5,000 FANS SEE PELICANS DEFEAT TIGERS, 40 TO 7

Klamath Wins 4th Game in History With Ease—Dippel Scores For Medford.

Out-manned, out-powered and out-played in every vital department of the game, Medford's Black Tornado suffered a stunning 40 to 7 setback at the hands of what may prove to be the strongest Klamath Falls gridiron machine of all time before 5,000 fanatical fans at Klamath's Modoc field Friday night.

There never was any chance for the Tornado as the Pelicans, using four full teams, poured two quick touchdowns at the locals in the first period, relaxed a bit in the second and then roared back with four more tallies in the second half.

It was the fourth time in 30 years that Klamath was able to whip the Tigers, and the worst defeat handed our boys since the Eugene game (44 to 0) in 1936.

Medford's lone touchdown was produced in the fourth quarter on a beautifully executed screen pass from Bob Watson to Steve Dippel. From punt formation Watson tossed the ball over the heads of the onrushing Klamath linemen and Dippel twisted, turned and changed-pace 52 yards to the goal line. Watson converted.

It was the most spectacular play of the game. The Medford left halfback cut to the sidelines, then swerved back sharply and tore himself loose from three would-be tacklers before sprinting into the open and outrunning the defensive backs to the end zone.

Cause Hopeless

But, by that time, the Pelicans had rolled up 33 points and it was merely a salute to the feelings of the considerable number of local fans who made the trip to witness what they expected to be a Klamath victory, but by a much closer score.

Alwyn Silva, Klamath's lanky 171-pound left halfback, spearheaded the powerhouse offensive of the victors which rolled to 257 yards on the ground. With both guards pulling out of the line to lead the off-tackle power plays and wide end sweeps, Silva accounted for 99 of the Klamath yards and scored two touchdowns. He also completed five of six passing attempts.

Klamath's first touchdown occurred just five plays after they got their hands on the ball. Falling to gain after receiving the opening kickoff, Marvin Doty punted 14 yards to the Medford 44. Silva and Hank Schortgen ripped through to the nine, where Silva scored around right end and Patzke converted.

Late in the first period the Pelicans scored again, moving 56 yards in nine plays with Schortgen punching over right guard from four yards out for

the tally. Patzke's kick was low and wide.

Klamath Penalized
Aided by a 15-yard penalty against Klamath for unnecessary roughness, the first of two the Pelicans received, Medford got to the Klamath 35 in the second period, but Robin intercepted a Bob Watson pass on the 20 to end the threat. He did the same thing later in the stanza to again stop the Tigers.

Just before the half ended Watson fired a pass to Gil Tummy in the open on the Klamath 20, but the latter dropped the ball.

With Silva, Schortgen and Bud Peterstener running behind knock-em-dead blocking, the Pelicans marched 74 yards for their third score after the second-half kickoff. Silva carried it the last yard over right tackle, and Patzke's kick was wide. That made it 19-0.

Keith Coddington, Klamath's captain and left end, made touchdown number four when he intercepted a lateral pass from Clark to Dippel back of the line of scrimmage and raced 25 yards into the end zone. Patzke converted for a 26 to 0 score.

Near the close of the third period Peterstener intercepted a Watson pass on the Medford 31 and in two pitches, Silva to Eastman and Peterstener, Klamath reached the Medford two. On the first play of the fourth quarter Welch bucked center for the score and Palmer converted.

Perkins and Welch teamed up to move the ball 38 yards for Klamath's last touchdown, Welch making the final yard and Palmer converting. This followed Medford's touchdown. With the Klamath fourth team on the field, the victors were on the two-yard line when the game ended.

Line Decides
Probably the most decisive factor in the Klamath victory was the performance of the Pelican line, which smothered all Tornado attempts to make headway on the ground. Medford made only 27 net yards on running plays, sticking strictly to the Notre Dame box and trying not one "T" formation play. Pelican forwards completely outcharged the local linemen, and on offense their blocking was savage.

Medford suffered a serious setback early in the first quarter when Dale Niedermeyer, right halfback, injured his hip and was unable to reenter the game. He was not seriously hurt.

Klamath completed six out of nine passing attempts, while Medford hit five out of 19 and had five intercepted. Klamath gained 66 yards through the air. Medford 100. First downs favored Klamath, 16 to 4.

INDIANA BATTLES IOWA TO 7-7 TIE

Iowa City, Ia., Oct. 16.—(U.P.)—The University of Iowa and Indiana, the Big Ten's strictly civilian football teams this year, played to a 7 to 7 tie today before 6,800 shivering fans.

The outcome was considered a "moral" victory for Iowa because it wasn't the first time this season that the Hawkeyes had avoided defeat and because they stopped Bob Hoernschemeyer, Indiana's frolicking freshman, almost cold.

