

CHILDREN'S ILLS IN SHARP ADVANCE DURING PAST WEEK

Western Oregon Leads State
Areas in Report by State
Board of Health Secretary

Infectious children's diseases and certain other types of communicable diseases increased sharply in western Oregon during the week ending January 10, according to the last report of Frederick D. Stricker, secretary of the Oregon State Board of Health and state health officer.

"The common infectious diseases of children, whooping cough excepted, made spectacular gains throughout western Oregon last week," the report states. "Measles rose to 412, as against 296 for the previous week, but the total was still well under the figures rung up during several successive weeks in the spring of 1940."

Mumps Record
"Mumps rose sharply to 139 cases from the previous week's 63, the new figure being the highest recorded in a single week since last April. Chicken pox rose to 74 from 46 cases, but this figure was only slightly above that recorded for the corresponding week last year and was still somewhat below the median for the five-year period. There were two fewer reported new cases of whooping cough during the week, the total of five being greatly below 1942's 35 cases."

"Epidemic areas are still apparently confined to the counties west of the mountains, but more counties are reporting unusual numbers of cases. Veneral disease totals rose sharply during the week, with a total of 67 cases. The week before, 56 new cases were reported."

Jackson county reported one new case of scarlet fever, four new cases of measles, three of influenza, two of pneumonia, one new case of chicken pox, nine cases of mumps, seven cases of meningococcal meningitis, seven cases of gonorrhea and one of erysipelas.

SMALL BUSINESS DISTRESS SEEN

San Francisco, Jan. 14.—(U.P.)—Many small business firms on the Pacific coast are "in distress" now, and indications are that conditions may be worse, a department of commerce survey showed today.

Raymond Reeves, business consultant for the commerce department, said "already many small business firms are in distress and there is every reason to anticipate this distress will grow, especially among smaller firms."

Mortality is high among hardware, radio and electrical appliance businesses, Reeves said. He estimated the mortality in San Francisco at 36.6 per cent from last May to Jan. 1.

Reeves said over-all business closings in Oregon and Washington amounted to 8.5 and 4.4 per cent, respectively, for the past year.

The report failed to present a solution, but acknowledged the need for "more than a sympathetic attitude."

To High Court

NAZIS ASK FRANCO FOR PROMISED AID

Stockholm, Jan. 14.—(U.P.)—The Nazis, facing increased demands on their manpower by developments on the Russian and Mediterranean fronts, have appealed to Spanish Generalissimo Francisco Franco to aid the Axis, German newspaper reports reveal today.

The Hamburger Fremdenblatt reminded Franco of his promise a year ago "to mobilize 3,000,000 men against the European arch-enemy if it should prove necessary."

The Germans were calling up 16-year-olds for military service. Most of them belong to the Hitler Youth organization, which facilitates their transfer to army camps without special mobilization orders.

Another group of Germans, including businessmen in key positions, who had been living in Sweden, have been called home for military service, it was learned.

VICTORY SAUSAGE POOR SUBSTITUTE

St. Louis, Mo., Jan. 14.—(U.P.)—Victory sausage, "a little meat and a lot of soybeans in casing" will make its appearance in the corner butcher shop soon, the National Independent Meat Packers' association announced, unhappily.

The meat packers, here for their annual convention, learned about the new product only yesterday and they were generally gloomy about it. They described it as a standardized ersatz commodity designed by the Office of Price Administration to stretch the nation's meat supply.

Spokesmen admitted it probably would not be very tasty and that the public would take it gingerly at first instead of their favorite frankfurters, country sausage, pig links, bologna, braunschweiger, and bockwurst, but insisted the product would be wholesome and nutritious.

PLANE OUTPUT CUT BY ABSENTEEISM

Los Angeles, Jan. 14.—(U.P.)—More than 300 planes monthly are being lost through absenteeism, Aircraft Production Chief Charles E. Wilson of the War Production Board said today.

Wilson was here on tour with Lt. Gen. William S. Knudsen, Rear Adm. Ralph E. Davison and other war production officials.

A dozen more planes a month could be built at North American Aviation Plant if workers would stop staying home when they felt like it, Wilson said. President J. H. Kindelberger told him. Consolidated Aircraft officers put their monthly production loss at 36 Liberators bombers a month. Lockheed executives outlined a similar situation.
