Don't Be a Sap!

Let us imagine that Henry Ford should visit Medford and among other things offer to sell \$100 bills for \$97.50 cash.

Would anyone who could scrape up the \$97.50 miss the golden opportunity of making a profit like that?

And knowing Henry Ford there would be no suspicion of the century note being counterfeit.

WELL with only slight modifications, that is what Uncle Sam is offering the People of Medford in this 3d war loan drive.

A war bond is precisely the same as cash. It has the same backing as a greenback of the same denomination has. When you buy war bonds you are buying money.

Only the bond has this added value. If you put the \$100 bill in your safety deposit box, and leave it there a year, you can be sure to have it 12 months hence. But that is all you will have.

Put the \$100 bond there and you will have not only the \$100 bond but \$2.50 in addition.

YES we are a trifle tired of hearing how patriotic and self sacrificing this war-bond buying is. The patriotic part of it is ok,—for this bond money IS essential to success on the fighting front, an investment in the safety and security and well being of the present and future generations of this country.

But self sacrifice,—NO!
There is no more self sacrifice involved than putting money in the bank.

This bond buying isn't a duty, it is a privilege. The more the individual or the company can put into war bonds the better off that individual or company is going to be.

AS the drive nears an end, we think this fact should be more strongly emphasized.

Not only are these war bonds a good investment, they are all in all the SAFEST and BEST INVESTMENT that any one could make in the present condition of the country and the world. The individual with idle money to invest who fails therefore to buy all he can of these war bonds isn't half as much a slacker as a SAP!

Plenty of Money?

Speaking of money, there are some bright spots in the current government fiscal report, compared with a year ago.

In the last 12 months for example Uncle Sam has spent a little over 11 billions for war. In the preceding 12 months the total for war was \$13,769,139,386.

Federal receipts for the same two periods show a startling improvement; i.e: the past 12 months over 9 billion, the preceding 12 months less than 4!

The respective cash balances, however, are sensational. The past year shows a cash balance as of this date of \$15,748,495,645! On the same date last year the cash balance was less than 3 billion,—\$2,656,124,913 to be exact.

The "working balances" stack up to approximately 15 billion for the present date, to only \$1,893,645,770 of a year ago.

THESE are the government's official figures through September 24 as announced by the United Press.

We admit we don't know exactly what they mean in the learned jargon of high finance but even from the standpoint of Robert Benchley's treasurer's report they certainly show a condition of robust monetary health!

Planning for Youth

WITH America's mounting might sweeping down upon the Axis foes and the "ultimate triumph" reasonably assured, post-war planning is receiving more and more attention from confident and foresighted people. Much study is being given to America's future, economically and politically, and rightly so. But post-war planning will fall woefully short of its goal UNLESS considered thought and practical action are taken to develop morally, mentally and physically the nation's greatest resource —its youth.

Many mental and physical short-comings of young American manhood were brought to light in the selective service. Had this nation, with its boasted social advancements and industrial attainments, paid greater attention to its youth after the last war there would be far fewer rejections for military service today and many manpower problems in this great emergency would be solved.

THE need for strengthening the moral fibre of boys and girls is increasingly apparent today. The increase in juvenile delinquency since Pearl Harbor has been alarming. Those who have read the reports of the FBI in recent months cannot help but be shocked. Recent disruptions in the economic and social status of the population in many cities and the resultant increased congestion are obvious factors. Youthful criminals and zoot-suit juveniles are a product of the times.

AND so, public recognition of the youth problem is urgently needed. Here is a challenge to the schools and churches of tomorrow—a challenge that will call for the greatest of wisdom and energy. Full support and encouragement must be assured them in farsighted post-war planning. HG

RELAXATION IS A NATURAL FAULT

On the basis of the copies that have come to this column in the past five years, I estimate that a ten-foot book shelf would not hold the weird new books about health that are published in America in that period. Only a few of them are by physicians. More are by near doctors or queer doctors — persons who assume the title of "doctor."

A notable characteristic of most of these freak books is that they sell like hot cakes for a season or until the credulous market is saturated, and then they pass into desuetude.

Many of them deal with nervousness, nervous weakness, neurasthenia, brain lag, nerve strain, how to control your nerves, how to relax.

Since the heyday of the "rest cure" and the private sanitarium the idea of relaxation has become fixed in the consciousness of the laity and it has been accepted by some physicians as a desirable or essential thing for "nervous" people. If the doctor doesn't advise it, relatives or friends of the patient are likely to advise that "you must relax," implying that relaxation counteracts the great tension, strain or high pressure of your social, domestic, business or professional cares and responsibilities. Underlying this naive notion is the flattering suggestion that a person of your importance or position necessarily has to expend an enormous amount of nervous energy and all that malarkey.

What most Yankee neurotics sorely need to keep them balanced is not relaxation nor rest, but work, play, exercise. It would be a boon to the welfare of our people if some health police could be stationed at the turnstiles or entrances to the baseball diamond, the football field, the boxing stadium, the race track, and require everyone to show evidence that he or she has done a reasonable amount of honest work, taken a reasonable amount of exercise or played a reasonable amount of

golf, tennis, one old cat, horse-shoes, quoits, croquet, bowls, whatever game or games one likes, in the course of the week, as a requisite for admission to the show.

