While officials and congressmen discuss endlessly whether fathers are to be drafted or are not to be drafted, Jackson county people continue to enlist. Last week four members of one family in Sams Valley enlisted in the navy. They were William, Elmer and Clarence Lucas, and William's wife, Virginia, who enlisted in the WAVES. The boys' parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Lucas, will remain to operate the family farm.

Edward C. Kelly, prominent attorney, left Medford a few days ago to report for active army duty at Ft. Custer, Mich., the provost marshal general's school. Mr. Kelly was commissioned a captain in the army's military government service.

Of the last group of men sent to the induction center at Portland by Jackson County Selective Service Board No. 2, several were taken into the navy and one became a marine. Accepted by the navy were Robert Peterson, James Thornley, Dale Hoskins, Keith Haines, Robert Purves, Clark Akin, Ralph Swingle, Louis Corwin, Hugh Phillips, Lawrence Bradford, Truitt Cantrall and Aubrey Taylor. Dale Fieguth was enlisted in the marine corps.

News from Medfordites in the far corners of the world comes in each week. Pvt. Jack Logan attended a Rotary luncheon in London recently. He is with the military police in England, having been stationed there since August of 1942. His two brothers are also overseas, Chester Logan in New Guinea and Lt. (jg) J. Dee Logan stationed at a north Pacific navy base.

Saturday Yeoman Robert Childers broadcast from Hawaii in a special bond sales program and members of his family and friends in Medford listened to

the broadcast. Yeoman Childers has been in Hawaii for the past year. The Tribune printed a picture of two servicemen industriously peeling potatoes for army chow in New Guinea and Mrs. Joyce A. McCaleb recognized one as being her son, Sgt. Marvin McCaleb. He was first stationed in Panama and has been in New Guinea for six months.

Lt. (jg) Ray L. Ettinger has written of recent action seen by him and his crew in the southwest Pacific area. "Stretch" is pilot and commander of a navy PBV patrol plane and on recent patrols bombed and damaged a Jap vessel, attacked barge concentrations near Lae, sank a small cargo ship and destroyed three barges. He wrote that he was due for leave and would like to be home for the deer season. Lt. Ettinger said he had recently seen Bob Minear in New Guinea. Lt. Ettinger's brother, Ensign Robert Ettinger, is stationed in the New Hebrides and is co-pilot of a navy PBV.

Another navy lieutenant Arthur Schoeni, writes to say that his sister, Grace Schoeni and Max GeBauer, are both doing Red Cross work in the same area in the south seas and that GeBauer was appearing in a play which Miss Schoeni was planning for entertainment of troops in the area. Lt. (jg) Schoeni is on the staff of the "Naval Aviation News" and works in Washington, Chicago and New York.

John Ysunza, who is somewhere in the south Pacific with a medical unit, writes that he has been promoted to sergeant. Cpl. Roy L. Huseon, who has been in New Guinea for many months, has been enjoying a stay in Australia and stated in a letter home that he had been

attending the horse races. His twin brother, Cpl. Ray M. Huseon, is still in the Hawaiian Islands where he has been for a considerable time. Dutch Lieber, who before going into the army was manager and pitcher for the Medford Craters is now stationed in England.

News of aviation students comes from all parts of the nation. Gene C. Rae has been assigned to Oklahoma Baptist university, Charles H. Herman, Jr. to Henderson State Teachers college in Arkansas, Jack Kreske to Ouachita college in Arkansas and Staff Sgt. Vincent Clafflin to Knox college in Illinois. Cloyd Porter has completed his course at Washington State college and is now at Santa Ana and Harper Hamilton, Jr., and Ralph Burgess have completed preliminary training at Shepard Field and have been sent to Texas Tech at Lubbock. Donald Herried completed primary at Dallas and then reported at Pensacola.

Barbara Inskeep is entering Stanford. Janice Pitts is going to school in Texas and Georgiann Wright to junior college in Sacramento. Returning to the university are Nanette Holmes, Lois Pringle, Patricia Farrell, Carol Tengwald, Julie Carpenter, Charlotte Older, Janet Ross and Oda Bailey. Anne Van Valzah is also entering the university this fall and Jeanne Smith goes to Portland for nurses training.

Schools opened Monday and registration figures show about the usual enrollment at grade and junior high school, and a slight decrease at senior high school. Since many students are still working, it was thought the enrollment would be about normal later. Tonight the football season opens with the Tornado meeting the Yreka team. Last week the Klamath Pelicans opened the season by defeating the Ashland Grizzlies 31 to 13 at Klamath Falls.

Recent visitors were Ensign and Mrs. Ted Gleason who were home briefly before going to Norfolk, Va., from where the ensign, a naval fighter pilot, will be assigned to active duty.

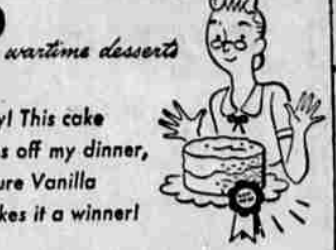
Upper Rogue Grange

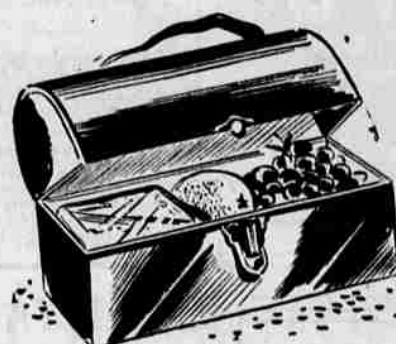
