

COMMUNITY CHEST SOURCE OF FUNDS FOR BOY SCOUTS

To inform the general citizenry concerning the organizations in Medford which will participate in Community Chest funds this coming year, a series of special articles is to be published on each agency within the next several days. The Community Chest drive is to start October 18, Monday, under direction of A. S. Cummins, chest board member.

First of the series, dealing with the Boy Scouts, is here presented.

"Boy Scouts have become a familiar part of the American scene. Throughout the country boys are active with war service projects and the training program of the Boy Scouts of America."

"Scouting is training for a way of life, the kind of life America chooses to lead, the kind for which her sons are fighting across the seas. On those fronts, and on the front at home, the qualities which Scouting stands for—courage and character, assure us of victory and a lasting peace."

"American needs Scout-trained men," says J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, who has long been interested in boys. "Many men in the F.B.I. were Scouts when they were boys," continues Mr. Hoover. "Resourcefulness, initiative and dependability are called for daily in their defense of the home front. These are the same qualities that account for the exceptional record former Scouts have made on the battle fronts around the world."

"The program of the Boy Scouts of America includes Cubbing, a home-centered activity for boys 9, 10 and 11 years of age, Boy Scouting for boys 12 years of age and over, and Senior Scouting for young men 15 years of age and over."

"The local organization is a part of the Crater Lake Area Council, and is a member agency of the Medford Community Chest. Cubbing, Scouting and Senior Scouting groups are sponsored by churches and community organizations in Medford, Jacksonville, Phoenix, and Central Point. Although there has been an increase locally of 42 per cent in boy membership during the past 12 months, plans are under way to extend the program to many more boys by means of an appeal to community groups. A special appeal is being made to men to serve as leaders and committeemen."

"Local leaders include J. A. McDougall, Medford district commissioner; Seth M. Bullis, chairman; Larry Schade, Crater Lake Area Council president; Charles B. Warner, executive, and Arnold K. Green, assistant executive."

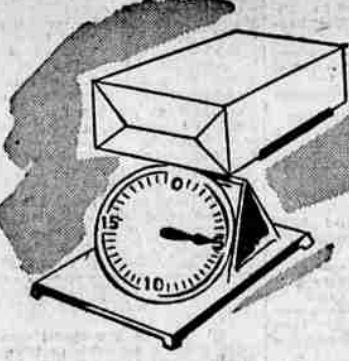

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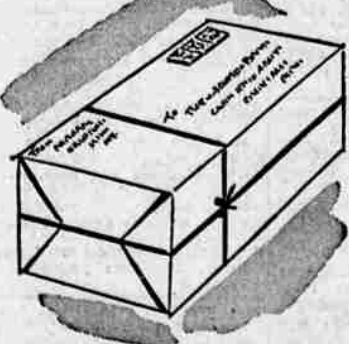


MAIL OVERSEAS GIFTS BEFORE OCTOBER 15th.

REGULATIONS

Packages weighing no more than five pounds will be accepted for mailing. These must be packed for shipping, addressed clearly and contain only non-perishable mailable matter.



Here Are Size
REGULATIONS

Parcels or packages must not exceed 15 inches in length, or 36 inches in length and girth combined. Make certain your package meets these postal regulations before you take it to your local postoffice.
