

COUNTY RECEIVES \$90,766 AS HALF OF SCHOOL SHARE

Check Represents Apportionment Under Recently Enacted Law

County School Superintendent Charles R. Bowman announced today receipt by the county of a check for \$90,766.50, representing one-half the yearly apportionment due Jackson county from the state school support fund under a law passed by the 1943 legislature. A similar amount will be apportioned next April 15.

The new law, which was sponsored by the Oregon State Teachers' association, was one of the most controversial issues at the last session of the legislature. It provides that \$5,000,000 of surplus state income revenues shall be apportioned annually among the counties for distribution among the school districts to offset any special school district tax levies made. Apportionment is based on average daily attendance in the school districts.

Most to Medford
Medford school district 49 will receive the largest share of the total apportionment, \$58,633.92, half of it now and half on April 15, when the county receives the balance of its apportionment. Ashland school district 5 will receive a total of \$25,436.07.

Other school districts in the county, with the amounts they are to receive, are: Phoenix, \$6652.01; Jacksonville, \$6065.71; Gold Hill, \$5631.65; Rogue River, \$5093.70; and Prospect, \$4270.93. Several of the smaller county school districts made no special tax levies and will receive none of the apportionment.

CAMP WHITE WAS ASHLAND SPEAKER

Ashland, Oct. 20.—(Spl.)—Pvt. Blanche Tennerholm of Camp White was chief speaker at the meeting of the Ashland branch of American Association of University Women at the October meeting. Pvt. Tennerholm, a native of France, is a professor of French at Russell Sage college, now on leave to serve in the WAC.

She spoke of conditions in France, having returned there frequently before the war. She has made a total of 22 trips across, and was in France when the war started. Without condoning the Laval type of Vichy Frenchmen, she spoke with sympathy of Marshal Petain's intentions toward France. Her sincere and forceful address was warmly applauded.

The meeting, held at the home of Mrs. Frank Van Dyke, was attended by 33 present and prospective members.

MAN HELD HERE IS WANTED FOR COLO. SLAYING

Rex Vernon Winburn, 41, is held in the county jail as a suspect in a knife slaying at a schoolhouse dance at Trinidad, Colo., November 2, 1930. The sheriff's office reported today they had been advised by Colorado authorities extradition papers were being prepared, and they would come for Winburn in a couple of days.

"I am innocent, but not surprised," Winburn was quoted by Sheriff Syd I. Brown, as saying when advised of the charge. Local authorities know nothing of the details.

Winburn was arrested at Rogue River, October 4, where he was employed in a sawmill. He has been in this section for two years. He has been held in the county jail to serve out a sentence of 30 days for driving an auto while drunk. Since then the murder suspect charge developed. Winburn was found guilty of drunken driving and sentence was suspended in justice court on condition he would make monthly payments. This he failed to do. He has been in no other trouble here, authorities said.

RETURN RATIONS ON SALE OF CAR

Owners of motor vehicles who sell their cars are reminded by the local war price and rationing board that they are required to turn in their gasoline rations directly to the board, which will issue a receipt therefor.
