## FRANKIE MASSARO PITCHES AGAINST MEDFORD TONIGHT

Eureka Pits Great Passer and Runner Against Tornado at Local Stadium.

Fabulous Frankie Massaro comes to Medford tonight to try pitching his Eureka, Calif., high school football eleven to a victory over Medford's Black Tornado in a return battle at the stadium that starts at 8 o'clock sharp. The two clubs struggled to a 6-6 standoff at Eureka Oct. 9.

Called by Medford Coach Lorne Arnold "one of the best high school backs I've ever seen," the big Eureka fullback is practically 100 per cent of the Logger attack. He passes like a madman and his ball-carrying is almost as potent. For Coach Jay Willard's machine he is a "meal ticket" in capital letters.

The Californians figure to be plenty tough, what with Massaro flinging and lugging. They whipped Ashland last week, 18 to 13, with Frankie, of course, being responsible for all three touchdowns. He is rated the best forward passer ever developed in northern California.

**May Score Plenty**  
Arnold, who'll be making his farewell appearance as Medford mentor, believes it will be a high-scoring affair. He recalled that in the deadlocked game between the two clubs Medford found it not too difficult to move forward on the ground, and that fumbles and lack of goal-line sock were all that kept the Tigers from crossing the last line two or more times.

As for the Black Tornado, it looked very good in whipping Grants Pass, 8 to 0, last week. It tackled and blocked with much vigor and its pass defense was all that could be asked when the Cavemen got really dangerous. And it has had a whale of a lot of aerial defense drilled into it the past practice week.

**Arnold's Last Game**  
Another thing. As it will be the last game for Coach Arnold before leaving Monday for Yankton college, Yankton, S. D., to teach physical education to naval cadets, the Tigers will naturally want him to carry away a farewell victory. They'll do their best to place a halter on Massaro.

The team isn't in tip-top physical condition, what with Gil Tunny, end, definitely out and Steve Dippel, left half, nursing a sore leg but destined to see action before the evening is over. The rest of the lads are OK.

Officials will be Paul Davis of Grants Pass, Virgil Swanson of Medford and B. Price of Camp White.

## Don Hutson Plans To Quit Pro Football, Or Does He?

Rye, N. Y., Oct. 29.—(U.P.)—After separate interviews with Don Hutson and Curley Lambeau of the Green Bay Packers, we can state definitely that:

(1) Hutson, the Packers' mighty end, will or will not retire at the close of this season.  
(2) Hutson has not or has worn shoulder pads while participating in every Packer game for nine seasons.  
(3) The Packers' safety man is Hutson or Lambeau.

We garnered these "scoops" during a reportorial workout with the Packers who are grooming here at the Westchester Country club for Sunday's game with the Giants at the New York polo grounds. During the workout we galloped past Hutson, apparently the safety man, and thought we were stepping over the goal stripe for a journalistic touchdown, when suddenly thrown by Coach Lambeau. We woke up right in mid-field.

Hutson, a lanky, soft-spoken southerner who is generally regarded as the greatest pass receiver in grid history, told us: "I'm playing my last season of football. That's positive! I'm quitting because I've played long enough—nine years as a pro. Four years in college and one in high school. I'm 30 years old; and I have a good bowling alley business in Green Bay. I don't have to play any more."

Then he encountered Coach Lambeau, standing in the club lobby, and sounded him for words of regret over Hutson's planned retirement. The portly pilot gave us a quick once-over, as if estimating our lack of intelligence, and inquired caustically: "Are you kidding? Don't you know that's an annual gag with Hutson? Why—he's been announcing his retirement about this time every season for the past five years. Does he play like a guy who's ready for the ash can? He'll retire, all right—about 1950."

## TROJANS HEAVILY FAVORED TO WHIP BEARS SATURDAY

San Francisco, Oct. 29.—(U.P.)—The unbeaten and unscored-on University of Southern California Trojans were strong favorites today to make it two in a row over University of California tomorrow in the Los Angeles Coliseum and thereby clinch the Pacific Coast conference southern division championship.

Victory for Coach Jeff Cravath's men, who defeated the Bears 7-0 earlier in the season, would give them highest claims to Rose Bowl honors. Their only competitors, the undefeated University of Washington Huskies, complete a four game non-conference schedule tomorrow with a return game against Spokane Air Service command at Seattle.

Should California upset the dope bucket, however, the Rose Bowl picture would be complicated indeed. The Bears and Trojans would end the season in a tie for conference honors, provided both defeated UCLA in return engagements next month, and the thrice-defeated Californians would have a claim on the Pasadena prize.

Other games tomorrow find St. Mary's Pre-Flight and the Fourth Air Force Flyers from March Field, Calif., meeting in an Army-Navy clash at Kezar stadium, San Francisco; UCLA journeying to San Diego to play the Naval Training station, and Pomona Army Ordnance challenging the USC reserves. Sunday, St. Mary's college and University of San Francisco play at Kezar for the "strictly civilian" championship of California.

Coach Stub Allison of California remained dubious of any advantages gained for the Bears by the loss of Halfbacks Mickey McCardle and Howard Callanan and Ends Ralph Heywood and Pete McPhall to the Trojans. He pointed out as he prepared to leave with his team for Los Angeles that George Callanan and Don and Jim Hardy were worthy substitutes for the departed stars.

St. Mary's Pre-Flight, on the basis of its smashing 39-0 defeat of California last week, remained an even choice against the March Field Flyers, who lost their first game of the season to Washington, 27-7, last Saturday.

Walker, expounding fraternalism between himself and the "Lip," when he returned from a fishing trip, told the United Press that he "was positive Leo didn't mean me." Dixie was referring to Durocher's statement that he couldn't get along with one of his players.

The fiery manager of the Dodgers said Monday, shortly after President Branch Rickey had announced that he would be retained as manager of the team during 1944, that he liked all of his players but one.
