BILL SOUTHWORTH
GAMBLE ON MORT
IS SUCCESSFULWalker Cooper Aids Brother
in Tying Series—Rookie
Brazle Today.

New York, Oct. 7.—(U.P.)—Billy-The-Kid Southworth, gambling fearlessly for world series gold and glory, completes today two of the most dramatic, quick-succession flurries in baseball history, as he sends Rookie Alpha Brazle to the mound.

Southworth won against the odds in story-book fashion yesterday when he risked the grief-stricken Cooper brothers as a battery to power his Cardinal machine against the Yanks in the classic's second game.

No one knew better than Southworth the chance he was taking when he permitted Mort and Walker Cooper to go out on the Yankee Stadium field before nearly 70,000 persons, just a few hours after the death of their father in Missouri. The percentage against Billy-The-Kid was increased by the fact that Pitcher Mort was recovering from a cold in his shoulder and by the widespread belief that he was allergic to American league batsmen who had humbled him on four previous occasions.

Billy Confident
But Southworth, confident of his judgment of men, took the big gamble and won, as the Cards defeated New York, 4-3, to even the series.

Today comes the other scenario-script venture when he sends to the hill Southpaw Brazle, a 29-year-old rookie with only a half-season of major league experience under his cap. This is a greater gamble than when Southworth, in last year's series with the Yanks, chose Rookie Johnny Beazley to pitch the second game. Beazley had been with the club a full season; he had won 21 and lost six for a percentage of .778, the best in the circuit. Beazley, now in service, won that game and the final fifth contest.

Brazle, a willowy left-hander who lives at Cortez, Colo., gained Southworth's confidence by his exceptional success since he shifted to the Cards from Sacramento of the Pacific Coast league in mid-July. His sidearm "heavy sinker" enabled him to register eight victories against two defeats. National league batsmen could do little with his sinker, except bounce it around the infield now and then—providing meat for speeds Slat Marion and Lou Klein.

Bob Frisbee, former Stanford player, and Joe Stuart, freshman who looked good against St. Mary's, both indicated in practice yesterday that they may be able to see action at left halfback against COP.

MINES OF COUNTY

Portland — (Sp.) — Jackson county metal mines are described in a new volume of Oregon Metal Mines Handbook just published by the state department of geology and mineral industries, Earl K. Nixon, director. This is the sixth volume of the Metal Mines Handbook series and is called Bulletin 14-C, Vol. II, Sec. 2. Preceding volumes have described mining properties in Baker, Grant, Union, Wallowa, Coos, Curry, Douglas and Josephine counties.

The Jackson county bulletin lists more than 400 mining properties. It contains 208 pages and an aerial map of southwestern Oregon, together with a separate colored overprint which may be used to outline the geologic formations of the county.

MUST REPORT ON
AUTO ACCIDENTS

Salem — (Sp.) — Oregon law requires reports on any traffic accident that involves personal injury, death or property damage in any amount. Secretary of State Bob Farrell said today in reminding drivers involved in accidents to file these reports within twenty-four hours.

There is no minimum property damage clause in the Oregon accident reporting law, as there is in some states, he said. Newcomers to Oregon sometimes think they are not required to report an accident in which the damage is \$25 or under, but the law in this state re-

quires the reporting of every accident, no matter how minor the damage.

Accidents which occur in urban areas must be reported to the police department. Accidents in rural areas must be reported

to the sheriff of the county in which they occur.

The army has fitted soldiers with shoes ranging in size from 2 1/4 to 18.

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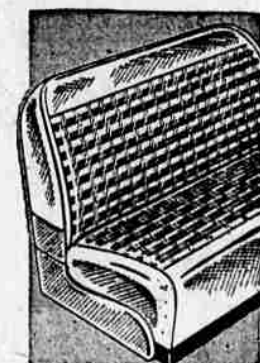
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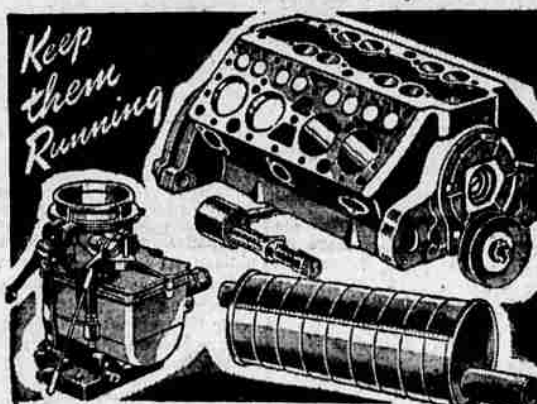

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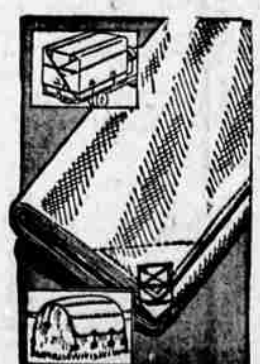
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