Hoernschemeyer scored Indiana's only touchdown in the second period when he intercepted an Iowa pass and ran 35 yards to cross the goal. But in all his passing and running attempts during the afternoon, he was held to a net gain of eight yards in 29 tries.

Iowa tied the score 10 minutes after the Hoosiers had countered when Halfback Paul Glasener faked a pass, evaded tacklers and ran wide around his left end for 25 yards and a touchdown. Taverner converted the extra point for Indiana and Barbours for Iowa.

COLUMBIA ROUTED BY ARMY, 52-0

New York, Oct. 16.—(U.P.)—Starting slowly, but gaining momentum as the clock dragged on, Army's undefeated football team poured eight touchdowns across Columbia's goal line to defeat the battered Lions, 52 to 0, before 23,000 fans, at Baker field today.

Glenn Davis, plebe from Los Angeles, paced the Cadet attack with three touchdowns as the Army moved to its fourth successive one-sided triumph and kept its goal line uncrossed for the season. Five other ball carriers plunged across the Lions' final strip while the gray-clad cadet corps of 2500 roared approval.

GRIZZLIES TRIM CAVEMEN, 20-13

A touchdown by Left Halfback Barney Riggs in the fourth quarter shattered a 13-13 deadlock and gave the Ashland high Grizzlies a 20 to 13 victory over the Grants Pass Cavemen at Ashland Friday night.

The Grizzlies marched 85 yards for the deciding touchdown to hang up their third straight win and hand the Cavemen their first loss in four starts. Garrett kicked the extra point.

Both teams scored in the first quarter, Grants Pass after recovering a Garrett fumble on the Ashland three and the Grizzlies a short time later with Riggs taking it over. Both extra points failed.

The Cavemen scored again in the second quarter to enjoy a 13 to 6 halftime advantage, but near the end of the third period Robertson caught a pass and fell across the goal line and Garrett ran over the extra point to tie the score.

TROY MASSACRES DONS WITH EASE

San Francisco, Oct. 16.—(U.P.)—The University of Southern California, rolling up yards and touchdowns with every man on the bench seeing action, defeated a valiant but inexperienced University of San Francisco team, 34 to 0, in a lopsided non-conference football game before 10,000 at Kezar stadium today.

Southern California, without Mickey McCordle, the great Trojan seacab who plays equally well at quarter or half, and Ralph Heywood, long punting end, went into a 27-0 lead in the first two periods.

In the second half, it was a case of USC holding down the score, but even this didn't prevent McCordle, who entered the game in the third period, from scampering untouched for 55 yards and a touchdown. John Dominis converted it.

ARMY GRID TEAM AT OREGON LOSES

Eugene, Ore., Oct. 16.—(U.P.)—Little Willamette university's Navyvets proved they were dynamite in coast football today by rolling over the University of Oregon Army gridders, 25 to 6.

The stubborn soldiers, with less than 12 hours' practice as a team but with many bigtime players among them, held the Cats down to 7 points up to half-time. Then 4000 fans saw Willamette begin clicking and Oregon began falling apart.

Two of the three touchdowns Willamette scored in the last half came on passes intercepted by Guard Bill Wolfsehr and Tackle Fred Deiner.

PACIFIC DEFEATS NAVY PRE-FLIGHT

Stockton, Cal., Oct. 16.—(U.P.)—The College of Pacific Tigers, led by Johnny Podesta from Modesto, paid tribute today to the coaching of 81-year-old Amos Alonzo Stagg by upsetting the heavily-favored Del Monte Navy Pre-Flight eleven, 16 to 7, before 11,000.

Going into the fourth quarter with the score 7 to 7 and the ball on the Del Monte 47, Podesta passed to End Jack Hurley on the 35 and Hurley galloped the rest of the way without a Navy man touching him.

NOTRE DAME ACES BURY WISCONSIN BY 50 TO 0 SCORE

Madison, Wis., Oct. 16.—(U.P.)—Notre Dame mixed mercy with magic today as it rolled to its fourth consecutive triumph by burying helpless Wisconsin 50 to 0.

The victory enabled the powerful Irish to take another step toward Notre Dame's first perfect season since 1930 and to average another of the smears on the team's record of a season ago. Wisconsin played the 1942 Irish outfit to a 7 to 7 tie.

The magic of the mixture Notre Dame showed 18,000 fans was embodied in the Irish's all-conquering first team, and the gridiron mercy was that displayed by Coach Frank Leahy when he permitted his first-stringers to play only 15 minutes during the rout.

Notre Dame's regulars played 10 minutes of the first period and scored three times in that brief interval. They came back at the start of the third quarter and stayed in the game for another five minutes during which they racked up two more touchdowns. Leahy then withdrew the star-studded lineup for a day.

The Notre Dame regulars needed only 23 plays from scrimmage to score five touchdowns.

