ERNIE WHITE MAY BECOME SURPRISE REDBIRD STARTER

**Card Southpaw Beats
Braves in First Complete
Job Since May 13.**

New York, Sept. 28.—(U.P.)—When Connie Mack started the supposedly decrepit Howard Ehmke for Philadelphia in the 1929 world series opener against the Chicago Cubs, he also started an annual guessing game.

Each year as the fall sociable approaches, there is an aura of speculation whether the rival managers are supposed to be grooming pitchers who are either getting social security benefits or have limp arms.

Ehmke, an old man as pitchers go, had been of little use that year and hadn't pitched in weeks so the baseball world was surprised when Mack put him in. He wasn't supposed to have a good game left in him, but he set an all-time series record by striking out 13 Cubs and winning 3 to 1.

Because of the Yankee's distaste for southpaw pitching, this year's speculation centers around Ernie White, Cardinal lefty, who shut out the New Yorkers last fall, but who since was supposed to have suffered a recurring injury to his arm. White was more or less of a surprise starter last fall, because he had won only seven games and didn't compare with some of the other Redbird pitching satellites.

Curve Right
Whether Manager Billy Southworth was giving White a series airing yesterday is something the Yankees probably would like to know, but he pitched his first complete game since May 13 and defeated the Boston Braves 6 to 3. He worked easily and though the Braves touched him for 10 hits, his curve was breaking right and at the finish he said his arm felt fine.

The Yanks, meanwhile, rolled on behind Hank Borowy, their sophomore star, who won his seventh straight, his 11th in 12 and his 14th for the year in defeating Cleveland 5 to 2.

Detroit put homers by Dick Wakeland and Paul Richards to good use in its 6 to 3 victory over Boston.

The Athletics and Browns divided a night doubleheader, the A's winning the first 9 to 4. The Browns rallied late to win 7 to 6 in the second game.

The White Sox defeated Washington 2 to 1 twice.

Ace Adams of the Giants set a modern major league pitching record by appearing in his 67th game. The durable relief hurler started against the Cubs who batted him out in the fifth and went on to win 10 to 9 in the 13th on Bill Nicholson's homer. Ed Walsh, old White Sox work horse, had held the record of 66 games since 1903.

The Cincinnati Reds increased their second place lead over the Brooklyn Dodgers to 3½ games by beating Philadelphia 3 to 2.

Brooklyn and Pittsburgh were not scheduled.

Yankees Will Divide Series Cash 47 Ways; \$500 to Servicemen

New York, Sept. 28.—(U.P.)—The New York Yankees today voted to split their share of the world series money into 47 shares, 32 of which were full divisions.

The 25 ball players each receive a full share, as does Manager Joe McCarthy, Coaches Art Fletcher, Earle Coombs and John Schulte, the batting practice pitcher, Paul Schreiber, Traveling Secretary Rex Wyeant and Club Trainer Ed Froelich.

The Yanks also voted \$500 apiece to players who were with the club last year but are now with the armed services. They included Joe DiMaggio, Red Ruffing, Phil Rizzuto, Buddy Bassett, Tommy Henrich, George Selkirk and Norman Branch.

The groundkeepers were voted \$1500 and a like sum was awarded to the club housekeeper with \$750 going to his assistant. Bat Boy Pat O'Dougherty was allotted another \$750 and Art Roth, former traveling secretary, who has been ill this season, will receive \$500.

In addition to the voted shares, the Yankees collected \$320 for the clubhouse gatekeepers.

SEALS NOSE OUT SEATTLE FOR CUP

San Francisco, Sept. 28.—(U.P.)—The San Francisco Seals, second place to Los Angeles in the Pacific Coast league regular pennant race, held the President's Cup today by virtue of a four-out-of-six game victory over Seattle, third place team.

The Seals won the Shaughnessy playoff cup yesterday, licking the Rainiers, 5 to 4. Seattle went to the finals by defeating Los Angeles, the league champions, four straight games.

10 MEN INVOLVED IN A'S SHAKEUP; CONNIE REBUILDS

Philadelphia, Sept. 28.—(U.P.)—Connie Mack, the 80-year-old owner of the Philadelphia Athletics, who never gives up hope, began rebuilding his last place team today for his 43rd season in the American league next year.

In a shakeup involving 10 players and four minor league clubs, he obtained two pitching prospects, Norman Brown, a 19-game winner with Louisville and Luke (Hot Potato) Hamlin, big league veteran, who won 20 games and pitched five shutouts with Toronto this year. He got Joe Moore, former New York Giant outfielder from Indianapolis, and purchased three rookies, George Kell, a .410 batter and third baseman, Louis Flick, outfielder, who hit .400 and Norman Wheaton, utility player from Lancaster, Pa., of the Interstate league.

The players he surrendered in the trades were Roberto Estalela, outfielder, to Indianapolis, Johnny Welaj, infielder and Eddie Mayo, outfielder, to Louisville, and Orrie Arntzen, pitcher, for Hamlin.

The amount of cash involved in the transactions was not revealed.

Whitlow Wyatt Out Of Action for Time

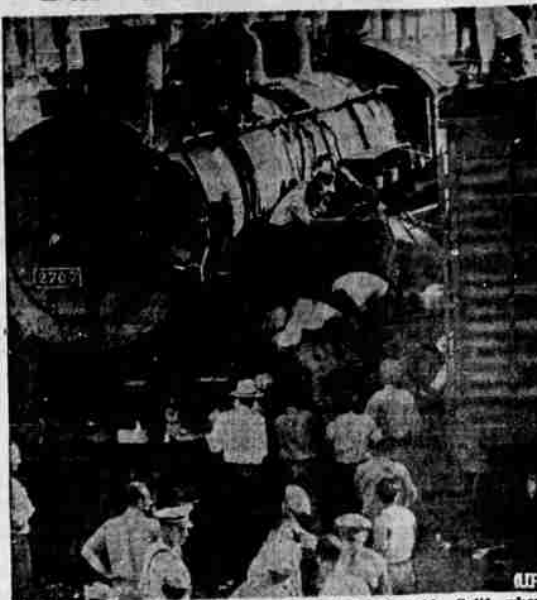

CARDINALS SIGN BILL SOUTHWORTH

St. Louis, Sept. 28.—(U.P.)—Manager Billy Southworth, whose St. Louis Cardinals have won two pennants, finished second and third in his four years at the helm, will lead the team again in 1944.

President Sam Breadon announced last night that he had retained Southworth for another year in "one of the most pleasant transactions" to which he had ever been a party. He did not reveal the terms of the contract.

Southworth took over the Cards in June, 1940, when they were in seventh place. They finished third that year, second in '41, first last year when they won the world series from the Yankees, and first again this year.
