CARDS, YANKEES
TRAVEL FOR 4TH
CONTEST SUNDAY

Odds Favor Yanks, Who
Have 2-1 Lead—Russo
May Face Cooper in Next.

En Route to St. Louis, Oct. 8.—(U.P.)—The St. Louis Cardinals, having lost the crucial third game to the world series to give the New York Yankees a two to one edge, hoped to ride their jitters away today.

Their backs to the wall, psychologically and actually, Manager Billy Southworth felt confident his boys would snap out of their fielding slump by the time they return to the familiar environs of Sportsman's park for the fourth game Sunday.

As the Redbird skipper tried to cheer his gloomy crew, the Yankees, determined to press their advantage, were in a jovial mood. Long noted as a team that will take advantage of every break, the Yanks did just that yesterday to win the game which in nine of the past 10 series has been taken by the club that went on to win the championship.

Manager Joe McCarthy admitted the Yankees received the breaks as they took advantage of the sloppy St. Louis play to rally for five runs in the eighth inning and turn a 2 to 1 deficit into a 6 to 2 advantage—which stood up. But he was sure that even if the Cardinals return to form his Yankees would carry through from now on with their batting power and pitching.

Make Own Breaks
"After all," he said, "we made the breaks. This isn't a pink tea party, you know."

If Billy the Kid can snap his Redbirds out of it, they still have a chance to make it two world championships. For the Cardinals are a dead game club. But the odds are against them.

McCarthy felt so confident that he said he probably would gamble on southpaw Marius Russo, who has been bothered all season with a lame arm, in Sunday's game, thus giving Spurgeon Chandler, who won the opening contest, an extra day's rest. But he added that he might change his mind and come back with Chandler, who had the lowest earned run average of any major league hurler this season.

STAGG'S ELEVEN
TO BATTLE BEARS

San Francisco, Oct. 8.—(U.P.)—The amazing Amos Alonzo Stagg, whose career proves that Ponce de Leon wasn't such a crackpot after all, brings his unbeaten College of Pacific Tigers into Berkeley tomorrow to face their first major test of the season with the still-dangerous Bears of California.

Rangy Johnny Podesto, whose bullet passes have blasted the hopes of three straight Pacific opponents, again will be Stagg's main offensive threat. Podesto will be flanked in the backfield by three of his former St. Mary's college teammates, all of whom are marine or naval students.

Pacific should be a 2 to 1 choice by kickoff time, with approximately 35,000 expected to be in the stands.

Three Games Highlight Play
In Collegiate Grid Circles

New York, Oct. 8.—(U.P.)—The best football program of the season tomorrow—sandwiched between world series baseball games—gives sports fans a quick transition from horsehide to hoghide and a chance to choose between perfect record teams in three feature games.

Although every section has at least one top notch contest, a quick coast to coast summary indicates that these three games bear most significantly on the national rating of top teams:

Notre Dame-Michigan at Ann Arbor, Mich.
Navy-Duke at Baltimore (night).

Pennsylvania-Dartmouth at Philadelphia.

The powerful Notre Dame eleven, which has shown more early season scoring potency than any Irish team since the days of Coach Knute Rockne, goes into the Michigan game a bare favorite. (About 6 to 5 man in the street odds). The difference in offensive strength probably represents the margin since Notre Dame has averaged 48 points in two games, while the Wolverines have averaged 35 in three.

Pennsylvania, because of strength in the backfield, rates 8 to 5 over Dartmouth, just now attaining the form expected of it.

The Navy, with its four-team manpower situation, is a 6 to 5 choice to beat Duke's Blue Devils, thus far unscathed upon. The Duke line may be hard put to stop the Navy's fast backs.

Army, considered the east's top team, is booked at 5 to 1 over Temple, while Yale is 8 to 5 over Columbia in other east headlines. Pittsburgh, though twice beaten, is listed at 7 to 5 to beat West Virginia, while Colgate, crushed by Army, is rated an 8 to 5 choice to bound back against Penn State. Cornell is 7 to 5 over Princeton.

The Midwest offers only one standout game, but most of the others are rated fairly even, though few of the teams have imposing records. Purdue is a 2 to 1 choice over Camp Grant, Indiana about 3 to 1 over Nebraska and Wisconsin 5 to 2 over Illinois. Other Midwest games, favorites first include Great Lakes-Ohio State, Iowa Pre-Flight-Iowa, Marquette-Lawrence and Iowa State-Kansas.

The annual classic of the range country between Oklahoma and Texas finds the teams about evenly matched, with some odds makers listing Texas a 6 to 5 favorite. Texas Aggies are 9 to 5 over Louisiana State in an inter-sectional game.

College of Pacific, unbeaten thus far, puts its record against well regarded California, and the Berkeley Bears are 7 to 5 favorites. In other western and Rocky Mountain games Southern California rates distinctly over St. Mary's Pre-Flight, UCLA over March Field, Colorado over Utah and Colorado College over Denver.

Yanks' Bill Johnson Hero
Thus Far—Kuroski of
Cardinals Has Bad Time.

