A graduation service for a first-aid class of Precinct 38 was held last Thursday evening at Lillie's cafe. Members of the class were Mr. and Mrs. James R. Mr. Eby opened the program with a Red Cross first aid talking picture loaned by Leonard Mayfield of the senior high school and shown by a student, Nat Bender. J. B. Meehan, first aid instructor, also spoke and demonstrated use of a stretcher designed and patented by himself and Claud G. Haggard and which is manufactured in Medford. With the aid of a volunteer "patient", Mr. Meehan showed how an injured person can be loaded into a coupe.

The patient can be so securely fastened with this type of stretcher that the stretcher can be turned completely over without endangering the patient. The stretcher is of wood, is collapsible and can be carried in the trunk of any car.

Mr. Haggard described the proper use of all the 24 component units of a first aid kit.
