

Football is Suspended by University of Oregon for Present Season

CORNELL REVEALS DECISION SUNDAY AT MANAGER MEET

Ducks Unable to Field Representative Eleven—Basketball Will Continue.

Eugene, Ore., Sept. 20.—(U.P.)—Intercollegiate football at the University of Oregon has been suspended from the sports program for the 1943 season, the university's athletic board announced today.

Anne Cornell, Oregon's graduate manager, first made the announcement to a group of northern division graduate managers at a meeting in Portland Sunday.

The Portland meeting was attended by representatives from Oregon, Washington, Washington State, Idaho and Oregon State.

In making the decision, the athletic board said while it was certain Oregon could field a football team, it would not be a representative team which would uphold the standards of Oregon football of the past.

Coach Needed
Furthermore, they said, the army physical fitness program for more than 1000 trainees on the campus was in great need of the services of both Cornell and John Warren, head football coach.

Oregon will resume intercollegiate football as soon as conditions permit. Meanwhile, basketball will be continued, Cornell said, and it was thought likely Oregon would follow the plan adopted by the managers for spring sports at their December meeting.

TOP COAST TEAMS PLAY THIS WEEK

Sunday, the Del Monte Naval Pre-Flight squad meets Alameda Coast Guard at Kezar.

Paulino Betz Upset In Tennis Tourney

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Cuddy Likes Cards Because Of Youth, Speed and Power

New York, Sept. 20.—(U.P.)—We picked the Cardinals to beat the Yankees in last year's world series, and they did. We're making the same selection again; but we figure that St. Louis will need the full seven games to turn the trick.

We like the Cards because of their youth, speed and power. We believe these assets will more than offset the Yanks' apparent advantage in pitching.

Their average age is 25 years; their batting average is about .298. Meanwhile the eight Yanks who probably will bear the series burden average 29 years and about .274.

Unquestionably Joe McCarthy's Yanks have a pitching edge in Spud Chandler, Ernie Bonham and Hank Borowy, right-handers who have registered 19-4, 13-8 and 12-9, respectively. And their effectiveness may be amplified when working against a Cardinal line-up that might include at least five right-handed hitters: Klein, Walker, Cooper, Kurowski, Marion and Litwhiler.

Despite the importance of pitching in a series, however, the record of the past 20 years discloses that clubs depending on their pitching edge won but seven of the 20 series. During that period American league teams almost invariably had the power, or were supposed to have it, while the National circuit outfits had the pitching. Now the boot is on the other hoof. It's Cardinal power vs. American league pitching.

In this connection, it must be emphasized that two of the Cards' most dangerous batsmen are left-handed: Musial and Walker. Sanders also is a port side. Musial, only 22, is the type of batsman who can break up a ball game at any time. He leads both leagues in hitting, with an average of .356. He's a distance driver who specializes in doubles and triples.

NELSON CRUSHES WOOD, 15 AND 13

Toledo, O., Sept. 20.—(U.P.)—Byron Nelson, Toledo professional, held a lop-sided victory today over National Open Champion Craig Wood of Mamaronock, N. Y., in their 72-hole challenge golf match.

Nelson, Inverness club pro, defeated the champion, 15 to 13, in the most one-sided triumph since Walter Hagen trounced Cyril Walker, 18 and 17.

Nelson moved into the afternoon round, 11-up and won four of the first five holes to end the match on the fifth green. Wood went three over par on the five holes.

The best card of the four rounds was turned in on Nelson's morning round as he cut four strokes from par to post a 34-33, 87. Wood carded regulation figures during the morning with a 34-37, 71.

Sinkwich Shines As Lions Take 35 To 17 Win From Cardinals

The professional football season opened Sunday with the Detroit Lions, displaying power and trickery, defeating the Chicago Cardinals, 35-17 at Detroit before nearly 27,000 spectators.

Fireball Frankie Sinkwich, University of Georgia All-American who joined the Lions last week after being discharged from the marine corps, played long enough to toss one touchdown pass and carry the ball five times for a total of 22 yards.

Halfbacks Harry Hopp, veteran from Nebraska who scored three touchdowns and rookie Charles Fenenbock of UCLA, sparked the Detroit attack which scored in the first quarter and twice in each of the second and third periods.

Next week's schedule pits the Brooklyn Dodgers against the Lions at Detroit and the Chicago Bears against the Green Bay Packers at Green Bay.

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SENATORS GAIN ON YANKS WITH DOUBLE VICTORY

Nats Drop Leaders Twice, 3-2 and 5-1—Champion Cards Also Lose Couple.

New York, Sept. 20.—(U.P.)—The St. Louis Cardinals were happy today that they had the National league pennant all sewed up and the New York Yankees wished that the American league flag was in the same condition for both teams.

The Yanks dropped two of the runner-up Washington Senators, giving the Nats a clean sweep of the three game series. Jake Powell's 10th inning single drove home the winning run and gave Early Wynn credit for the 3-2 decision over Spud Chandler, seeking his 20th victory, in the first game. Milton Heafner pitched two hit bats to gain a 5-1 triumph over Ernie Bonham in the afterpiece.

The Philadelphia Athletics split a doubleheader with the Boston Red Sox. Joe Dobson won the opener 14-0 with a five hit performance. Jess Flores gained his 11th decision in the nightcap, 6-1.

The veteran Jim Bagby and Al Smith each gained their 16th triumph of the season as the Cleveland Indians took both ends of a doubleheader from the Detroit Tigers. Bagby tossed a two hitter to win, 1-0 in the opener. Smith allowed two runs in winning the second, 6-2.

The Chicago White Sox and the St. Louis Browns ended the American league season in Chicago by splitting a twin-bill. Chet Laabs' three run homer in the opener gave the Browns a 7-4 victory as Steve Sundra won his 14th game. The Sox came back in the nightcap, however, to win 6-1 behind the seven hit pitching of Johnny Humphries.

The Chicago Cubs set the Cardinals down, 6-0 in the first and 10-9 in the second.

The Boston Braves took a pair from the Philadelphia Phillies, 3-2 in the first behind the five hit pitching of Jim Tobin and 6-5 in the afterpiece which went 11 innings.

The New York Giants and the senior circuit's play in New York with the Giants taking both ends of a double-header. Cliff Melton allowed but seven hits to win the first, 3-1 and Ace Adams gained his 11th victory in the second when Buddy Kerr's second major league home scored three runs for a 6-4 triumph.

Rip Sewell received credit for his 21st pitching win as the Pittsburgh Pirates took a twin-bill from the Cincinnati Reds. The Bucs pounded three Red hurlers for 14 hits in the opener, allowing Sewell to coast in with a 10-3 decision. Two runs in their last time at bat provided the Pirates with a 2-1 decision in the second.

FRESNO SOFTBALL TEAM IN FINALS

Detroit, Sept. 20.—(U.P.)—Hammer Field Raiders of Fresno, Calif., and Jax Maids of New Orleans, defending girls' champions, are the favorites to walk off with the 1943 men's and girls' world softball titles in the final games of the American Softball association tournament tonight.

Both teams remained undefeated as the final playoffs ended last night, and both teams will compete for the championships against opponents who already have suffered one defeat.

Hammer Field meets Briggs Bombers, Detroit metropolitan champions, in tonight's games while the New Orleans girls' team plays the Phoenix, Ariz., Ramblers.
