

DOORBELL RINGING EXPECTED TO HIKE BUYING OF BONDS

Washington, Sept. 22—(U.P.)—The treasury reported today that Cleveland was the first million-population city to reach its quota in the \$15,000,000,000 third war loan drive.

Cleveland reported \$242,389, 252 in bond sales. Its quota was \$233,000,000.

Washington, Sept. 22—(U.P.)—The treasury department found individual war bond sales lagging today but expected intensive doorbell ringing by its canvassers to take up the slack.

Listing yesterday's sales at \$425,000,000, the treasury reported a 13-day total of \$11,170,000,000, near the three-

quarter mark in its \$15,000,000,000 drive, but it reported sales to individuals totaled only 35 per cent of the quota.

The treasury said its most successful selling medium was the Hollywood Cavalcade, which had sold more than \$1,000,000 worth of bonds in 13 cities.

SOLDIER BABY CROP EXCEEDS ESTIMATES

Washington, Sept. 22—(U.P.)—The house appropriations committee, estimating there will be \$45,000 pregnancies among wives of enlisted service men during fiscal 1944, today recommended a \$18,620,000 deficiency appropriation for the government's maternity and child care program.

When the program was first started, the committee said, it was estimated that the total

number of pregnancies would be 300,000 and that 25 per cent of the wives would apply for government care.
