Jackson County P.T.A. Council Hears Speakers

Miss Mary Gray, Red Cross nursing consultant for the state of Oregon, and R. M. Elder, county juvenile officer, spoke at the first meeting of the Jackson County Council of Parents and Teachers held last Wednesday at the junior high school in Medford.

The sessions opened in the morning during which reports of various committee chairmen were given and roll call of the county units was held, with the presidents reporting on pre-school work. Miss Gray and Mr. Elder spoke during a panel discussion led by Mrs. A. H. Puhl, Medford, a state officer.

Miss Gray spoke on the urgent need for some member in each family to take the home nursing course provided by the Red Cross. She told of the lack of trained nurses and said "should an epidemic start here it would save many lives if there were a number of people trained to care for the sick in their own homes."

Mr. Elder reported on juvenile delinquency control measures in the county and said the greatest problem was with girls. Mrs. Marjorie Hopkins, Medford, Girl Scout executive, spoke on the need of organized recreation. Also discussed were lunch and proper nutrition for school children and a description of the Medford nursery school and its functions was given.

Paternalism Growth Feared Says American Legion Chief

Denver, Sept. 18.—(U.P.)—Roane Waring, national commander of the American Legion, told a 23-state western and southern governors' conference in Denver today that there is a fear developing in this country "towards paternalism" and "a centralization of power within the federal government."

"In the minds of many of these Americans there lies upmost this fear concerning the usurpation by the federal government of the sovereignty belonging to our individual states, and of a definite and alarming drift toward rule by bureaucratic directives instead of legally enacted congressional laws," Waring asserted.

The Legionnaires also are apprehensive of the current tendency by the government to "submerge the personal endeavor of the individual and to suppress the free initiative of the citizen, and to make of him the recipient of a regimented life dictated and planned by government bureaus."

Waring's talk was the most bitter attack on the administration thus far delivered at the conference.

LT. RAY ETTINGER SEES HOT ACTION IN PACIFIC DUTY

Lt. (jg) Ray L. (Stretch) Ettinger, ex-Medford high basketball luminary, is seeing plenty of action in the Southwest Pacific fighting theatre.

Pilot and commander of a navy PBV patrol plane, Lt. Ettinger sent a newspaper clipping home in his last letter which describes how his plane, on reconnaissance, bombed and damaged a 2,500-ton Jap vessel, attacked barge concentrations near Lae, sunk a small cargo ship and destroyed three barges in the Central Solomons.

Stationed in New Guinea, Lt. Ettinger wrote that he hoped to be home on a furlough by Oct. 1 for the deer season. He also said he had run across Bob Minear of Medford, in New Guinea.

Lt. Ettinger is the son of Mr. and Mrs. L. S. Ettinger of 824 West 10th street. Another son, Ensign Robert L. Ettinger, is stationed in the New Hebrides and is a co-pilot on a navy PBV patrol plane.

ELKS OF ASHLAND IN BOND SPLURGE

Ashland, Sept. 18.—(Sp.)—Members of Ashland P. O. E. lodge No. 944 Wednesday night subscribed \$75,000 at their bond rally, making it the biggest day thus far of the drive in this area. Following a short lodge session, the meeting was turned over to the war bond salesmen and a group of Camp White entertainers.

Subscriptions ranging from \$25 bonds to \$5,000 purchases poured in to the corps of cashiers and assistants.

Three bonds, contributed by the Elks lodge, were given as prizes during the evening, a \$50 bond going to C. L. Cox, and \$25 bonds to Charles W. Fortmiller and Earl Leever.

Corporal Van Joy of Camp White arranged the program, and Sgt. Don Safford assisted him. Sid Reed, secretary of the lodge and chairman of the Ashland division of the county war bond committee, was in charge of general arrangements.

Cheaper Cigarettes Given Price Advance

An increase in the price of "economy brands" of cigarettes has been allowed by the Office of Price Administration according to an announcement from the local war price and ration board Friday. These cigarettes formerly sold for 12 cents for the regular size package and 13 cents for "king" size and now both sizes are to be sold at 13 cents or two packages for 25 cents, it was stated.

The new price ceiling is \$5.82 per thousand, less the regular discounts.

TOWN AND RANCH PROPERTY SALES GROW IN COUNTY

Real estate activity in the Medford district continues to increase, local realtors report, with many people interested in buying homes, ranches, or investment properties. Not only are many Jackson county people buying real estate, but persons from other states are making purchases in this district.

Indicative of the trend was the report last Friday that during the past 60 days the Mark A. Goldy agency has handled 17 sales involving \$112,200 in considerations, most of which has been in cash. Out of the 17 property transfers, eight were cash transactions amounting to three-fourths of the total sum.

Among the ranch deals was the sale of the Ernst ranch in the Applegate district to Leonard Fry, formerly connected with the Honolulu office of the Pan-American Airways. Another sale was the Zimmerman ranch, formerly known as the Kamm place, to M. S. Sanders of Salt Lake City. Mr. Sanders is a construction engineer and plans to reside on the ranch after the war is over and he is relieved of his duties in a steel plant in Utah.

Navy to Confine Buying to East

San Francisco, Sept. 18.—(U.P.)—The 12th naval district announced today that the navy's procurement of supplies on the Pacific coast has been placed on a new basis.

The announcement revealed that the navy in Washington issued an order that no more contracts were to be negotiated west of the Rockies if it was possible to obtain the products in the east due to the west coast manpower shortage.
