ITALIAN RESULTS YET TO BE SEEN

Washington, Oct. 14.—(U.P.)—Italy's declaration of war on Germany may have a very important bearing on the progress of the war, but it is too soon to determine immediate results. Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson said today.

The bulk of the Italian navy, Stimson told a press conference, already had joined allied forces but the greater part of the Italian army is in areas dominated by the Germans.

"Many Italian military units have been taken prisoner by the Germans, a few are resisting the Germans and a few have joined the German forces," he said.

"The Italian civilians are co-operating in many ways. Sabotage has proved very annoying to the Germans."

ROBERT FLETCHER CHARTER MEMBER JAPAN BOMBERS

Cpl. Robert Q. Fletcher, 24, of Medford is one of four Oregon airmen who are charter members of the "I Bombed Japan club" according to a dispatch from Washington. The club has 156 charter members and membership is to be open to any American or allied airman who has bombed Japan, her islands or mandated territory.

Cpl. Fletcher, who returned to this country in September after several months in the Aleutian Islands, participated in 68 major air missions as turret gunner for a B-17, or Flying Fortress. In April he was awarded an air medal and later an oak leaf cluster for his activities during the raids. Now the corporal is at Las Vegas, Nev., instructing in aerial gunnery. Cpl. Fletcher, who has been in the army since March of 1942, was formerly a student at Medford high school.

He spent a month in Medford with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Fletcher, 25 Louis Ave., before reporting to Las Vegas. The three other Oregon members of the club are Maj. Robert E. SPAIN RECALLS BLUE DIVISION

London, Oct. 14.—(U.P.)—Reliable reports that Spain has withdrawn its "Blue Division" from the Russian front indicated to day that Germany has suffered its third defeat on the diplomatic front in three days.

The Blue division was sent to the eastern front in July, 1941, amid much fanfare hailing it as a symbol of Spain's solidarity with axis Europe against the "Bolshevist threat." Diplomatic sources believed its withdrawal would result in markedly improved Anglo-Spanish relations. Coincidentally, two Spanish diplomats, the Duke of Monteliano and Marquis Ardales, flew to London from Lisbon for what one authorized source said was a private visit to the Duke of Alba, Spanish ambassador to London.

CIVILIAN DEFENSE STREAMLINED FOR NEW CONDITIONS

Civilian defense will continue to operate in this area, but under a new streamlined plan which will be published in detail later according to Frank Hull, Jackson county coordinator of civilian defense who has returned home from a meeting in Salem early this week. He was accompanied by Sheriff Syd I. Brown, member of the defense executive committee.

Army officers at the Salem meeting emphasized that relaxing of certain regulations enforced for the past few months did not mean that civilian defense would cease to operate. Mr. Hull reports, but that in the future it would be adapted to meet changing conditions. He stated that army and state officials praised highly the work of civilian defense volunteers in the past.

Details of the new plan will be outlined to the county committee at a meeting next Monday.

POLIO EPIDEMIC NOW ON DECLINE

New York, Oct. 14.—(U.P.)—Two leading health authorities predicted last night that the epidemic of infantile paralysis, the worst in 12 years, had reached its peak throughout the nation and "is well on the decline."

The forecast was announced jointly in a radio broadcast by Dr. Thomas Parran, surgeon general of the U. S. public health service, and Basil O'Connor, president of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Parran said all indications pointed to the probability that the total this year will pass the 10,000-case mark, which would be four times higher than 1942.

CEILING ON TEQUILA

Washington, Oct. 14.—(U.P.)—Tequila, a Mexican-distilled liquor, was brought under price control in the United States today. The Office of Price Administration established a maximum base price of \$2.10 per proof gallon f. o. b. port of arrival, which will have the effect of stabilizing retail prices at about \$4.25 a fifth.
