MANPOWER WASTE IN ARMY AND NAVY ASSETS TRUMAN

Washington, Sept. 21.—(UP)—Sen. Harry S. Truman, D. Mo., chairman of the senate's special war investigating committee, today accused the army and navy of "waste of manpower" and demanded that they achieve greater efficiency before fathers are drafted.

Truman made the charge during a senate speech in which he said he will vote against a bill to defer fathers until Jan. 1 because "that is an administrative and not a legislative matter."

Sen. Burton K. Wheeler, D., Mont., author of the father deferment bill, disagreed. He asserted that it is the duty of congress to fix the over-all policy.

Truman's speech opened floor debate on the question, which is not expected to reach a vote in the senate before the middle of next week. The debate will be recessed again tomorrow for the appearance before the senate military affairs committee by Bernard M. Baruch, adviser to War Mobilization Director James F. Byrnes.

FULBRIGHT PEACE PROPOSAL VOTED

Washington, Sept. 21.—(UP)—The house today passed and sent to the senate the Fulbright resolution calling for American cooperation in maintaining a just peace through international machinery.

The vote was 360 to 29. The action, taken under procedure requiring a two-thirds majority for approval, marked the first time that a measure on post-war international relations has been voted upon in congress.

The senate, jealous of its foreign relations prerogatives, is likely to sidetrack the peace-cooperation proposal pending drafting of a substitute by the senate foreign relations committee.

Other articles for the department store auction which are expected to attract much attention are rubber boots, bed sheets, all-wool blankets, cleansing tissues, shoes, dresses, sweaters and other articles.