New York, Oct. 8.—(U.P.)—Third base certainly has become the "hot corner" of the current World Series, with attention focused upon Rookie Billy Johnson of the Yanks and Whitey Kuroski of the Cards.

As the teams travel to St. Louis today, sandy-haired, moon-faced Johnson is being measured for a hero's laurel wreath; whereas blond Kuroski—the lad who wore the wreath after last year's classic—is the leading candidate for goat horns.

Johnson, a middle-sized chap of 25 from Montclair, N. J., tops the series batting with .417, after making five hits, driving in three runs and scoring three runs in 12 trips to the plate during the three games. Moreover he has fielded flawlessly.

Three-Run Triple
In yesterday's contest Billy stepped up to the plate, with the bases loaded, in the big eighth inning at Yankee stadium before the largest crowd in series history, and slammed the ball to deep left center for a triple that rang up three tallies. This blow won the game, although the New Yorkers triumphed, 6-2, in what many experts regard as the classic "crucial" contest.

Coincidentally, 25-year-old Kuroski of Reading, Pa., was a principal in setting the stage for Johnson's triple with his second error of the day. It worked out like this:

Johnny Lindell started the Yanks' eighth-inning rally with a single; he continued to second on Harry Walker's error. Snuffy Stirrweiss, a pinch-hitter, was safe at first on a fielder's choice when the Cards' first-sacker, Ray Sanders, tried to nail Lindell at third.

Kuroski received the throw alright; but he dropped the ball when big Lindell crashed into him in a desperate slide for the bag. The impact knocked the breath out of Kuroski and sent him sprawling. Umpire Beans Reardon ruled Lindell "safe."

30-Year Sentence
For German Spy

Rio De Janeiro, Oct. 8.—(U.P.)—Niels Christensen, the axis spy who radioed German submarines the date of the departure of the liner Queen Mary when she left Rio last march with about 10,000 men aboard, was sentenced today to 30 years in prison. Fourteen other defendants were sentenced to lesser terms.

JUGOS CAPTURE
2,135 GERMANS

London, Oct. 8.—(U.P.)—Jugoslav national liberation army headquarters reported today the capture of 2,135 axis troops, including one general and 30 officers, the killing of 500 enemy soldiers, and the capture of Livno and Kupres, 31 and 80 miles northeast of Split.

Coincidentally the free Jugoslav radio announced that American and British officers were at Partisan headquarters and "able to witness our deeds and know our claims are true."

"They will tell the world what we are doing," the radio said in broadcasting the first report of American officers being in Jugoslavia.

Expiration date of stamp No. 18 for one pair of shoes extended indefinitely beyond Oct. 31. "Airplane" stamp No. 1 in Book 3 good for one pair of shoes on Nov. 1; expiration indefinite.

FUEL OIL
Period 1 coupons in new ration books last through Jan. 1, 1944.

GASOLINE
Nov. 21—Stamp No. 8 good for four gallons gasoline per week expires at midnight.

TIRES

544 JAPS LOST
WHEN SUBMARINE
TORPEDOES SHIP

An Allied submarine—probably American—that slipped to the western side of Japan has sunk a passenger vessel between the mainland and Korea, with a possible loss of 544 lives, Tokyo radio said today.

The scene of the attack was little more than 500 miles off the China coast on the shipping line between Shimonoseki, on Honshu, the main island of Japan, and Fusan, Korean port 150 miles away.

The broadcast, recorded by U. S. monitors, located the sinking near Old Island, in Tushima strait, which lies at the south end of the Sea of Japan.

Tokyo said the sinking occurred Tuesday and that only 72 persons were known to have been saved of the 616 aboard the vessel, identified as the Kondon Maru of the Shimonoseki-Fusan line. A later broadcast called the vessel the "Konron Maru." Neither ship is listed in Lloyd's register.

BACON SHORTAGE
IS NEXT PROBLEM

Chicago, Oct. 8.—(U.P.)—Spokesmen for the meat industry warned householders today that their next food problem may be bringing home the bacon.

Civilian consumers may feel the effects of a temporary reduction in pork supplies "within the next few days," they said.

Meat packers said the shortage is artificial. Actually, they said, there is a record supply of hogs on midwestern feed lots.

But they are not being shipped to market because of the feed shortage, and because of the lowered price ceilings on live hogs which went into effect Monday. Farmers are unable to make a "reasonable profit" on their hogs because the cost of fattening the animals is high, packers said.

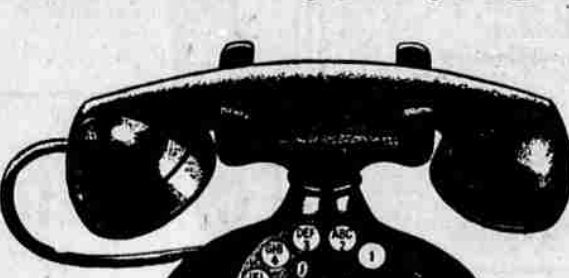
