FOUR TEAMS SHOW STRENGTH IN GRID SEASON OPENINGS

Michigan, Duke, Villanova and Marquette Win—Cornell Disappoints.

New York, Sept. 18.—(U.P.)—Four teams, Duke, Michigan, Villanova and Marquette, emerged from the first Saturday season tonight with performances that tabbed them as outfits to be reckoned with.

Duke's 40 to 0 victory over the Camp Lejeune, N. C., marines at Durham was the most impressive, not because of the margin but because the marines possessed a number of former pro and college stars and had been figured to give the Blue Devils a fight. Three veterans, Tom Davis and Buddy Luper, sparked the heavy offensive. The Duke line also was solid enough to stop every incipient marine offensive.

Michigan won as expected 26 to 0 from Camp Grant at Rockford, Ill., with its all-veteran backfield of Wiesse, White and Hirsch of Wisconsin and Daley of Minnesota, scoring when necessary.

Villanova, rated no better than even against a supposedly strong Muhlenberg team, got off to a 14-0 first period advantage and fattened it to win 35 to 12.

Although Wisconsin was rated weaker than a year ago, there

were few who expected Marquette to romp to a 33 to 7 victory in another game that had been doped as even. The Hill-toppers from Milwaukee scored in every period and were easing up at the finish.

The closest thing to an upset in the east was Rochester's thrilling last period 14 to 12 victory over Yale, although a look at the winners' veteran roster of naval trainees explained the situation.

Elsewhere in the east, Cornell was disappointing in its bare 7 to 6 victory over Bucknell, although Coach Carl Snively had complained that this team was "the weakest, most inexperienced" he ever handled.

Coast Guard Academy, usually a strong "little" team, took Bates into camp 25 to 6 in the only other eastern game.

Purdue, one of the Big Ten powers, defeated Great Lakes 23 to 13 at Great Lakes in a mid-western feature. The Iowa Sea-hawks showed a good offense but a leaky defense in their 32 to 18 victory over a supposedly puncheonless Illinois team at Champaign. Indiana, stripped of its usual talent, fought hard to get a 7 to 7 tie with Miami of Ohio at Bloomington.

Colorado college defeated Lowry Field Flies 32 to 14 in the only Rocky Mountain game.

ASHCOM RETURNS TO OREGON SQUAD

It was learned here yesterday that Dick Ashcom, former University of Oregon football tackle who played for the college all-stars in their recent game against the Washington Redskins, would return to the Oregon campus this week to continue his medical studies under a navy program.

Ashcom, according to press reports from the east, was approached by two Big Ten schools seeking his gridiron services, following the all-star game. Although he was graduated from the University of Oregon last spring the relaxation of eligibility rules in the nation's colleges resulted in spirited bidding for his services among certain Big Ten institutions, the eastern reports stated.

After the all-star game Ashcom signed a contract with the Detroit Lions of the National Professional Football league. However, his decision to return to his alma mater will preclude his playing professional ball this year, and it was not known whether he would turn out at Oregon.

SECOND NATIONAL PENNANT IN ROW TAKEN BY CARDS

St. Louis, Sept. 18.—(U.P.)—The world champion St. Louis Cardinals had their second consecutive National league pennant tonight by virtue of a 2 to 1 victory today over the Chicago Cubs in the first game of a double-header. The Cubs lost the second game, 5 to 0.

The Cardinals clinched the title in the last half of the ninth when they pushed over the winning run. With the bases loaded, Lou Klein, stellar second baseman, rapped a bounding hit to Cubs' Third Baseman Pete Elko, who stepped on the bag to force Marty Marion, but threw late to first attempting to double Klein, and Ray Sanders scored from third.

For a time the Cubs, who were the victims last year when the Redbirds won the pennant on the last day of the season, had the champions worried. They got six of their seven hits off Max Lanier, the winning pitcher, in the first three innings. Singles by Ed Stanky, Bill Nicholson and Ed Sauer produced the only run of the game for the Cubs in the first. St. Louis countered with an unearned run in the fifth however, when Klein drove in Debs Garms with the tying run. Garms had previously beat out an infield hit and moved on to second when Elko threw wide to second trying for a force play.

The victory gave the Cards their seventh pennant in the past 17 years, and when they take the field for the world series they will be trying for their fifth world championship. The huge pennant flew from the Redbird flagpole first in 1926, and again in '28, '30, '31, '34 and '42.

