The county has been experiencing winterish weather, with a little rain every day for a week. The weather hasn't dampened the spirits of the small dry, however, who are looking forward to having fun on Halloween. Some of the older folk will make merry, too, with lodges and clubs planning Halloween dances and parties.

Medford high gridders returned to the victory path last Friday night with a 6 to 0 conquest of Grants Pass, created when Steve Dippel, 25, yards around his own right end for the lone touchdown of the wet contest. It was probably the best showing of the Tigers this season and brought their record to three wins, one loss and one tie.

Tonight they play Eureka, Calif., here, and it will be their last game under Coach Lorne Arnold, who is leaving Monday to return to Yankton college in Yankton, S. D., where he will teach physical education to navy cadets. No successor to Arnold has yet been announced.

Sgt. Joe Louis, world's heavyweight boxing champion, will appear at Camp White tonight in an exhibition match against his long-time sparring partner, George Nicholson. With Louis on his tour of the army camps are Sugar Ray Robinson, former welterweight title claimant and Jackie Wilson, ex-welter king. They'll also spar around for the soldiers.

Medford schools are closed for the last two days of this week while teachers register citizens for Ration Book No. 4. Rural schools for the most part are carrying on the registration after school hours.

Medford's American Legion Auxiliary is currently carrying on a campaign to enroll 15 women in the Women's Army corps. The campaign is on a na-

tion-wide basis and would enlist a woman for every man listed as a casualty. Companies are to be formed with women from each state.

More than 200 names have already been listed on the county's Roll of Honor of servicemen and women. This is considered but a small beginning in the campaign to list all men and women in service.

A recent dispatch from London regarding the use of P-38 Lightnings in missions over Germany were to the effect that Lt. John R. (Jack) Pruitt of Medford was one of the pilots stationed there. He has been in the army three years, having transferred from the National Guard unit to the air corps.

Gordon Warner, corporal in the signal corps, has written his parents from the European war theater the sequel to a story printed last summer about Fuhrman (Brick) Blaylock, who found two copies of the Mail Tribune while engaged in the Sicilian campaign. Warner had not seen an Oregonian for months, he wrote, when one day he ran on to Blaylock. A day or so later Warner received some copies of the Tribune and read the story about Brick, which he saved to show the soldier. Cpl. Warner commented that "the old world is pretty small and coincidences still happen" and ended by saying that perhaps he would still run into "Adolf" yet.

With the end of the first semester's studies, students under the Navy V-12 who reported for college training the first of July, have been home this week on a brief leave. Home from University of Colorado were Charles Braley, Bill Bayliss, Bob Mitchell, Dan Winter, Elwood Hedberg, Jr., and Bob Holmes. Jim Elliott was home from Williamette University and Bob Bryant from UCLA. A marine student home also was Floyd Yar-

nell from Adolphus Augustus college in Minnesota.

Another marine student home recently was Johnny Gitten, from UCLA. Lt. and Mrs. James Donald Monteith left last week for El Paso, Tex., after a few days in Medford and Sgt. Geo. Fredenburg is home from Gowen Field, Ida., where he is a member of a heavy bomber crew.

T/Sgt. Herbert Fitzgerald, who spent three years in Alaska with the army, is home for a visit before going to Florida where he will be stationed for the present. Sgt. Fitzgerald's two brothers are also in the service. Pfc. Jerome Fitzgerald being stationed in Astoria and Lt. Gerald A. Fitzgerald in Hawaii.

Pvt. Darrell Leavens has returned to his marine station at San Diego after leave at home and Cadet William A. Holloway, Jr., came up from the University of California for a long week-end with his family. He graduates from the dental college in January and will be into active service at once. Sgt. Robert Daily, who has been serving in Panama with an anti-aircraft unit, is here on furlough, the first during four years' army service.

Dr. Max George Carfer, who recently was married to Dr. Barbara Ford of Boston, will report to the navy November 1. Both the Drs. Carfer have been on the staff of the Boston City hospital. The engagement of Betty Hughes to Pfc. Ernest Squires of Camp White has also been announced.

Japanese Fascist Stages Hara Kiri

Chungking, Oct. 29.—(U.P.)—A Tokyo radio broadcast heard here said today that Seigoh Nakano, editor of the Tokyo newspaper Ashai and a leading Japanese exponent of Fascism, committed hara kiri Wednesday after attending the opening session of the diet (parliament).

Chinese quarters took Nakano's act as indicative of his objection to the new policy of Premier Hideki Tojo of defensive instead of offensive war.

LONGED-FOR CURE OF COMMON COLD BELIEVED NEARER

Chicago, Oct. 29.—(U.P.)—Hope for the long-awaited cure and control of the common cold was held out today by medical researchers reporting in the American Medical Association Journal.

Steps toward the solution of medicine's most tantalizing problem were reported by physicians conducting independent experiments in California and at Johns Hopkins hospital at Baltimore, Md.

Five California physicians told of experiments promising an eventual cure. Four Baltimore doctors described progress toward curbing complications.

The California group used a solution of sodium sulfathiazole combined with desoxyephedrine hydrochloride.

"Experiments on 103 cases of nose, throat and ear infections showed that if this is used early enough colds may be halted and the pressure pains caused by blocked sinuses relieved," they said.

"The hydrochloride compound provides a shrinkage of swollen tissues and enables the sulfa-

solution to reach the deeper layers of the mucous membranes."

Don't Dump Leaves On City's Streets Is Plea of Rogers

City Superintendent Frank Rogers today asked the public's cooperation in abiding by an ordinance which prohibits the raking of leaves from lawns onto city streets.

The city superintendent, in calling attention to the ordinance, said the streets and roads department was short of men and equipment and that citizens could keep the streets free of leaves by their cooperation.

It is not against the ordinance, he said, to rake leaves from parking strips onto the streets.
