CHEROKEE SEILER WILL SEEK SPARS IN MEDFORD AREA

Cherokee Seiler, seaman first class, will arrive in Medford tomorrow to recruit local girls for the SPARS, the women's division of the U. S. coast guard. She will make her headquarters in the Chamber of Commerce building, 123 W. Main street, and will be available for interviews at any hour by appointment.

Miss Seiler is a Medford girl who joined the SPARS and has been highly successful in her field. Born here in Medford, she attended the local schools, graduating from Medford high school in 1937. She then attended the Southern Oregon College of Education in Asland, and taught one year in Gardner and one year in the Howard school before enlisting in the SPARS in June, 1943. She was in the first group of SPAR recruits sent to the new training school at Palm Beach, Fla.

Miss Seiler is also the first Oregon SPAR to return to Oregon for active duty. Now serving as a recruiter, she will be in Medford for an indefinite stay, at least two weeks. Miss Seiler's parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Seiler, make their home at 635 N. Central avenue in this city.

TRIAL OPENS IN FILM EXTORTION

New York, Oct. 5.—(U.P.)—Trial of seven alleged Chicago racketeers and a Newark union representative for the extortion of \$1,000,000 from motion picture producers opened today in federal court under Judge John Bright, after the defendants complained that Judge John C. Knox had shown prejudice against them.

The defendants included Louis Compagna, Paul De Lucia, Philip D'Andrea, Frank Maritote, Charles Gioe, Ralph Pierce, their west coast representative, and John Roselli, former husband of Movie Actress June Lang. Louis Kaufman, business agent for the IATSE, Local 244, Newark, N. J., was being tried with them.

ROGUE RIVER MAN DIES OF INJURIES

William Edward Baker, 58, of Rogue River, who was struck by an automobile on the outskirts of Gold Hill at 9:30 p. m. Sunday, died in a local hospital shortly before 5:30 a. m. today. Peril's funeral parlor is in charge of arrangements.

Driver of the car, Harry J. Snyderman of San Francisco, was not held after he reported to state police that Baker was walking almost in the middle of the highway and that he was unable to swerve his car to avoid striking him.

Although suffering a broken right leg and cuts and bruises, it was at first believed the pedestrian was not critically injured. His death, according to District Attorney George W. Neilson, will lead to a further investigation of the accident and the matter will be presented to the county grand jury.
