

PLANE INDUSTRY REQUIRES HEAVY LABOR ADDITION

1,700,000 More Needed By
Next Spring If Present
1944 Production Be Met.

Washington, Sept. 30.—(AP)—John Lee, manager of the West Coast Air Production Council, said today that at the present turnover rate it would be necessary to recruit 1,700,000 workers for the aircraft industry by next spring if stepped-up 1944 production schedules are to be met.

Lee said that 2,000,000 workers are now employed in the aircraft industry and that between 400,000 and 500,000 additional workers must be added to meet the 50 per cent dollar volume increase over 1943 aircraft output called for by the armed forces. Because of labor turnover this means more than 1,700,000 workers must be found altogether, he said.

No. 1 Problem

He gave his estimates at a news conference of 15 leading aircraft company executives, attending a meeting here of the National Aircraft War Production Council on manpower problems.

The aircraft officials agreed that manpower is the industry's number one problem. T. Claude Ryan, president of the Ryan Aeronautical Co., said, "Frankly, unless specific steps are taken that goal (for 1944 production) cannot be made."

P. G. Johnson, president of Boeing Aircraft Co., said that it may be necessary to break down some integrated aircraft plants and move some assembly work to areas where manpower is available. There must also be an increase in the employment of women, he said, and recruitment must go beyond the area in which plants are located.

PROSPECT PAIR PAY \$75 EACH IN DEER POACHING

Calvin Clayton and Carl Stockford, Prospect district millworkers, each charged with possession of venison out of season, paid fines of \$75 and costs in justice court yesterday through their wives. Each had served one day of the 30 days sentence imposed upon them, and the balance of the sentence was suspended pending good behavior. The meat is in cold storage and will be turned over to the county farm.

Clayton and Stockford, earlier in the week, journeyed into the Red Bluff district near Prospect, after a load of wood. They shot a four-point buck, quartered and sacked the game and placed it under the load of wood, according to testimony presented to Justice of the Peace W. R. Coleman.

They then remained in the woods until near midnight, and on their way home were stopped by a state police game warden at a road junction. The arrest followed. The game warden was looking for spotlight hunters reported by cattlemen as active in the area for several weeks. Each defendant denied spotlight hunting and said they killed the deer for fresh meat. With seven children in their two families, both said they had plenty of ration points.

Herman Brothers, employers of the men, in a letter to county officials asked leniency for the pair on the grounds they were essential defense workers. They further stated they did not condone violations of the game laws and ordinarily would not ask any consideration.

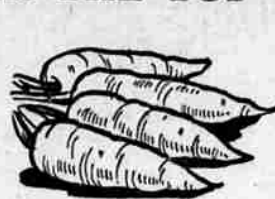

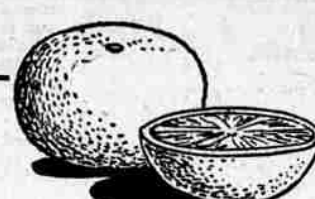

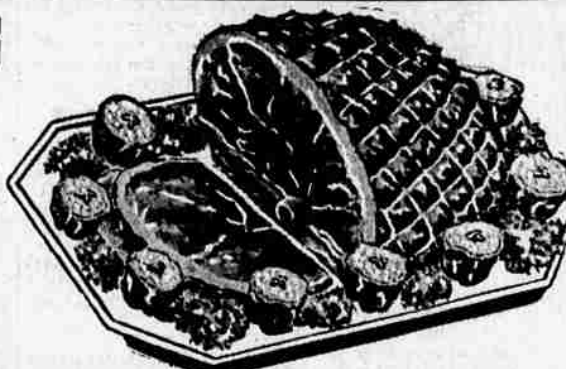
