

COUNTY RECEIVES SUBSTANTIAL SUM FROM O-C FUNDS

Jackson 2nd With \$169,052
Among Recipients; Douglas 1st With \$253,709.

Timber cutting on a sustained yield basis on the 2,500,000 acres of O. & C. railroad grant lands in eighteen western Oregon counties during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1943, not only supplied 415 million board feet of lumber for war and industrial purposes, but also resulted in payments of nearly \$1,000,000 in cash to the general fund of the counties in which the land is situated, according to E. K. Peterson, acting district forester in charge of the southern Oregon area. Peterson reports Jackson county, with an aggregate credit of \$169,052.53, ranked second among the recipients of O. & C. funds. Douglas county was first with \$253,709.88; Lane county third, and Josephine county fourth.

The gross receipts of the O. & C. administration are pooled, and then 50 per cent is divided among the counties according to the proportion of the total valuation of O. & C. lands that existed in each county in 1916—the year the lands revealed to the department of the interior from the Oregon and California (now Southern Pacific) Railroad. For the past five years the O. & C. has been making an additional payment of 25 per cent for back taxes accrued prior to 1937. The 1943 payments have liquidated this obligation. Henceforth, 25 per cent will accrue to the federal treasury. The remaining 25 per cent is available for administration of the O. & C. lands, including protection from fire which is contracted to the state of Oregon forestry department.

Forming one of the nation's largest testing grounds for scientific forest management, timber cutting as required by congressional mandate, is conducted on a sustained yield basis which stipulates that no more timber shall be cut each year than can be replaced by natural growth. Cutting is conducted in such a manner that recreational values are protected, timber growth is accelerated and natural reforestation is obtained.

BURGLAR ENTERS BIG PINES OFFICE

The office of the Big Pine Lumber company, 32 West Sixth street, was entered some time Sunday night by a burglar who stole a number of one, two and three-cent stamps and a box containing stamp pennies, Henry A. Thierolf reported to city police Sunday morning.

Entrance was effected by prying off a board of the lumber shed at the northeast corner of the building and breaking the glass out of the office door, police stated. The burglar completely ransacked desks and drawers in the office, but nothing else was discovered missing.

D.A.V. OUTLINES VETERAN NEEDS

New York, Sept. 20.—(UP)—The Disabled American Veterans, closing its 22nd national convention today, adopted a six-point program for the care of disabled veterans of the present war.

The resolution, "based upon our experience following World War I," urged the government to:
Take care of the disabled first; abolish red tape and administer veterans' benefits under a single government agency; expand hospital facilities; preserve vocational training during disability; provide employment for disabled veterans at prevailing wages; provide adequate compensation geared to cost of living.

The convention chose Denver, Colo., for the next convention, to be held Sept. 1 to 10, 1944.

BERT HANEY RITES BEING ARRANGED

Portland, Ore., Sept. 20.—(UP)—Funeral arrangements were being made today for Federal Judge Bert Emory Haney of the ninth circuit court of appeals at San Francisco, who died at his home here Saturday.

Judge Haney, 64, had served on the U. S. shipping board for Oregon and had served on the port of Portland commission. He was appointed to the circuit court in 1935.

He attended Willamette university and graduated from University of Oregon School of Law in 1903.

He was born at Lafayette, Yamhill county, Oregon, on April 18, 1879. His father, John Haney, served in the U. S. cavalry under Gen. George A. Custer.

MURDERER PAYS
Canon City, Colo., Sept. 20.—(UP)—John Sullivan, who was convicted of the murder more than a year ago of Mrs. Carrie Culbertson at Manitou Springs, Colo., was executed early today in the Colorado state penitentiary's lethal gas chamber. The 50-year-old Sullivan went to his death without emotion.

EX-MEDFORDITES MEET BY CHANCE ON FOREIGN DUTY

A recent letter received by local friends from Arthur Schoeni, former Medford newspaper man, describes a chance meeting between his sister, Grace Schoeni, and a former Medford boy, Harold GeBauer, both of whom are now in the South Seas. Miss Schoeni, now serving as a Red Cross recreation director, was studying dramatics in Russia when the present war started. A former Medford local, she graduated from the local high school and is a niece of Mrs. Lucy Lyman of this city. GeBauer was the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. Max GeBauer, who lived here for several years. Mrs. GeBauer is now living in California. He is also a brother of Mrs. Kenneth Parrett, formerly of Medford. GeBauer was active in dramatics and publications when he attended high school here. Miss Schoeni told her brother that GeBauer is now working at a Red Cross radio station, and is in a play which she is directing for entertainment of troops in the area.

Arthur Schoeni was journalism teacher at the Medford high school at one time and was manager of the United Press bureau at Olympia, Wash., before entering the navy. He is now a lieutenant (jg) in the navy, and is working on the "Naval Aviation News," his duties entailing trips between Washington, Chicago and New York.

