries, including agriculture, according to a statement issued by the office of war information.

The army regulations, announced in a war department circular, after the president, on December 5, stopped induction of men of 38 or over, specified that "certain enlisted men now in the army who by reason of age (38 years and over) are unable to satisfactorily perform military service but who are qualified to assist the national war effort, may be honorably discharged from the army in accordance with the following

provisions: a. The soldier has voluntarily requested discharge in writing to his immediate commanding officer. b. The soldier is handicapped by advanced age, 38 years and over, to such an extent that his usefulness to the army is secondary to that of industry. c. The soldier has presented satisfactory evidence that he will be employed in an essential war industry, including agriculture, if he is discharged from the army. In cases where a farmer may wish a soldier now in the army to take such action, he should furnish the soldier with a letter setting forth the importance of the soldier's service in agricultural production and indicating clearly that the soldier will be re-employed in agriculture.

John Niedermeyer Heads AAA Program

John Niedermeyer, of Medford, was last week elected chairman of the committee to handle the 1943 AAA program in Jackson county. Mr. Niedermeyer succeeds Fred E. Homes, of Ashland, who had been chairman for the past seven years. The change was made necessary by Mr. Homes' appointment as pro tem successor to Frank Van Dyke, Jackson county representative in the legislature.

Other appointments include George E. Dunn, of the Belview area, as the representative

of this area on the county Three-A committee; Frances Russell to represent the Table Rock area. John Bonherr, of Central Point, was elected first alternate and E. E. Abbott, of Sams Valley, as second alternate. R. C. Fowler was elected secretary and Gladys York as treasurer.

This committee handles the USDA, the farm machinery rationing and truck transport problems, also the farm production program, an important task with the demands for farm production in 1943 to exceed the large production of 1942.

The first task will be a survey of all farms in the county, to be made in January, so as to get a complete list of machinery and to determine the quotas for the various farms in the production of various foods.

DEATH COMES TO FAMED DR. CRILE, ADRENALIN FINDER

Cleveland, Jan. 7.—(U.P.)—Dr. George W. Crile, 78, internationally famous physician and surgeon, died here today of heart ailment—a disease for which he believed he had discovered the cause but not the cure.

He had been confined to the hospital at Cleveland Clinic, of which he was a co-founder, since Dec. 14.

His accomplishments in 50 years of research had brought wide acclaim. He was the discoverer of adrenalin, the conqueror of operative shock, the first to operate locally for goitre and the first to attempt blood transfusions.

However, it was his long research into man's intelligence, personality, and energy which climaxed his career. After thousands of miles of travel and the examination of thousands of animals, he evolved the theory that, in all but man and the higher apes, the size of the brain was related directly to the body's metabolism, or its burning of food as fuel.

In civilized man, he concluded, the "thinking brain" is 780 per cent greater than necessary to execute basic metabolism and the excessive demands by the human brain upon the energy organs of the body may be responsible for such "energy diseases" as heart trouble, goitre, and mental ills.

FIND BUZZ WAGNER DEAD IN WRECKAGE

Eglin Field, Fla., Jan. 7.—(U.P.)—Lieut. Col. Boyd D. (Buzz) Wagner, 26, one of the nation's greatest flying aces, was killed on Nov. 30, when his plane crashed in a pasture, 25 miles north of Eglin Field.

Brig. Gen. Grandison Gardner, commanding Eglin Field, announced last night that his body had been found. It was crushed inside the wreckage of the P-40 plane he had been flying from Eglin Field to Maxwell Field, Ala.

Evidently he crashed from a steep spin, Gardner said. His plane was wrecked and partly buried.

Army fliers had searched for him since Dec. 2, the day it was announced he was missing.

Wagner's accomplishments were almost legendary. He fought in the Philippines, New Guinea and Australia, and then was ordered to the United States. There was no official record of the Japanese planes he destroyed, but estimates ranged from 15 to 50.

RAILROAD ACCIDENTS SHOW HEAVY INCREASE

Washington, Jan. 7.—(U.P.)—Railroad accidents during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1942, increased 45 per cent and the number of persons killed in accidents increased 126 per cent over the previous year, the Interstate Commerce Commission said today in its annual report to congress.

The report said domestic transportation agencies have met wartime demands, but noted that "war conditions require greatly increased effort and additional facilities to prevent accidents."
