THIRTY NURSES ATTEND MEETING WITH MISS GRAY

More than 30 registered nurses from Medford, Butte Falls, Ashland, Josephine and Douglas county were in attendance this morning at the institute being held here today by Miss Mary Gray, Red Cross nurse consultant for Oregon. Additional nurses were to arrive this afternoon from Klamath county and the institute continues throughout the day with session from 7:30 to 9:30 p. m.

The institute here, held in the Presbyterian church, is part of the nation-wide program to train women in home nursing and the nurses attending today's classes are to teach home nursing classes in this section. Locally the new classes will be announced soon. Red Cross officials point out that it is the goal of the organization to train at least one person in each home to take care of the sick in that home as far as possible to relieve the load on the dwindling supply of nurses in hospitals and as preparation for possible emergencies, such as epidemics of disease.

The institute was arranged by Miss Helen Bullis, county chairman of the Red Cross for home nursing.
