## NAZIS SAY ALLIED CASUALTIES HEAVY

The Berlin radio claimed today that allied casualties in the battle of Salerno included more than 10,000 dead and wounded, and 4,425 prisoners.

The broadcast said that 153 allied tanks and 54 guns were lost and two cruisers, three destroyers, one landing boat, one tanker and seven transports were sunk or damaged.

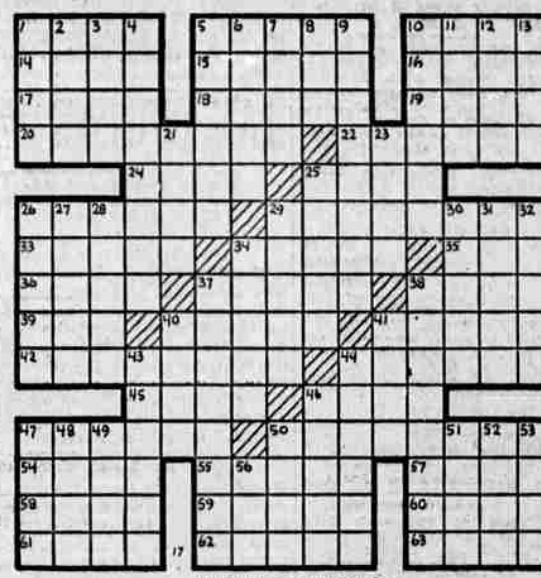
Damage to several other warships and 125 transports and tankers was claimed.
