

MICHIGAN DOWNS NORTHWESTERN 11 IN BIG 10 GAME

Evanston, Ill., Oct. 2.—(U.P.)—Bangin' Bill Daley, a service transfer from Minnesota, had a track man's field day as he helped mighty Michigan roll over Northwestern today, 21 to 7, for the Wolverine's first victory in their campaign for the 1943 Western conference title.

The big fullback ran 64 and 37 yards for touchdowns and set up the third Michigan counter by Elroy Hirsch, formerly of Wisconsin, with a 20-yard sprint to Northwestern's three-yard line. He bucked through center and slashed the tackles repeatedly for gains and was stopped only when tackled by two or more Wildcats.

Coach Fritz Crisler's powerhouse started the game as if it planned a top-heavy triumph. Capitalizing on a Northwestern fumble, Daley sprinted, spun and rammed 37 yards to the goal on the first Michigan play of the game. He fumbled when hit on the goal and center. Negus felt on the ball in the end zone, but Daley had crossed the line and the touchdown was credited to him.

A mighty quick kick by Hirsch gave Michigan a 38-yard advantage in an exchange with Frickey of Northwestern and in three plays, Michigan had scored again. Daley got 20 and five through the tackles and Hirsch wriggled over.

TROJANS VICTORS OVER BEARS, 7-0

Berkeley, Calif., Oct. 2.—(U.P.)—Southern California's power-laden squad of marine and naval trainees settled Pacific Coast conference football supremacy temporarily before 55,000 today by defeating the University of California, 7 to 0.

Outplaying their opponents all the way, Coach Jeff Cravath's Trojans from Los Angeles rang up the only point in the afternoon after the first quarter drive from the California 41 with Left Halfback Howard Callanan going over standing up from the seven-yard line.

Dick Tamison converted from placement and the rest of the game found Southern California battling on the defensive, time after time repulsing California's drives.

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BASEBALL JAUNT TO PACIFIC WAR AREA POSTPONED

Washington, Oct. 2.—(U.P.)—The on-again, off-again tour of two all-star baseball teams through the south Pacific was off again tonight.

Mounting transportation needs of the armed forces in the Pacific necessitated cancellation for the time being, at least—of the proposed tour, Maj. Gen. Alexander D. Sures, director of the War Department Bureau of Public Relations, said in a telegram to Baseball Commissioner Kenesaw M. Landis.

There was no other explanation of the situation since the War department formally okayed the trip only two weeks ago. Some military experts guessed that big military movements were impending in the Pacific. Some others, noting that the trip would have involved about 40 persons, expressed a cynical belief that there must have been something else behind the sudden change in plans.

There appeared to be a vague possibility that the tour might be made later in the winter. But it appeared to be exactly that—a vague possibility.

Plans for the trip were announced two weeks ago, after several weeks of conflicting rumors—first that there would be a tour by all-star teams of the Mediterranean, then that there wouldn't be one, and so on.

The teams actually were chosen and announced this week by the presidents of the two major leagues.

MOTHER AWAITING BABE IN CHAPLIN PATERNITY SUIT

Hollywood, Oct. 2.—(U.P.)—The anguished father pacing the corridor was conspicuous by his absence late today in South Van Ness hospital as red-haired Joan Barry went into the delivery room to give birth to a child she claims is Charlie Chaplin's.

The child, who already has been christened for legal purposes as "John Doe Chaplin"—and who may have to have the name changed to Jane—was expected before morning, with physicians for both Miss Barry and the white-thatched Chaplin standing by.

Four months hence these doctors, plus a third to be selected by them, will give the infant a blood test, which can prove either that Chaplin could not possibly be the father, or that he might be. In the latter event the 23-year-old Miss Barry's paternity suit probably will go to court, to the chagrin of numerous movie big-wigs who have been ticketed as witnesses.

The multi-millionaire British comic married 18-year-old Oona O'Neill last June, as soon as he'd made a temporary settlement with Miss Barry to support her until the child was born. His attorneys have denied indignantly reports that the daughter of the playwright, Eugene O'Neill, also is an expectant mother.

The Misses Barry and O'Neill both were dramatic proteges of the much-married Chaplin. Miss O'Neill said her relations with him were "strictly esoteric." Miss Barry said she didn't know what the word meant. She said all she knew was that she consented to illicit relationships with the man with the pasted-on mustache when he promised to marry her.

SOUTH DAKOTA IS MYSTERY WARSHIP OF PACIFIC WAR

Washington, Oct. 2.—(U.P.)—The navy today lifted the lid on one of the war's long-standing mysteries by officially identifying the U. S. S. South Dakota as the famed "Battleship X" which shot down 32 Japanese planes in a single South Pacific engagement and in another encounter sent three enemy cruisers to the bottom.

The navy explained that it had heretofore withheld the identity of "Battleship X" because the South Dakota, a 35,000-ton ship, was of a new class of battleship bearing heavier fire power than older ships. It said it did not want to confirm any information the enemy might have about the new class of ship.

Skipper of the South Dakota when it gained such fame last fall and winter was then—Capt. Thomas L. Gatch, who now is a rear admiral and judge advocate general of the navy.

REGISTRY SET FOR RATION BOOK NO. 4

Portland — (Sp) — Registration for war ration book four will begin October 26 in the Portland OPA district and will last for four days, Richard G. Montgomery, district director, has announced. The new book,

designed to last for at least 96 weeks, will be distributed through the schools, details and registration sites to be announced later.

Montgomery explained that there was not enough time between the mailing of book three and the date when book four will be used to organize the necessary facilities to handle applications by mail.

The new book combines point and unit stamps. It has eight pages containing a total of 384 stamps, printed on safety paper in blue, red, green and black inks. In order to make the book last longer, it was necessary to reduce size of the stamps to the same small size which first appeared in war ration book 3, Montgomery explained.

At the time of registration, it will be necessary to present war ration book three in order to obtain book four, he added.

NO LIMITATIONS ON TRIAL PEARL HARBOR LEADERS

Washington, Oct. 2.—(U.P.)—The war and navy departments announced today that Rear Admiral Husband E. Kimmel and Maj. Gen. Walter Campbell Short, commanders at Pearl Harbor at the time of the Japanese sneak attack, have waived any limitations in the articles of war which might have kept them from coming to court-martial trial after next Dec. 7.

One section of the articles governing the army and navy had been interpreted as possibly ruling out the holding of a trial more than two years after alleged commission of the offenses charged.

Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson and Secretary of Navy Frank Knox said that the waiver would stand for the duration of the war and six months thereafter. The secretaries announced that the trials would not be held, therefore, "until such time in the future as may be decided upon as being appropriate."
