\$7,950 ADDED TO BOND TOTAL WITH VICTORY AUCTION

Mr. and Mrs. Flynn's total purchases in bonds amounted to \$2,000 and in addition to the hose they received a baby blanket, a pair of rubber boots for Mr. Flynn and an angel food cake. Mrs. Hunt's purchase of the blanket was with \$1,800 in bonds, the two sums comprising a large share of the total purchases of \$7,950 at the sale. The articles for the bond auction were all donated by Charles Adair of the M M Department store.

Last night's program, arranged by Lloyd Rupp, opened with a parade and stirring military music furnished by the Camp White SCU band. At the Victory Center a large audience enthusiastically received numbers by Ray Shoemaker's dance orchestra, Sebastian Apollo's accordion band, dance numbers by Frank LaCross and Dorothy Hall, the latter having appeared in spite of a recent illness, Cpl. Bob Carrick, imitator, and Pfc. Joe Sozia monologue comedian. John Eby led community singing and whistling. The auction was conducted by A. H. MEXICO FREEZES WAGES AND FOOD

Mexico City, Sept. 24—(U.P.)—All wages of more than 70 pesos (\$2) a day will be frozen Oct. 1 for the duration of the war under an extraordinary decree signed by President Avila Camacho last night.

The decree granted wage increases of 5 to 50 per cent, however, for workers making less than 10 pesos a day.

The decree, designed to combat inflation, followed by only 24 hours another presidential decree freezing prices of foods and other necessities.

ROGUE MILL CREW PICKS BARGAINER

J. G. Wolf, district representative of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers union, A. F. of L., said today he had received official certification from the National Labor Relations Board establishing local number 2640 as exclusive bargaining agency for all employees involved of the Rogue River Lumber company of Rogue River.

The certification was received from Thomas P. Graham, Jr., regional director of the NLRB, 19th region, Seattle, Wash., Wolf said.

The NLRB, in a cross-check made by a field examiner of all employees of the lumber company, found that 21 out of 33 employees designated the union as the bargaining agent, the certification stated. The union had petitioned the NLRB to certify it as the exclusive bargaining agency.

LIVING COST DIPS 0.3% IN AUGUST

New York, Sept. 24—(U.P.)—The cost of living in the United States declined 0.3 per cent during August, as compared with July, but was 4.8 per cent higher than in August, 1942, and 19.5 per cent above January, 1941, the national industrial conference board reported today.

Living costs for wage earners and lower-salaried clerical workers declined in August in 48 of 69 industrial cities surveyed by the board, advanced in 18 cities, and were unchanged in three. The largest decline, 1.8 per cent, occurred in Flint, Mich. Bridgeport, Conn., reported the largest increase, 1.5 per cent. Living costs were higher this August than in August, 1942, in all the cities for which comparable figures were available.
