12 HEALTH POINTS GIVEN PUBLIC FOR WAR-TIME BENEFIT

Civilian Defense and Board of Health Point Need of Care in Doctor Dearth.

"Good Health is a Weapon" is the theme of an intensive educational program being launched in every town and community this week by the Oregon State Board of Health in cooperation with the Oregon State Defense Council, according to an announcement by Dr. Frederick D. Stricker, state health officer.

Commenting on the campaign Dr. Stricker said, "all communities have suffered great losses in available medical and dental professionals as well as nurses and technicians from hospital staffs. For this reason it is more important now than at any time since the 'flu' epidemic of World War I, that every possible precaution be taken against the outbreak of communicable and contagious diseases in this fast growing northwest area."

To illustrate the urgency of the public's cooperation in the health program the state health officer brought out the fact that one-third of the doctors in Oregon have been called into service and in contrast to that, the population of Oregon has been increased by over 100,000 people according to newly computed tabulations made from the issuing of ration book No. 2.

Dr. Stricker pointed out that the present educational program in Oregon is concentrated in the following 12 points.

1. Protect children and adults against communicable diseases by immunization especially against diphtheria and smallpox.
2. Keep children away from all sick persons.
3. Maintain sanitary conditions in your home, block and community. Report rats and mosquitoes to your local health department.
4. Eat right foods. Conserve food values by proper storage and cooking.
5. Keep cheerful and busy. Don't forget to play.
6. Wear proper clothing and maintain room temperature at 65 degrees.
7. Expectant mothers should seek medical care early. The health of the mother and baby depends on proper care.
8. When ill, get a competent physician's advice early.
9. Give yourself a chance. Children and adults should have periodic physical examinations by a competent physician and dentist. Any evidence of illness should receive immediate attention.
10. Know and practice good home nursing care.
11. Call upon your local health department for help in protecting the health of those living in your block.
12. Through cooperation of county civil defense officials and school authorities pamphlets carrying the 12-point message are being distributed to all school pupils with the request that they be taken home for consideration of parents. More detailed information about the points may be obtained through block leaders at the chamber of commerce or from the state or local health departments.
