## ERROR NOTED IN LETTER BY F. D. R.

Washington, Sept. 8.—(U.P.)—President Roosevelt today told his press and radio conference that he had been credited erroneously with saying that "vicars" in which we are the "repaid" for war-time lend lease aid to other nations.

Mr. Roosevelt referred to a statement contained in his letter transmitting to congress the eleventh report on lend lease operations. It was sent to the secretary of the senate and the clerk of the house on August 25.

Mr. Roosevelt said the letter of transmittal was one of several drafts which were submitted for his approval and by error was put into print without his approval.
