SHIPS TO HONOR JACKSON COUNTY

Two tankers, now under construction at the Kaiser company shipyards in Portland, are to be named after historical places in this district. The boats are to be christened the S. S. Table Rock and the S. S. Jacksonville, according to information received by Frank Hull, manager of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce from Tommy Hoxie, public relations manager for the company. The two tankers are to be launched soon and citizens of this district will be asked to participate in the ceremonies, Mr. Hoxie states. Exact dates of the launchings will be announced later.

DRAFT BOARDS TO MARK THIRD YEAR OF SERVICE HERE

Members and office personnel of local Selective Service boards will tomorrow celebrate the third anniversary of their organization. The first registration of local men, aged 21 to 35 years, took place October 16, 1940, and since that time a total of 12,895, including those in the fourth registration, have been registered at the two boards. Board number I, covering Medford, has listed 4,580 registrants, while board number II, including all of Jackson county, exclusive of Medford, has registered 8,315 men. Those connected with the boards gathered this morning to celebrate the occasion a day early, festivities being complete with birthday cake and ice cream.

First located in the Farmers and Fruitgrowers Exchange building at the corner of Main and Grape streets, the offices were moved to the Liberty building in January of 1942. In October of the same year the offices were again moved, to the city hall where they are now located.

First board members, recommended by Governor Chas. Sprague of Oregon and appointed by President Roosevelt, were: Board number I, Guy Applewhite of Ashland; Frank Hull of Medford, and Henry Niedermeyer of Jacksonville; and board number II, O. O. Alenderfer, C. M. Hurd and Theo. A. Glass, all of Medford. Present members of board I are Guy Applewhite, chairman, H. H. Gillette of Ashland, and Henry Niedermeyer; and board II, Ernest Scott, chairman, Roy Pruitt, Diamond Flynn, Leon Haskins and Bill Hammett, all of Medford.

Clerk of board No. 1 is Mrs. Helen Razum, assisted by Mrs. Jean Brault; and clerk of board No. II is Mrs. O. O. Alenderfer, assisted by Mrs. Annice Wilson and Miss Helen Thompson.

PROJECT NEARS END

JOHNSTOWN, Pa. (U.P.)—The project to prevent recurrence of the damaging Conemaugh river floods of 1889 and 1936 has just entered its sixth year. Begun in September, 1938, deepening of the river channel and paving the side will cost an estimated \$8,600,000. U. S. army engineers, supervising the job, expect construction to be finished by December 1, 1943.
