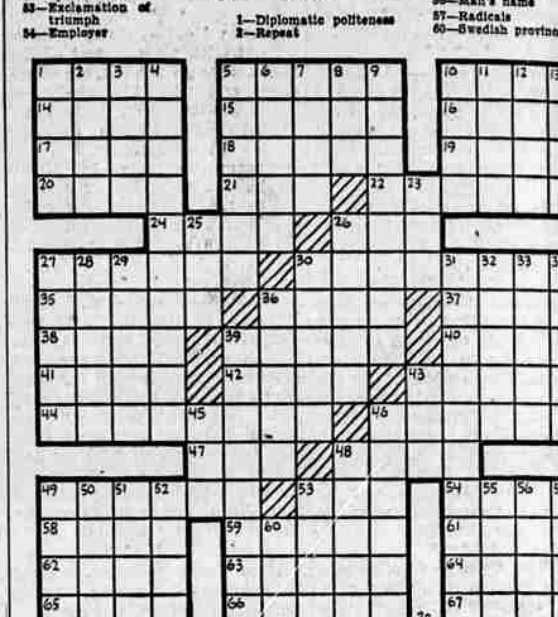

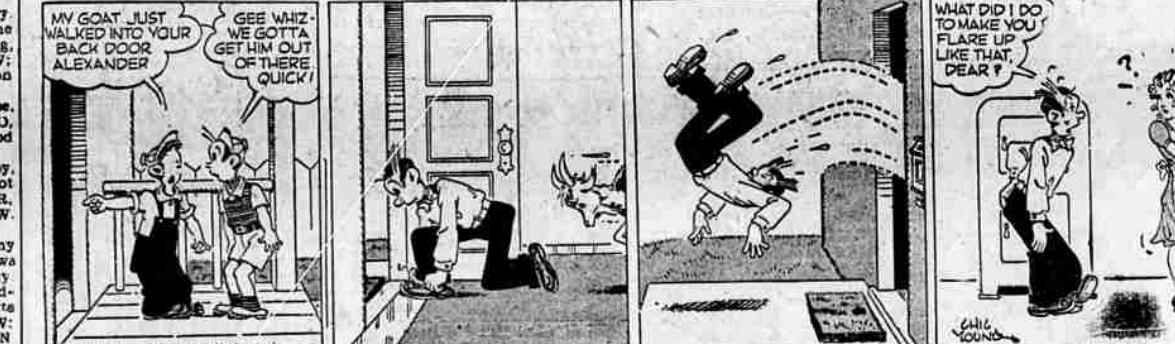

The Home Front has recovered from the shock of being inadvertently labelled "Washington Letter" in last week's issue, with a by-line by Congressman Harris Elsworth, and is prepared with the week's news about service-men and women and the folks at home.

Medford football fans have been pretty gloomy the past week, for last Friday night their Black Tornado was walloped by Klamath Falls, 40 to 7. It was Klamath's fourth win over Medford in 30 years. The Tigers never had a chance against what looks like the best Pelican team in history. Steve Dippel scored Medford's touchdown in the fourth quarter on a brilliant 52-yard run after catching a pass.

On the same night, Ashland downed Grants Pass, 20 to 13 and it looks like the Medford-Ashland game here Armistice Day will be something to see. Tonight, Medford plays at Grants Pass.

Civic activities this week are centered in the annual Community Chest drive which started Monday. The quota is \$43,718 for six local and 17 national organizations and committees, the latter being grouped under the National War Fund.

Figures announced this week by the Portland OPA show that Jackson county's population is now nearly 50,000 on the basis of 49,022 copies of ration book

two issued up to October 1. This is 12,809 more than the census figure of 36,213 for 1940. Population of Medford proper is estimated at 17,000. A more accurate figure will be obtained when registration for ration book four, to take place October 26-29, has been completed.

With its eyes on this growing population, the city council and planning commission met this week for an informal planning conference on sanitation and health problems which will have to be faced after the war. Discussed were sewage disposal, food control and the need of additional park and recreational facilities, such as an outdoor swimming pool.

In connection with the increasing population it should be noted that Jackson county births for September numbered 114, an all-time high. Previous high was 95 births for June of this year.

The local Chamber of Commerce has been notified that two tankers now under construction at the Kaiser company shipyards in Portland are to be named after historical places in this district. The boats are to be christened the S. S. Table Rock and the S. S. Jacksonville.