ROCHESTER RALLY IN FINAL PERIOD BEATS YALE, 14-12

New Haven, Conn., Sept. 18.—(U.P.)—The University of Rochester power house, which appeared to have blown a fuse in the first three periods, staged a spectacular rally in the fourth today to beat Yale 14-12 before 14,000 spectators.

A confident Yale eleven appeared to have the game tucked away 6-0 when it began fighting off an assault on its 42 in the final period. George Sutch evened it then with a line buck and tacked on the point to gain the slight lead. Yale bounced back on a freak play minutes later. Hoopes and Ray (Scooter) Scussell whammed to Rochester's 11. Pickett took a plunge and fumbled the ball but Bill Powell retrieved it to make the score 12-6.

Rochester almost immediately ran over another touchdown and that was the conclusive score. Robinson passed to Smolin who dodged tacklers for 33 yards to Yale's 3 from where Sutch crossed the line and added the kick.

Yale desperately battered with everything it had—passes by Hoopes and dashes by Scussell—but could only get to Rochester's 24 as the whistle ended the game.

PELICANS DEFEAT GRIZZLIES 31-13 IN OPENING TILT

Scoring in every period, the Klamath Falls Pelicans opened defense of their Southern Oregon Conference championship by whipping the Ashland high Grizzlies, 31 to 13, at Klamath Falls Friday night, in the first game of the season for both teams.

The Pelicans, with a weight advantage of 183 pounds, completely outclassed the smaller Grizzlies. They held a 7 to 0 lead at the end of the first quarter, a 13 to 7 bulge at halftime and a 19 to 13 advantage at the close of the third stanza. Klamath tied twice more in the fourth period.

Klamath displayed a very fine backfield led by Schortgen, Silva and Perkins, but the forward wall showed the need of more drive. Ashland, using the "T" formation, displayed promise of future trickery. Riggs of Ashland played a great defensive game.

JAP NAVAL LOSS 180 SHIPS SUNK, VINSON ADVICES

181 Other Enemy Warships Out of Action—Italy's Fall Weakens.

Washington, Sept. 18.—(U.P.)—Chairman Carl Vinson, D. Ga., of the house naval affairs committee, said tonight that American forces have sunk 180 Japanese warships and declared that Japan now "stands alone" because of increased Allied naval pressure which will result from the collapse of Italy.

Vinson said in a statement that he had been informed that definitely established Japanese losses include three battleships, six carriers, 38 cruisers, 83 destroyers and 14 submarines.

His assertion that three Japanese battleships have been sunk aroused immediate speculation. The navy has claimed only two such vessels as definitely sunk.

The army credited the late Capt. Colin Kelly, one of his country's first and foremost heroes of World War II, with having sunk the Japanese battleship Haruna off the Philippines. Subsequently, however, after the claim was challenged by several sources—it shifted the Haruna's listing to "probably sunk." It appeared likely that Vinson's tabulation included the vessel as sunk. Vinson did not elaborate.

Vinson said that in addition to the ships listed as sunk, 181 other Japanese warships were damaged and put out of action, at least temporarily. This number included 10 battleships, nine carriers, 85 cruisers, 83 destroyers and six submarines.

Another 28 Japanese warships, including a carrier, four cruisers, 18 destroyers and one submarine, are listed as "possibly sunk," he said.

Vinson said the Japanese now are unable to reinforce or supply their beleaguered outposts "in sufficient quantity to permit long resistance," because of smashing Allied naval blows at their supply lines. He recalled that Secretary of Navy Frank Knox recently announced more

NELSON HAS LEAD OVER CRAIG WOOD FOR GOLF TITLE

Toldo, Ohio, Sept. 18.—(U.P.)—Byron Nelson, Toledo pro and Masters champion, tonight held a seven-up lead over Craig Wood, duration National Open titleholder, at the half-way mark of their 72-hole match play duel for the mythical golf championship of 1943.

Playing over the familiar Inverness club home course, Nelson played two under par golf for the first 36 holes and had little trouble amassing a big lead as Wood experienced difficulty with his short game in the morning and then was bothered by a wild hook in the afternoon.

Nelson shot a par 71 to lead two up in the morning round. He lost a possible four-up lead when his putting went sour and he lost three straight holes. In the afternoon Nelson added five holes to his credit to move seven-up.

The final 36 holes will be played tomorrow. The match is being played for the benefit of the Red Cross, which stands to receive approximately \$5,000 on the two-days' play.
