OREGON SITUATION MIGHTY STRANGE

Salem, Ore., Oct. 12 (U.P.)—John Kelly, head of the Oregon postwar development commission, today states in a letter to Rep. Homer Appell, R., Ore., that "it's mighty strange, but whenever a new industry is on the verge of locating itself in the Pacific northwest, influence at the nation's capital results in the industry going to a site in the east."

Kelly referred to recent objections of government officials to establishment of an aluminum reduction plant in the northwest. He said such a plant was needed in Oregon or Washington as a foundation for a permanent light-metal industry that could utilize the region's natural resources.

START MILK RATIONING IN WASHINGTON CITIES

Washington, Oct. 12 (U.P.)—The War Food administration today extended federal control over fluid milk sales to Seattle, Spokane and Tacoma, Wash., and to 147 New England towns and cities.

Under the program dealers will be limited in sales of fluid milk to the quantity sold during June. Sales of cream and milk by-products such as cottage cheese, chocolate milk and buttermilk will be limited to 75 per cent of June sales.
