SGT. JOE LOUIS TO EXHIBIT AT CAMP TOMORROW

Bomber to Box Nicholson in Giant Show — Robinson, White Also on Card.

Sgt. Joe Louis, world's heavy-weight boxing champion and his long-time sparring partner, George Nicholson, will fight an exhibition bout at Camp White's mammoth sports arena Friday night to climax the biggest show ever staged there.

The Brown Bomber and his entourage are making a tour of the country's army camps to provide entertainment for the soldiers, and Camp White was fortunate in being placed on the list of camps to be visited.

The fight program, which will start at 7 p. m., will also see Sugar Ray Robinson, who recently whipped Henry Armstrong, tangle with Jackie Wilson, former world's welter-weight champion, in the semi-windup. They are traveling with Louis.

Rounding out the program will be two eight-minute wrestling bouts featuring Camp White soldiers, a judo exhibition and three boxing matches.

Louis and his group exhibited in Ft. Lewis, Wash., last night and are scheduled to appear at Camp Adair tonight.

A small number of civilians will see the show at Camp White Friday evening, there having been 200 tickets given away to purchasers of war bonds. Those having duets will be admitted to the camp area upon presentation of the tickets.

ANGOTT DEFEATS WHITE IN 15 TO WIN NBA DIADEM

Hollywood, Oct. 28.—(U.P.)—Hard punching Sammy Angott headed for New York today with his sights set on winning back the undisputed world light-weight title after grabbing the National Boxing Association crown last night with a solid 15-round decision over Luther (Slugger) White, Baltimore, Md., negro.

Angott, who once held the unquestioned diadem and who has three decisions over the New York boxing commission's champion, Bob Montgomery, hooked and battered his way to a unanimous decision over White in as weird and wacky a title fight ever held in California, or perhaps anywhere.

After three rounds of fighting under the arcs of Gilmore field, the lights in all but one section of the grandstand blinked out, leaving the fighters and 10,000 fans who braved threatening weather in almost total darkness for an hour.

After waiting 15 minutes, wrapped in topcoats, towels and sweaters, the fighters returned to their dressing rooms while the crowd sang "Show Me the Way to Go Home."

For veteran Angott, undefeated as a lightweight in five years, the hour between rounds apparently made little difference. He winged out in the fourth, opened up his vicious hooking to White's body and head and never was in trouble.

300-POUNDER SCORES 1ST ROUND KNOCKOUT

Oakland, Cal., Oct. 28.—(U.P.)—Ben Moroz, 300-pound, seven-foot Philadelphia, scored a first-round technical knockout over Al Ware, 210, Oakland, in the main event at Oakland auditorium last night.

Ware jumped from his corner at the opening gong and landed three hard rights to Moroz's chin. The giant easterner stepped in and caught Ware with a right to the jaw, then crossed to the body.

TIGERS DRILL ON AERIAL DEFENSE FOR FRIDAY TILT

Eureka's Frankie Massaro to Prove Big Threat—Two Regs Won't Start.

Pass defense has been the order of the day in the Black Tornado's practice sessions this week as Coach Lorne Arnold drives his charges in preparation for the Friday night invasion of Medford of the Eureka, (Calif.) high school Loggers and Fabulous Frankie Massaro, one of the greatest aerial artists ever seen in northern California and southern Oregon. The game will start at 8 p. m.

The Eureka attack is built purely and solely around Massaro, who can knock your hat off at 60 yards and run like a scared rabbit. In the 6-6 tie game played by the two elevens earlier this year, Massaro tossed no less than 35 passes and only the most alert defense prevented the Eureka from tallying several more times.

Arnold, who will be coaching his last Medford high team before leaving for Yankton, S. D., next Monday to accept a post as physical education director of Yankton college, said the winning club Friday night "will probably have to score three touchdowns."

Two Tornado regulars will not open the battle. Gil Tummy, right end, was injured in the Grants Pass tilt and won't be in uniform. Steve Dippel, left halfback, has an ailing leg, but he will see action later in the game.

Plaskett will be in Tummy's place, with Doty at the other end, Sheldon and Casebeer at the tackles, either Corcoran and Lynch or Balderston and Dixon at the guards, Miller at center, Baker at quarterback, Watson at left half, Niedermeyer at right half and Plumley at fullback.

Last night, the Medford sophomores downed the Grants Pass sophs, 20 to 6 by making three touchdowns and a safety. Medford's touchdowns were made by Berry, who ran 70 yards into the end zone; Brinson, who ripped off a 55-yard gallop and Riggs, who scored on a power play. The safety occurred when Grants Pass recovered a blocked punt in its own end zone.

Harmful Antifreeze Offered Motorists Is Warning by ODT

A supply of over half a million gallons of harmful and destructive antifreeze preparations is available for sale to the public, the Office of Defense Transportation estimated today. Warning that certain types of antifreeze solutions have been found highly destructive to radiators, ignition systems and rubber connections in automobiles and trucks, the ODT urged operators not to allow such materials regardless of cheapness to be put into their vehicles, and where such materials have already been installed, to drain them out immediately and replace with safe antifreeze of the ethylene-glycol or alcohol type.

To help operators avoid injurious types of antifreeze, the ODT said that the National Bureau of Standards has identified by name the following bonded products, made before January 20, 1943, as constituting harmful antifreeze solutions as defined in the war production order which stopped their manufacture: All-Winter, Bird Antarctic, Chem-A-Cool, Flexo, Freeze, Frozone, Gold Seal, No-Freeze, Permazone, Security, 60-Below, Wonder-Solv, Anti-Arctic, Lo-Temp, Lo-Zone, Ve. Neva-Freeze, Never Freeze, Alcotex, Anti-Frost, No-Boil, Ever-Flo.

DOBBS IS STAR ON ARMY ELEVEN

Dallas, Tex., Oct. 28.—(U.P.)—Graduation rubbed out neither the name nor fame of Tulsa university's great All-American back, Glenn Dobbs.

The triple-threat who paced the Golden Hurricane through an undefeated season last fall and into the Sugar Bowl is at it again—this time as the star of a Randolph field football team that has won five straight games and been scored on only once.

The six-foot, four-inch, 195-pound Oklahoman hadn't played since last year when he arrived at Randolph field only two days before his first game. But the Army had seen to it that he kept in shape and he picked up where he left off with Tulsa to turn the West Point of the Air gridiron team into the best service team in Texas.

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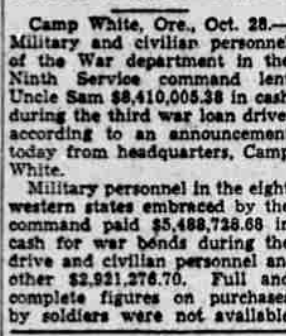
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SERVICE COMMAND HEAVY LENDER IN THIRD BOND DRIVE

Camp White, Ore., Oct. 28.—Military and civilian personnel of the War department in the Ninth Service command lent Uncle Sam \$8,410,005.38 in cash during the third war loan drive, according to an announcement today from headquarters, Camp White.

Military personnel in the eight western states embraced by the command paid \$5,488,728.68 in cash for war bonds during the drive and civilian personnel another \$2,921,276.70. Full and complete figures on purchases by soldiers were not available

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due to extensive maneuvers in progress during the drive. Cash purchases were in addition to \$5,799,134.23 worth of bonds at cost prices purchased through the payroll allotment plans, bringing the total during the drive to \$14,209,139.61.