The other three touchdowns were credited to Irish reserves, with Yonakor, Lujack and Lyden accounting for them. Yonakor's came after taking a pretty 20-yard pass from Lujack, the latter's marker was on a one-yard plunge, while Lyden, a third string center, raced 40 yards with an intercepted pass for his.

CALIFORNIA WINS FROM UCLA, 13-0

Los Angeles, Oct. 16.—(U.P.)—California's Bears opened up with their "bearzuka" system today, grabbed off two quick touchdowns in the first and second quarters, and galloped to a 13 to 0 win over their little brethren from the University of California at Los Angeles before 20,000 fans.

Famed for their straightaway football, the burly Bears came up with a sharp passing attack led by Joslyn and a fancy running routine sparked by Honer.

The Bruins, signing the receipt for their fourth straight loss this season, could Cook up only one honest scoring threat in the game but turned up a thrill in the last second of the game when End Dave Brown took Malmberg's pass on the 20 to the 2-yard line, just short of a score.

Their only resemblance to a drive came late in the second quarter but two incomplete passes over the goal line left them stranded on the California 9. For the rest of the game, the Bruins spent their time chasing Honer and seeing their passes intercepted.

The burly Bears couldn't stretch up a potent, consistent attack in the last half and both teams dilly-dallied with weak efforts.

ROMMEL SENT TO CRUSH JUGOSLAVS

London, Oct. 16.—(U.P.)—Field Marshal Erwin Rommel tonight was reported rushing reinforcements into embattled Yugoslavia in response to an order from Adolf Hitler that the fast-growing patriot armies, which now control one-third of the country, must be crushed at all costs.

Amid reports of bitter fighting at a dozen points as the guerrillas opened the seventh week of their offensive, advisers from Yugoslavia said German planes had scattered leaflets over the country warning of severe reprisals if the revolt continued.

SEEING EYE DOG RECOVERS MONEY

Los Angeles, Oct. 16.—(U.P.)—Blackie, a seeing-eye dog, today proved nothing escapes his watchful eyes.

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NAVY MANAGES TO EKE OUT 7-6 WIN OVER PENN STATE

Annapolis, Md., Oct. 16.—(U.P.)—Jittery Navy, far off the form that has made it one of the nation's football powers, today called on all the luck at its command to eke out a 14-to-6 victory over Penn State.

Some 18,000 fans, attracted by crisp, sunshiny weather which promised an ideal football afternoon, were drenched soon after the game started when a sudden rain and hail storm swept over the field and turned the contest into a battle of fumbles.

Mighty Navy was not mighty today. It was just ordinary and got the life scared out of it before a fourth period touchdown finally assured the undefeated Middles their fourth straight triumph of the season.

Navy actually was forced to cash in on two breaks—partly blocked punts—to nail down victory.

The first came midway through the first period when Williams' boot carried only ten yards to Penn State's 30. Here, navy's sharpshooter—Hall Hamberg—fashioned a quick touchdown on two successive passes to End John Hansen. Vic Finos converted.

Until the final six minutes, it appeared this conversion was all that would save the Navy from suffering the biggest upset of the season. Penn State cashed in the third period with a touchdown.

Navy saluted away the verdict with six minutes to go when it got the ball on Penn State's 43 on a poor kick and then exploded the one perfect play of the game. After Navy advanced to the 38, Substitute Bill Barron broke off tackle to the sidelines, picked up precious blocking and cut down the middle for a touchdown. Finos again converted.

NORTHWESTERN BY 2 QUICK SCORES DEFEATS SAILORS

Evanston, Ill., Oct. 16.—(U.P.)—Northwestern's erratic offense jelled behind Otto Graham for three minutes today — long enough to score two quick touchdowns and defeat Great Lakes, 13 to 0.

A crowd of 35,000 including 5,000 sailors, watched Northwestern's eleven sprinkled with navy trainee talent, completely stymie a one-man sailor squad. The one man gang was Steve Lach, former Duke star and Chicago Cardinal professional, who began and ended Great Lakes' three serious threats.

Graham sponsored the opening touchdown by passing 23 yards to Her Hein on the Great Lakes 28. Graham ran for nine yards, then for one, and passed 14 yards to Hein, who was dropped on the six yard line. Don Buffmire then pushed through guard for the score with less than eight minutes remaining in the second period. Vic Schwall's kick missed the mark.

Less than three minutes later, Northwestern worked the ball to the Sailors' goal by taking advantage of a bad kick, and Graham slammed across for the second score. This time Schwall's kick was good.

ROGUE RIVER WINS
Gold Hill, Oct. 16.—(Sp.)—Rogue River defeated Gold Hill high's six-man football team here Friday afternoon, 48 to 7, with Fitzgerald running wild for the victors. Rosencrans scored the lone Gold Hill touchdown.
