

LEGION ACCUSES HAMILTON FISH OF AIDING FOES

New York Congressman Misused Franking Privileges in Mailing Propaganda.

Omaha, Neb., Sept. 23.—(U.P.)—The American Legion at its annual convention today unanimously endorsed participation of the United States in an association of nations to maintain peace.

Omaha, Neb., Sept. 23.—(U.P.)—The American Legion charged today that Rep. Hamilton Fish, R., N. Y., misused his congressional franking privileges for dissemination of "propaganda inimical to the United States." In a sharply worded resolution, delegates to the Legion's 23rd annual convention charged that Fish permitted "certain groups and individuals, including George Sylvester Viereck and the American first committee," to use his free mailing privileges.

Steps Urged
The resolution urged Attorney General Francis Biddle to "take such actions and steps as are necessary . . . to put an end to the misuse of the franking privilege."

The Legion's committee on Americanism urged in a resolution that all functions of the war relocation authority, and the control of Japanese within the United States and its territories, be placed under war department supervision.

Other resolutions proposed by the Americanism committee advocated:

Continuation of the Dies committee; rigid discipline for conscientious objectors; requirements for a full year's course in U. S. history for high school students; continued active duty with full rank and pay for war veterans until their education is completed; assurance that war prisoners in the United States will be returned to their native countries after the war, and the immediate granting of citizenship to aliens serving with the armed forces.

Women Defended
Delegates to the meeting of the Legion's auxiliary came to the defense of their sisters in uniform by condemning attacks upon the character of American women serving in the army, navy, marines and coast guard. The delegates expressed "pride, confidence and sincere admiration in and for" the women in the services.

They also passed a resolution deploring the tendency of young mothers to leave their small children to take war jobs.

Oscar Lam, Los Angeles, Cal., was elected grand chief de chemin de fer of the American Legion's honor society, the 40 and eighth last night. He succeeds E. H. Burns, Champaign, Ill.

New York, Sept. 23.—(U.P.)—Nine frantic female fans fought their way through four special police, a bodyguard and three press agents today to rip the buttons from Frank Sinatra's suit.

The singer, who arrived from Hollywood looking like any other young man, was met by his wife, Nancy, and his three-year-old daughter, Nancy Sandra, but when he entered the station the girls made a running charge at him.

"Frankie, my Frankie!" they screamed. One, a 16-year-old red-head called "Gloria" had to be forcibly removed by police. "I'm arrested for you," she screamed at the singer as she was led away.

EAGLE PT. SOLDIER DIES IN ACCIDENT

Mrs. H. C. Meredith of Route 4 received word today that her brother, Sgt. Norman J. Thiede, 26, formerly of Eagle Point, was accidentally killed last Friday night while riding a motorcycle near his station in an army camp near Long Beach, Calif. Thiede failed to negotiate a curve, going over a slight bank to meet instant death. Searching parties failed to discover his body until late Monday.

Thiede was inducted into the army from Eagle Point in January, 1942. He had lived in that vicinity since 1928 when the family moved there from Amherst, Neb. He attended school in Nebraska and Eagle Point, and at the time of his induction was employed at the McGraw and Collins Mill in Eagle Point. Thiede, who served in a coast artillery unit, was married this summer, and his wife made her home in Los Angeles.

Remains were forwarded to Nampa, Ida., where his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Thiede, now reside. Funeral services will be held there next Monday.

ASK WEST HOLLY ST. NAME CHANGE

Meeting last night, the city planning commission drew up a recommendation to the city council that the name of West Holly street be changed to Fairmont street in order to stop the confusion resulting in the fact that West Holly does not connect with North or South Holly. The recommendation will be presented to the council at its next meeting Oct. 5.

Ralph Woodford, secretary of the planning commission, explained that West Holly runs east two blocks from Columbus avenue and stops at a dead end, and that it has no connection whatsoever with South Holly, which runs from West Main south to Stewart avenue, or North Holly, which runs from West Main north to West Jackson boulevard.

He said much confusion has always resulted among persons, who are not familiar with its location, attempting to find the street.

AIRLINES DO MORE WITH LESS PLANES

Washington, Sept. 23.—(U.P.)—Commercial airlines, which gave almost half their equipment to the air transport command, are stretching what they have left to average 151 per cent more flight miles per plane than in peacetime, the civil aeronautics board disclosed today.

In a report on wartime commercial aviation, the CAB said the 16 domestic airlines now are flying a daily average of 301,989 scheduled miles with only 175 planes, compared to 368,867 miles per day flown by a peacetime fleet of 324 planes.

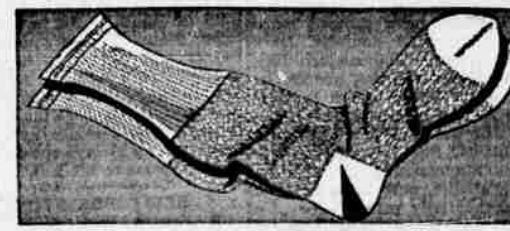
