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With the Fifth Army, Italy,
Sept. 15—(U.P.)—A canopy of dust
and smoke thrown up by battle
covers the narrow allied beach-
head here.

Life in this sector of American-
held Italy is a highly exciting af-
fair.

Through the over-hanging pall
during the day enemy fighters
make dashes across the beach-
head, and the air soon is filled
with ack-ack.

At night enemy bombers raid
the beaches. Flares hang in the
sky, fires dot the battle line and
the ground shakes from heavy
firing.

Civilians Hold Up

Civilian families pass nights in
mountain caves.

Allied planes are overhead al-
most constantly during the day,
but enemy planes still find holes
in the protective umbrella.

And the weather is fine with
warm days and cool nights.

Reinforcement units continue

to pour ashore despite the enemy
air attacks. Numerous enemy
bombs have been knocked out,
but a count is impossible because
of the numerous separate encoun-
ters.
