

STALIN MESSAGE URGES AMERICANS TO BACK ATTACK

Success of Bond Drive Will
Help Bring Victory in
Shortest Time Says Chief

Washington, Sept. 23.—(U.P.)—Soviet Premier Josef Stalin, in a unique message to the American people read at a war loan drive ceremony here, said today that success of the \$15,000,000, 000 bond campaign would help bring victory "over the bitter enemy within the shortest time."

The message said that American manufacture of war material renders "great support in the fight with our common enemy."

The message was read at the "Back the Attack" show here by Maj. Gen. A. I. Belyaev of the Soviet air forces.

For 26 Months
Stalin's message said:
"For 26 months the Soviet Union has been engaged in a difficult war of liberation against our common enemy, Hitlerite Germany, and her satellites Finland, Rumania and Hungary. In this gigantic war more than 500 divisions are involved on both sides."

"Today the Soviet army, the Red army, is advancing from Smolensk to the shores of the Black sea, pursuing and driving the hated enemy from Soviet soil. In this struggle the Red army also is successfully employing planes, tanks, guns and other munitions and equipment which are received from the Allied United States and Great Britain."

"The entire Soviet population is working unceasingly for the front to bring the hour of victory nearer."

sions are rendering great support in the fight with our common enemy."

"Every Soviet citizen is not only assisting his army and his government to defeat the enemy but is giving great financial support to the Soviet government by buying war bonds."

"It is desirable that the American people, by successful participation in the war loan in the United States, promote the joint effort of the Allies to achieve victory over the bitter enemy within the shortest time."

SKYSCRAPER WORKERS MAROONED BY STRIKE

New York, Sept. 23.—(U.P.)—Partial elevator service was maintained at huge Rockefeller Center today as management and union officials sought to end an insurgent operators' walk out which left thousands of office workers stranded in the skyscraper buildings at the evening rush hour last night.

The operators staged the strike, the second in three months, at 4:30 p. m. yesterday, leaving most of the 27,000 persons employed in the 12 buildings marooned on upper levels. Many were forced to walk down to the street, some from as high as the 60th floor.

OVER THE TOP

Watsonville, Cal., Sept. 23.—(U.P.)—Watsonville, a city of 9,000, has exceeded its third war loan drive quota of \$1,400,000 by \$219,425, it was reported today.

OREGON SHORT OF HALF-WAY MARK IN BOND CAMPAIGN

Portland, Ore., Sept. 23.—(U.P.)—Oregon still is short of the half-way mark in the third war loan drive. Total sales to noon Wednesday were \$51,635,134, members of the state war finance committee said. Oregon's quota is \$104,000,000.

Washington, Sept. 23.—(U.P.)—The third war loan drive entered its third and last week today with \$3,300,000,000 still to go.

The treasury hoped that the \$15,000,000,000 total would be reached by September 30. The last day of the huge money-raising campaign. It reported that individual sales—"the backbone of the drive"—have increased to 39 per cent of their quota. Corporation investments are 89 per cent subscribed.

Yesterday's bond sales totaled slightly over half a billion dollars to bring the total to \$11,700,000,000.

EYE DEFECTS TOP DRAFT REJECTION

Chicago, Sept. 23.—(U.P.)—Eye defects were the principal cause of draft rejection among a sample group of white youths, while educational deficiency was the chief cause among a negro group, the American Medical association reported today.

Reports on the sample groups were made in the AMA Journal from studies of the results of physical examinations given 45,585 teen aged inductees between December, 1942, and February, 1943.

Of 42,273 white youths examined, 23.8 per cent were rejected, the article said, and 45.5 per cent of the 3,312 negroes were rejected. Half the rejections of negro youths resulted from educational deficiency or syphilis, the Journal said.

Next to eye defects, the

nine leading causes of rejection among white registrants in decreasing order of occurrence were: mental disease, muscle and bone defects, heart and blood vessel defects, ear defects, hernia, neurologic defects, educational deficiency,

underweight, and mental deficiency.

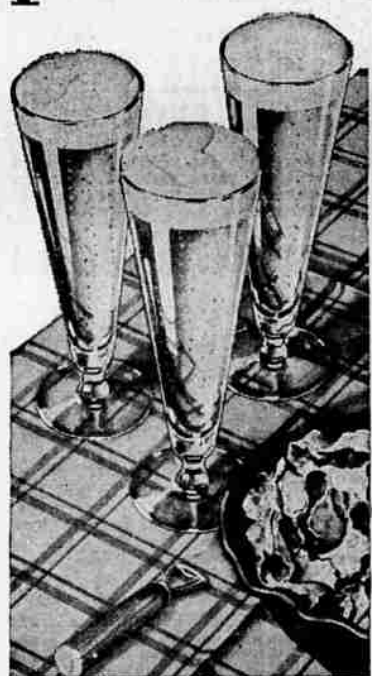
