

## CHRISTMAS MAIL MUST BE POSTED BY DECEMBER 10

Due to a lack of experienced postal personnel and overburdened transportation facilities, the local postoffice authorities announced today that all Christmas packages and cards must be mailed by Dec. 10 to insure their delivery by Dec. 25. A nationwide program is being carried out, impressing upon the public the importance of mailing Christmas mail early, spreading the volume over a longer period of time rather than waiting and sending a deluge in last-minute mailings.

Transportation facilities are heavily burdened, and the number of railway cars and airplanes available for handling Christmas mail is far below that of former years. According to the postal department, more than 30,000 postal employees have gone into the armed forces in the past year. Many of the temporary employees, usually called in to help out during the Christmas rush, have also gone into the service or into war work. Replacement personnel is largely inexperienced, unable to handle in a short time the usual Christmas volume of mail.

Christmas gifts should be marked "Do not open until Christmas," thus designating them as Christmas mail, which must necessarily come secondary to government communications.

Special efforts should be made also to extend the use of postal delivery zone numbers on all mail addressed to cities having that system, because the numbers expedite mail distribution.

The postal establishment today is delivering record-breaking volumes of mail. Christmas mail will be in addition to all this, therefore the Medford postal authorities join in the national program of asking public cooperation in mailing Christmas mail before Dec. 10, insuring their delivery by Christmas.

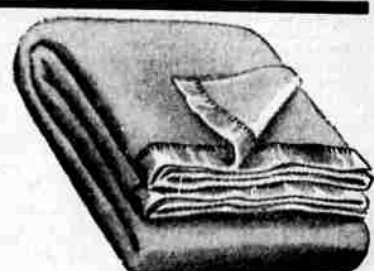