Most of the people who look on while others play the game or take the exercise or do the work should, for the good of their health, play the game, or some game themselves. Neurotics get that way largely by taking their exercise and getting their thrills or excitement or diversion vicariously, playing the game in the imagination, like children crouched by the radio vicariously playing cops and robbers.

Relaxation my eye. Come on, try a little oxygen on the hoof if you're too stiff or timid to get into a more absorbing game.

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

Anemia

Because I am so anemic I have been advised to take a spoonful of molasses every night before going to bed.

Answer—Molasses contains iron, though not as much as dried beans, for example, nor as much as the yolk of an egg, weight for weight. Any one of these items supplies the body's daily requirement of iron (about 1/4 grain):
Prunes, 4 oz. Egg yolk, 3 oz.
Peas, 4 oz. Peanut, 2 oz.
Lettuce, 2 oz. Raisins, 1 1/2 oz.
Cantaloe, 2 1/2 oz. Lean beef, 4 oz.

However, the job may not be as big as the title, as strategy has been decided. Generals McNair and McNarney are both what might be called old army men, while General Somervell was out of the army for some time, particularly while he was in WPA work in New York, and is a friend of Harry Hopkins, the president's right-hand man.

The choice of Somervell would be interpreted as an effort by Mr. Roosevelt to put his own man in charge there, and would not be popular with congress where Hopkins' friends do not have many friends, or at least a majority of them right now.

But, in view of all the factors involved, the course of events had indicated much speculation has gone awry, also that the president has not made up his mind what to do when the unofficial announcements were made in the press, or last Friday when the official announcement was due.

V.F.W. CHIEF ASKS ADDED BENEFITS FOR SERVICEMEN

New York, Sept. 28.—(U.P.)—A postwar veterans' welfare program expanding the proposals recently made by President Roosevelt for returning servicemen was advocated today by Robert T. Merrill, of Havre, Mont., commander-in-chief of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, at the opening of a three-day national convention.

Asserting that the benefits proposed by the president were "good as far as they go but they don't go far enough," Merrill submitted for convention approval a 10-point program.

The program included: Continuation of pay for six months of all honorably discharged; federal aid for those whose education was interrupted; government hospital care and treatment; pensions and compensation payments fixed on cost-of-living preference on all government employment; 10 per cent of employees on federal contract supply and construction work to be veterans; pension entitlement to widows and orphans, regardless of service-connected disabilities; pension entitlement to veterans "who are unemployed, unable to obtain employment, or 10 per cent or more disabled;" increased pension allowance of 20 per cent for those who served in combat zones, and continuation of the veterans' administration as an independent federal agency with exclusive jurisdiction over the returned soldiers.

The latter point was believed directed against a reported move in Washington to give the Social Security board control of veterans' welfare machinery.

NEWSPRINT CUT ORDERED BY WPB

Washington, Sept. 28.—(U.P.)—The War Production Board today ordered an additional five per cent cut in the allowable use of newsprint during the fourth quarter of 1943.

The reduction, which will be superimposed on the previous five per cent third quarter cut, had been expected. WPB Chairman Donald M. Nelson forecast it last week in a letter to the congressional committee investigating the newsprint shortage.

It was recommended by the newspaper industry advisory committee.

INVESTIGATE CRASH

Tallahassee, Fla., Sept. 28.—(U.P.)—An investigation of the crash of a B-25 bomber from the Greenville, S. C., army air base two miles west of Dale Mabry field here Sunday, which killed seven men, was continued today by army officials.

DRESS SLASHING HEARING DELAYED

M. J. Leach, charged with wanton and malicious destruction of personal property, asked for further time to waive or demand a hearing in justice court today and was granted until tomorrow afternoon. He is at liberty on \$500 bonds. Leach has the barbershop concession at Camp White.

The complaint alleges Leach, in a fit of temper, slashed with a knife wearing apparel of various kinds belonging to Thelma Lee, a soldier's wife.

Marley Henry Anders, charged with operating an auto while under the influence of intoxicating liquor, entered a plea of not guilty and hearing was set for tomorrow afternoon.

Eugene W. Anderson of Trail paid \$1.50 and costs for having no operator's license; Donald Hemmingsen, Rt. 2, Grants Pass, cited for driving with four in the front seat, and Earl Henry Hanscom, Eagle Point, charged with having no registration card, were scheduled to appear today.

FOURTH DELAY IS GRANTED FOULKES

Albany, Ore., Sept. 28.—(U.P.)—Robert E. Lee Foulkes, convicted of the murder of Mrs. Richard James, today was in possession of a fourth continuation, granted by Judge L. G. Lewelling.

The extra time, until Nov. 10, was asked by Defense Attorney Lomax because the court reporters were unable to complete the transcript of the testimony, required by the supreme court before it can pass on the appeal.
