

RULES GIVEN ON GAS RATION FOR USED CAR BUYER

Gasoline rations for purchasers of used cars will be issued only on the basis of the gasoline book held by the previous owner and the new rations cannot be issued unless the book is in the hands of the board it was pointed out again today by the local war price and ration board. Considerable confusion still persists in the public mind over this point, it was said.

Persons selling cars must turn the gasoline ration book issued for the car into the ration board within five days after the sale, board members said. The new owner should see that this is done, since otherwise the board cannot issue a book to the new owner.

The purchaser should examine the ration book belonging to the car, it was said, since the new book will be issued stamp for stamp like the previous one and if the previous owner has used the book improperly, or stamps have been lost, the new owner will be the one to suffer.

GRAND JURY IN WEEK'S RECESS

The new grand jury, Earl C. Gaddis, foreman, recessed until next Monday at the close of its first day's session. District Attorney George W. Neilson said the recess was called to assemble information and witnesses from other sections of the state. The grand jury is considering evidence in a number of fatal accidents in the county the past three months.

PROGRESS SEEN IN CONFERENCE

Moscow, Oct. 26 — (U.P.) — The conference of American, British and Russian foreign ministers entered its second week today with observers indicating that important progress has been made toward a satisfactory agreement on war and post-war problems affecting the three allies.

The cordiality of the meetings was accentuated yesterday by a 55-minute conference between U. S. Secretary of State Cordell Hull and Soviet Premier Josef Stalin—their first since Hull's arrival more than a week ago. Hull went immediately from the Kremlin to his seventh meeting with British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden, Soviet Foreign Commissar Vyacheslav M. Molotov and their advisers in the Spiridonovka palace.

Details of the negotiations remained a closely-guarded secret, but observers were optimistic over the prospects for a speedy agreement.

U. S. TO DOUBLE FIGHTER POWER

London, Oct. 26. — (U.P.) — American fighter plane strength in the British Isles will be almost doubled, in the next two months, by the addition of new and improved aircraft capable of escorting U. S. bombers deep into Germany, Maj. Gen. William E. Kepner, chief of the U. S. Eighth Air Force Fighter command, disclosed today.

In an interview with the United Press, Kepner revealed that the fighter command now

was at 50 to 60 per cent of planned strength and was expected to reach its peak by January 1, 1944.

With the arrival of new-type aircraft now in production and improved types of existing planes, Kepner envisaged waves of long-range fighters operating in relays to escort American bombers all the way to targets inside Germany.

BUS DRIVER GIVEN FINE ON SPEEDING

Herbert E. Bismark, of Chicago, driver of a bus, was fined \$7.50 and costs for speeding and the same amount for violation of the basic rule when he entered a plea of guilty in justice court yesterday. He was charged with traveling 60 miles per hour in a 25-mile zone on North Riverside avenue. Bismark denied he was traveling at such a rate on the grounds his vehicle, loaded with passengers, could not pick up such speed between Main street and the point of arrest.

Hardin A. Turnbaugh, Jacksonville, charged with being intoxicated on a public highway was assessed \$14.50 and \$4.50 costs. L. D. Johnson, charged with violation of the basic rule on the Pacific highway between this city and Grants Pass was fined the same sum. Morris Frink of Sams Valley paid \$2.50 and costs for a truck overload.

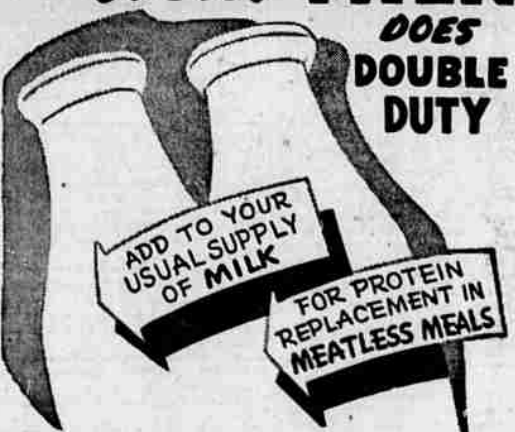
