

GIRAUD BELIEVES CORSICA FREEING MATTER OF DAYS

Nazis Will be Thrown Out
Within 15 Days Says Gen-
eral—Patriots Gain Arms

Allied Headquarters, North Africa, Sept. 24. — (U.P.) — Gen. Henri Giraud believes the Germans "will be thrown out of Corsica within 10 to 15 days," his personal chief-of-staff, Gen. Rene Chambré, said today in disclosing that Giraud had visited the French island.

Giraud flew to Corsica Tuesday where the people hailed him with shouts of "Vive Giraud" as he rode in an automobile through the streets.

"Vive De Gaulle!"

"There are two presidents of the committee of national liberation," Giraud reminded the demonstrators in reference to Gen. Charles De Gaulle.

The Corsicans promptly added: "Vive De Gaulle!" Chambré said. (The city visited by Giraud presumably was Ajaccio, the capital.)

Chambré said reconquest of Corsica had been in preparation for six months and that Giraud constantly kept in touch with patriot forces by radio. He estimated patriot forces on the island number from 10,000 to 12,000, armed with machine guns and tommy guns obtained by submarine and parachute from the Allies.

One patriot only 15 years old has killed two German officers and one soldier, while another 75 years old shot three German soldiers with a sporting rifle, Chambré said. Patriot resistance at Curo on the day of the landings stopped a German tank column and forced it to retire, he disclosed.

Chambré said the 80,000 Italian troops on the island were considered "troops in transit," not as prisoners. He said they had been assigned the task of "rebuilding Corsica" and that they had been given complete personal liberty, though they must obtain food and clothing through the Allies.

JEWISH HOLY DAYS WILL BE MARKED IN CAMP SERVICES

Soldiers of the Jewish faith stationed at Camp White will have a full opportunity to observe the Jewish high holy days, General Amos Thomas, commanding general, announced today.

The holy days, which begin at sundown, September 29, will be marked by camp religious services conducted by Chaplain Jacob E. Segal at chapel No. 12, located at Avenue "F" and 10th street. The same procedure will be followed at the close of the holy day period, when religious services commemorating Yom Kippur, the day of atonement, will begin in the chapel at sundown, October 8 and end the evening of the 9th.

Assisting as cantor at these services will be Pfc. Max R. Tieger of the Medford airdrome, accompanied by Mrs. Doris Condit Lantz, organist of the First Methodist church.

The observance of the holy days is characterized by a great solemnity which summons the Jew to obtain from his daily occupation and participate in communal worship.

General Thomas in a special holy day message to Jewish soldiers declared, "We are happy to know that men of Jewish faith in the armed forces will be able to worship on these solemn days in accordance with your traditions. As Americans you will be exercising the freedom of religion, one of the great four freedoms for the sake of which we are engaged in this world-wide struggle. I join with you in the hope that the coming year may mark a great step forward in the extension of that freedom throughout the world, and in the final and decisive overthrow of the forces of tyranny."

Civilian assistance in the arrangement of the religious services is being supervised by the army and navy committee of the Jewish Welfare board of Medford.
