REPUBLICAN TIDE
SEEN BY LEADER

Missoula, Mont., Oct. 19.—(U.P.) Harrison Spangler, Republican national committee chairman, told GOP leaders last night that "the tide is now running in favor of Republicans."

Spangler addressed a group of Republicans assembled from nine midwestern and western states for a two-day meeting to map plans for the 1944 campaign.

Three state delegations established headquarters to back their candidates for the presidential nomination.

Wendell L. Willkie was supported by a group led by National Committeeman Ralph Calk, Portland, Oregon.

Former Gov. Harold Stassen of Minnesota was supported by Minnesota and Wyoming groups.

Gov. Thomas Dewey of New York was supported by a group headed by Committeeman Joe Montgomery, Lewistown, Mont.

States represented at the meeting included Montana, Wyoming, Oregon, Idaho, Washington, Colorado, Utah, North Dakota and South Dakota.

Third War Loan
Far Over Quota

Washington, Oct. 19.—(U.P.) The treasury today announced that the \$15,000,000,000 third war loan went over the top by \$3,943,000,000.

Sales to individuals were \$377,000,000 over the \$5,000,000,000 quota. Corporations, associations and other large purchasers exceeded their \$10,000,000,000 goal by \$2,938,000,000. Government trusts accounts purchased \$630,000,000.
