New York, Jan. 12—(UP)—Stocks slipped irregularly lower after early steadiness today.

The list opened steady to firm but turned down from early highs when follow-through support lagged. Less aggressive bidding interest was attributed to centering of attention on President Roosevelt's budget message recommendation that Congress enact legislation to increase tax collections an additional \$16,000,000,000.

PLAN NO INQUEST IN CONLEY DEATH

No inquest will be conducted in the accidental death of Fred W. Conley, Prospect logger killed while working in the woods near that town yesterday morning. This statement was made today by Carlos Morris, deputy coroner who investigated the accident. Mr. Morris said that he was of the opinion the affair was "purely a freak accident" and that the two workmen, P. F. Planer and "Shorty" Woods, indirectly responsible were in no way to blame.

The two men felled a tree which struck a second in falling. The second tree snapped off at the base and fell directly onto Conley, operating a caterpillar tractor about 80 feet away.

Funeral arrangements have not yet been completed.
