

DAKAR DEAD PORT SINCE OUTBREAK OF WORLD WAR II

Food, Oil, Ammunition, Materials Lacking for Reconditioning of Shipping

Allied Headquarters, North Africa, Jan. 12.—Two years of neglect have left the strategic West African port of Dakar without food, oil, ammunition or materials for reconditioning a vast amount of shipping in the harbor, Vice Admiral William A. Glassford, Jr., head of the American military mission to Dakar, revealed today.

Glassford, who described the port as an army, navy and air base of the "greatest potentialities," conferred at headquarters with Lieut. Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, Robert D. Murphy, U. S. minister to French Africa, and other American and French political and economic leaders, on measures to rehabilitate Dakar.

Nazi Use Denied
He said reports that German vessels had used Dakar while it was under Vichy French rule were untrue.

"Dakar never has been used at any time by German shipping, especially submarines," he declared. "No ship has entered the harbor for two years—definitely no."

Glassford disclosed that the 35,000-ton battleship Richelieu is moored in the harbor as a shore battery, but can be made serviceable as a battleship with only a few repairs. He said it had suffered a torpedo hit and a direct shell hit in two engagements with the British in 1940.

She is now without a turret and a propeller, but is being refitted. She is able to make a speed of 23 knots on only three propellers, he reported.

Many Warships
Other warships in the harbor are three six-inch cruisers of almost 10,000 tons, two heavy destroyers, 10 submarines, scores of smaller escort vessels and a large number of merchant ships. All are suffering from lack of upkeep but are serviceable with some repairs, he said.

The repairs are immediately impossible because of lack of materials and shipping space to take them to Dakar.

He said he was unable to estimate when Dakar would be fully rehabilitated "because so many factors are involved, including the shipping shortage, although we are trying our utmost to bring in supplies of food as fast as possible."

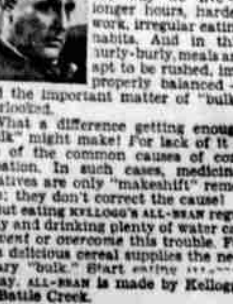

FOR YOUR DAILY QUOTA OF VITAMIN A

... Look to your dairy products, eggs, sundry meats such as liver, heart and kidney, oily fish, leafy green and yellow vegetables. If one "A" food is not available, then turn to another.

GET YOUR VITAMIN B

... From whole grain cereals, enriched flour and bread, milk, eggs, liver, kidney, fruits, and vegetables.

YOU'LL FIND VITAMIN C

... In oranges, lemons, grapefruit, tomatoes and berries. Leafy uncooked vegetables, especially cabbage, can be called upon for "C."

MINERALS ARE SO NECESSARY

Calcium—Of course dairy products, especially milk and cheese, are the best source, but the pinch hitters are molasses, carrots, cabbage, broccoli, and dried figs.

Iron—Liver, heart and kidney are about the best sources of this all important mineral. But too, there's whole grain cereals, enriched flour and breads, lean meats, egg yolks and leafy green vegetables.

PROTEIN AND ENERGY FOODS

Proteins—These are the sustaining foods around which our menus are usually built. Meat, of course, is most universally favored. But when the family quota is exhausted, then think of the menu in terms of cheese, eggs, dried beans, and nuts.
