

MRS. WINNINGHAM PIONEER WOMAN, TAKEN BY DEATH

Mrs. Martha M. Winningham, 83, passed away in Jacksonville Monday evening. She had been ill but a short time.

She was born on Forrest Creek, June 15, 1860. In 1876 in Jacksonville she was united in marriage to Mark Watkins. Two years later they followed the pack trail into the Applegate, where she spent the rest of her life. Mr. Watkins passed away in 1900 and was laid to rest in the Jacksonville cemetery.

Three children survive this marriage, Mrs. Pearl Stephenson, Butte Falls; Mrs. Mamie Winningham, and Robert Watkins, Applegate.

On June 27, 1917, she was united in marriage to Mark Winningham, who also survives. There are also 12 grandchildren and 4 great-grandchildren. Three of her grandsons are in the armed forces.

Services will be held in the Conger chapel Thursday at 2:30 p. m., with the Rev. Louis C. Kirby officiating. Interment will be in Jacksonville cemetery.

JOHNSON TELLS HUNTING STORY

Ossie Johnson, 22, of the Eagle Point district, appeared yesterday before District Attorney George W. Neilson and gave his version of the hunting tragedy last Saturday in the Butler Butte country which cost the life of Charley Andrew Layton, 37, of Shady Cove. Other members of the hunting party verified Johnson's statements.

Before the fatal shot, Johnson and Layton had wounded a buck. Layton, while trailing the animal through the brush, was shot and killed.

District Attorney George W. Neilson quoted the widow as saying she desired no further legal action against Johnson, grief-stricken by the tragic error. She said the youth and her husband had been friends since Johnson was a little boy and each fall, the past five or six years, had gone hunting together, and a close attachment existed between the two men.

The coroner's office was advised that Layton, employed in logging operations by Charles Skeeter, was insured in the sum of \$4000. Skeeter recently took out insurance policies for all his employees, the district attorney said.

The Netherlands Aneta news agency reported that 19 persons, mostly students, have been executed by German occupation authorities in Amsterdam as reprisal for the slaying of several high Nazi officials.

The report, quoting an official communique sent the Stockholm Daily Social Demokraten, by its Berlin correspondent, said the men were put in death "in expiation" for the slayings of Lieut.-Gen. Hendrik A. Seyffardt, Dr. Folkert E. Posthuma, and other German occupation officials, as well as for a number of acts of sabotage upon railways in occupied Holland.

MAJOR DUNHAM AMONG INVADERS AT SALERNO

Major Don P. Dunham, a nephew of Mrs. George R. Carter of this city, and Wellborn Beeson of Talent, was in action in the American landing at Salerno, Italy, in mid-September. Major Beeson was born at Klamath Falls December 1, 1910.

His mother was the late Katie Beeson Dunham, well known member of the pioneer family. She spent her early life in this valley. Her father resides in Klamath Falls. Major Dunham was an officer of the paratroopers, and was educated at the Hill military academy at Portland.

CLEMENCY GIVEN YOUTHFUL COUPLE

Delbert W. Stover, 17, and wife, Marjorie Arlene Stover, 15, charged with theft of auto parts, waived a grand jury hearing before Circuit Judge Herbert K. Hanna yesterday, and each was granted a six months' suspended sentence, on pleas of guilty. Mrs. Stover was directed to report weekly to the district attorney. Her husband, recently discharged from the navy as "undesirable," under the suspended sentence must work and not associate with bad company.

Leonard Snodgrass, another juvenile, charged with larceny of livestock, was also granted a suspended sentence. The trio, all residents of Portland, were also charged with entering a closed forest area without a permit and were granted suspended sentences on that count also. 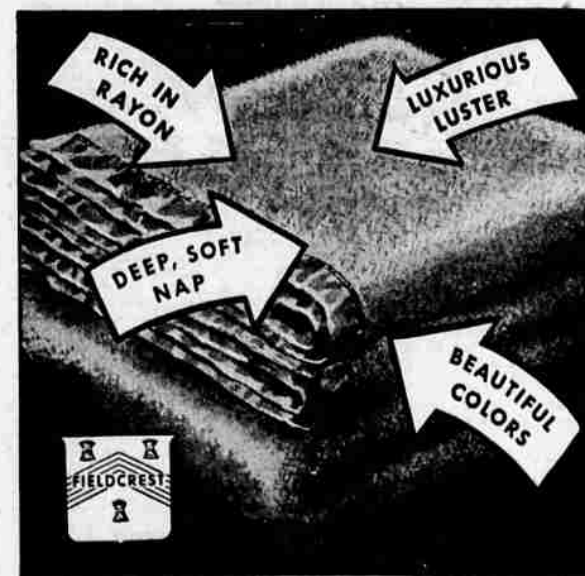
