BURNS
Burns constitute one of the major injuries in the home. They are divided into three degrees. The accepted treatment of burns changes with the newer developments in scientific research. Of recent years tannic acid was considered as of first importance in the first aid treatment of burns. Objection to this form of treatment is now well developed. Tannic acid promptly forms a protecting coating over burns it is true. In forming this coating, however, it is so promptly sealed in dirt and infection. Boric acid ointment is now officially recommended as the proper home treatment for burns. Sterile petrolatum is also a good ointment. In case of minor burns, wash the affected area with white soap and water, being careful not to break any blisters that may be present. Then cover with a fine mesh gauze which has been impregnated with boric acid ointment, or with petrolatum should it be used. Over this gauze apply a bandage securely to keep dirt and infection from the injury.

HOSPITAL SHIP SUNK

IN DELIBERATE ATTACK
London, Oct. 18.—(U.P.)—The British hospital ship Newfoundland was sunk off Salerno Sept. 13 as the result of "deliberate attacks" by German bombers, naval sources revealed today. Twenty-three persons were reported to have lost their lives. Survivors reported that all the Newfoundland's lights were on and that large Red Cross symbols were clearly visible.

URGES POSTWAR SEARCH FOR ART SEIZED BY NAZIS

Masterpieces Valued At Millions Are Stolen—Hitler, Goering Involved.

New York (U.P.)—A gigantic treasure hunt to ferret out hundreds of millions of dollars' worth of masterpieces stolen by the Germans from the conquered peoples must be conducted as part of postwar reconstruction, an art expert said here today.

M. Georges Wildenstein of Paris and New York said that many of the pictures would be easily traceable to high Nazi officials, but that others, sold at auctions, would have to be hunted down and rightful ownership legalized.

He said that the Rothschild family alone have had almost \$100,000,000 worth of art objects seized by the Nazis. Hitler, he said, fancied himself as an art connoisseur and sent out agents to every conquered country to confiscate paintings for his private collection and for the Adolf Hitler Memorial Museum in his home town of Linz.

Goering, he said, also had a huge collection of art—mostly nudes. One curious exception, Wildenstein said, was a religious masterpiece by Jan and Hubert Van Eyck, "The Adoration of the Lamb," which Goering had snatched away from the Ghent Cathedral in Belgium.

Wildenstein warned that unless careful plans were laid to untangle problems of ownership, the task of restoring the art works would be almost insurmountable.

"The value of art as a 'movable asset' will mean that when the Nazi rats begin to leave their sinking ship they will try to take their loot with them," he added.

The expert suggested that post-war decrees could declare a moratorium on all art transactions and forbid the removal of all art works until the tangle was straightened out.

"Next," he said, "proof of ownership before 1936 should be demanded of all Germans and Italians—and even neutrals—in Europe possessing art objects of value."

DRAMATIC TRIAL GETS UNDER WAY IN BAHAMA COURT

Nassau, Bahamas, Oct. 18.—(U.P.)—One of the most dramatic murder trials of the decade began today on this coral island outpost of the British Empire, when Count Alfred De Marigny arose in an unpretentious little courtroom and denied that he murdered his wife's father, Sir Harry Oakes.

A capacity crowd of 105 spectators leaned forward in their seats when the supreme court clerk turned to the wooden cage in which the defendant sat and said:

"Alfred De Marigny, you are charged with the following offense: That you, during the night of July 7th and 8th, murdered Sir Harry Oakes. Are you guilty or not guilty?"

"I am not guilty," the boyish-looking prisoner replied in a loud, clear voice.

Supreme Court Justice Sir Oscar Daly, wearing a long black robe and white wig, peered over horn-rimmed spectacles at the defendant as he made his formal plea of innocence.

Outside the colonial-style building, hundreds of persons who were unable to gain admittance peeked into windows of the first-floor room. The crowd began gathering at daybreak and the five rows of wooden benches reserved for spectators were filled by 9 a. m.

4,000 Natives Build Chapel On Guadalcanal For Heroes

Guadalcanal.—(U.P.)—"This is the House of God. This is none other than the Gate of Heaven."

With these words the native population of the British Solomon Island Protectorate today presented to the American people a memorial chapel honoring 1800 American dead buried on Guadalcanal.

Guests of honor at the ceremony, carried out in the open air, included four major generals, two brigadier generals and a rear admiral, leaders of the United Nations forces in the Solomons war zone.

Jason, a Christianized native who is leader of the Labor Corps, made the presentation through Lt. Col. D. C. C. Trench, acting resident commissioner. Acceptance for the United States was made by Brig. Gen. A. F. Howard, USA.

Jason's presentation address was the highlight of the ceremony. With simple dignity this barefoot native, attired in white "lap-lap," or loin cloth, and a singlet, said:

"We want to tell you all people that all me fella belong Solomon build this church because we want to thank you. We have worked hard and we hope you like this church. And we pray that God will bless all of you and we hope you will pray for your friends who are lying in this cemetery."

"Also we want to thank all the Americans and Allies who have fought to push the enemy out of our land. Now we give this church to you. But this church no belong you and me. This church belong God."

"And we ask God bless us all. Thank you."

Brief dedication prayers were then said by Chaplain John O'Neill, USN, of Boston, Mass., and Chaplain O. G. Grotelund, AUS, of Pittsburgh and Detroit, a Catholic and Lutheran, respectively, after which the Native Labor Corps, singing "In six-part rhythm, led the audience into the chapel."

The chapel, with a seating capacity of 280, is made entirely of thatch and native woods. Viewed from the air it resembles a huge heart, with a cross in the center. At the peak of the heart is the flagstaff. Flower gardens have been planted in front of the chapel and along its sides.

It took approximately 4000 natives a little more than two months to construct the chapel, the main body of which covers an area of 80 feet and 28 feet. The chapel is 26 feet high.

Other details of chapel construction: Fourteen thousand leaves and 5000 strips of bamboo have gone into the chapel. One hundred thousand lineal feet of "kwasi-kwasi" (woven matting) are the walls. The rafters are of ambalua, a local wood. The roof is made of vatu and the altar of harles, semi-hardwoods. The floor of the chapel is a combination of mamahul and uuala, native timbers.

Eighteen wood and inlaid carvings include a lecture, a christening font and cross, three