COOK SAYS SAILOR STOLE HIS MONEY

Lee Jackson, a cook employed at the Fourth Wheel, accused an unidentified sailor of stealing \$310 from him after he took him to his room to sleep early Sunday morning.

Jackson reported to city police that he and the sailor went to the room about 2 a. m. Jackson told police he took a shower and lay down on the bed and went to sleep, while the sailor was still sitting in a chair.

Shortly before 5 a. m., he told police, he awakened to discover that his billfold, containing \$250 in currency and a First National bank bag containing \$60 in cash, were missing, along with the sailor.

Police said Jackson described the sailor as being five feet eight inches tall, weighing 145 pounds and having coal black hair. He was supposed to be a radioman, second class, Jackson reported to police.

BOTTOLFSSEN URGED TO SAVE RECALL EXPENSE

Boise, Ida., Sept. 20.—(UP)—Recall petitions for Gov. C. A. Bottolfsen today were held in a vault at Nampa and will be routed through county clerks' offices later, Harold Howell, secretary of the Idaho Independent Voters' league, revealed.

Howell said the petitions, holding 18,000 signatures, will be held and Bottolfsen urged to resign to save the state the cost of an election.

Bottolfsen's recall is sought because he signed a bill repealing the Grant's act.

SOLDIER HELD IN KNIFE ATTACK ON MEXICAN WORKER

Joe Ortega Mendoza, 50, Mexican national here to help in the pear harvest, suffered a severe cut on his upper left arm and one on his neck Sunday afternoon in a stabbing affray back of a South Riverside beer parlor, city police reported.

Turned over to military police for investigation in connection with the stabbing was Pvt. Woodrow Keaton, QMC, SCU, Camp White. Pvt. Keaton, city police said, had a blood-stained knife on his person when he was picked up later with the help of MPs.

Mendoza was confined in Sacred Heart hospital with an arm-slash six inches long and one inch deep. The cut on his neck, police said, would have severed his jugular vein had it been a little deeper. He was reported resting easily today.

Police had no other details of the stabbing but said both men had been drinking. The affair occurred about 3:15.

HOSIERY SALVAGE CLOSES SEPT. 30

Termination of the national hosiery collection program has been announced by the salvage branch of the war production board. The campaign, carried on for the past several months to collect old nylon and silk hosiery, will close Sept. 30.

Though collections continue to be remarkably high, salvage headquarters advise that the action is being taken because the proportion of silk and nylon being returned is on a declining scale, due largely to the fact that little or no hosiery of this type is being manufactured.

Mrs. W. Alex Kuehlthau, salvage chairman, urges women having any old silk or nylon hosiery to turn it in at any of the Medford department stores within the next few days. These stores have been serving as collection depots.

Roderick Finney, executive secretary of the Oregon salvage committee, states that response by the public in this salvage drive resulted in the amazing total of 2,300,307 pounds of silk and nylon hosiery being collected.

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VOTERS LEAGUE TO AID FORMING FOREIGN POLICY

Decision to assist in a nationwide program being mapped by the National League of Women Voters to promote education along the lines of foreign policy and international co-operation was made by the board of the Jackson County League at a meeting Saturday afternoon. The local campaign will start about the middle of October.

"The purpose of the national campaign," states a national league officer, "is to organize an army of 50,000 recruits to talk to people, to make them aware that there is no way out of wars, no hope of establishing peace and well being here in our country except by the establishment of a sound foreign policy and to help them realize that such a policy can be established only when there is a great public demand for it."

Wise Choice Needed
"People must be educated to see the need of world cooperation and to make a wise choice when the time for decision comes. We must not forget that the United States is an empire with wide possessions, that the United States has always had alliances, and that the country is not economically self-sufficient."

To carry on the campaign the county league will be divided into groups, made up of both members and non-members, and will each pass on this information in her daily contacts with friends and neighbors.

LOCAL WOMAN'S HUSBAND MISSING

Mrs. Audrey Nelson of 10 Laurel street recently received notice from the War Department that her husband, First Lieutenant R. E. Nelson, was "missing in action, as of August 17."

Lt. Nelson was serving as pilot of a B-17 bomber in the army air corps. A more recent letter from a friend of Nelson's, a pilot accompanying him on the mission when he was lost, states that when last seen, Lt. Nelson's engines were gone, but he was gliding down with his plane in perfect control "somewhere over Germany."

Lt. Nelson has been in the service since January 16, 1942, and prior to that time lived in Gresham, Ore. Mrs. Nelson is employed at the Medford Corporation.

OKANOGAN PILOT ADDS FIVE ZEROS TO STRING
