TORNADO-PIRATE
BATTLE TONIGHT
VITAL IN SECTOR

Loser to Drop District Prestige—High Bond Buyer to Receive Football.

Physically in fair condition, but of "doubtful mental attitude," Medford high's Black Tornado clashes with the Marshfield high Pirates at the stadium tonight in a game that packs plenty of significance in the determination of sectional champions who, at the tail end of the season, will engage in playoffs for the official Oregon high school grid diadem. The contest will start immediately following the 8:01 flag-raising ceremonies.

With the state split into four districts, and Medford and Marshfield both placed in the southern Oregon sector, the loser of tonight's battle will be virtually eliminated from title consideration. The tussle is vitally important.

Visitors Untested
The Pirates, undefeated last season and co-champions of the mythical state championship, will throw a 170-pound aggregation sparked by three lettermen against the Tornado. Coach Walter Commons, who with his charges arrived here last night, said the club employs a single wing and unbalanced line on offense, without a shift and also uses a double wing occasionally. This is the first game of the season for the Pirates.

Two of Marshfield's three returning monogram winners will see action in the backfield. Moore at quarterback and Hoffman at fullback. Clark, left tackle, is the other veteran of the 1942 machine that blanked the Tornado, 13 to 0.

As for the Tigers, Coach Lorne Arnold said their physical condition was OK but that he was worried about their mental attitude, a condition brought about by extra-curricular activities in the form of sophomore initiation week which ended yesterday. Arnold is afraid they haven't given enough thought to football, and will be "down" when play starts.

Practice sessions the past week have been devoted mainly to polishing up the seven plays used in defeating Yreka, 33 to 14, last Friday; adding several new aerial maneuvers to their repertoire and laboring on pass defense. The mentor said he hoped the latter phase had been improved.

The same lineup which opened against Yreka will start tonight, although Doug Plumley, with a couple of ailing legs, may yield a great share of the fullbacking to Sophomores Jerry Clark and Darrell Riggs. Plumley scored two touchdowns against Yreka, in his first game of high school football.

Eureka Slated
Arnold announced that Eureka, whom the Tornado plays next Friday at Eureka, would come here for a return game October 29, thus increasing to four the number of Medford home tilts after tonight.

Of special interest to fans will be the auction tonight between halves of the football to be used during the game. It will be autographed by players and coaches of both teams, and the officials, and will be presented after the game to the person purchasing the largest war bond. E. C. Jerome will act as auctioneer and the school's History-Economics-Clivics association, which sold \$1,900 worth of war bonds yesterday, will handle the football bond sale at the north end of the grandstand.

Also to be auctioned off at halftime are two pair of reserved seat season tickets for the remaining Tornado home games.

Homecoming Wrecked When
Schools Abandon Football

Portland, Ore., Oct. 1.—(U.P.)—It's evident from the flippant way the Pacific Coast conference schools shrugged off their football responsibilities that nobody gave a thought to the true consequences of that heartless act.

It's all very well to smile over the blow to glorious tradition, even to grin a little over the unemployment problem confronting graduate managers.

But what about homecoming? You have to have a homecoming day game. You can't get the old grad back just to eat a free meal, to meet some of the pledges and maybe pay a little on that back house bill. The great institution of higher education has been attacked at the soft underbelly.

Let the million-dollar stadia crumble from disuse, join the Parthenon and Colosseum and other ruins of antiquity. They are but the externals of culture and civilization. The very soul of modern learning dwells in the homecoming day celebration.

With all respect to wartime limitations, that game must be played. And it's up to the old grads to play it. It may have to be an oral contest, the opposing teams composed of members of the armchair quarterback clubs—football's staunchest friends and severest critics.

This struggle of vocal gladiators will be staged in the biggest hall on the campus, and members of debate teams will act as head linesman, referee and field judge. Eligibility rules will be simple, the squads limited to pre-Versailles fathers.

Strict training will be enforced. There's to be no drinking, at least after the game, and any team guilty of drunken hollering will be penalized 15 yards. There'll be a limit on replacements for hoarseness.

Space will be set aside in the auditorium for roster sections, and they will give their yells in deaf-and-dumb language so as not to interfere with the plays.

More than the school's honor will be at stake. This contest will determine, officially, whether those old grads can really talk as good a game as they used to play.

Then, after the game, the victorious side can rush out of the auditorium, down to the week-encumbered football field and tear down the goal posts.

WHISKY FOR ALL
PLAN LAUNCHED
FOR OREGONIANS

Portland, Ore., Oct. 1.—(U.P.)—Oregon's new "whisky for all" program was launched today with the promise that Oregonians no longer will be forced to stampede to liquor stores to get their monthly quotas.

The new program requires liquor permit holders to validate their new quantity permits by presenting their war ration book No. 3. Service men who are without ration books, must show identifications when making liquor purchases.

Each permit holder will be guaranteed a monthly quota of one quart or fifth of whisky and one quart or fifth of rum, gin or brandy. The liquors will be available at all times the stores are open, eliminating the rush lines at noon and 5 p. m.
