

ENROLLMENT FOR JUNIOR RED CROSS GIVEN EARLY PUSH

Juniors in Jackson county schools are already enrolling for Red Cross service even before the drive to enlist sixteen million future American citizens officially gets under way November 1. Twenty-four schools are enrolled 100%, which means that 2569 youngsters of the elementary, junior and senior high schools are leading the way toward a 100% county enrollment.

Production for the armed forces and for war relief began some months ago and throughout the summer the Junior Red Cross workshops turned out many needed articles. Since school opened many more have been made.

This past week five large boxes of articles for patients in hospitals were packed and shipped from Medford. There were 103 jigsaw puzzles, 53 lap boards and 60-odd comfort articles all made by juniors.

In each school boxes are filled with Christmas articles for refugee children. Three huge boxes containing in all 100 smaller boxes were shipped as well as four boxes of Christmas tree decorations for overseas.

Juniors in Jackson county are asked to produce a large quota; but their enthusiasm is great, and there is every reason to know that the program planned for them by Miss Vera Humphrey, chairman, and their teachers will be carried out successfully.

Women's Missionary Societies Plan Joint Armistice Day Meet

The United Council of Church Women of the United States is asking all churches of all Christian denominations in the United States to observe World Community Day on Armistice Day, Thursday, Nov. 11. Women's missionary societies of all the Christian churches of Medford, Jacksonville and Phoenix will have a day of prayer in Medford.

There will be a pot-luck dinner at the First Christian church at 12 o'clock, followed by a service of prayer and praise with special music and speakers from the various churches. An intermission at 1:30 p. m. will be given so that anyone wishing to leave before close of the meeting may do so. A very large attendance is expected.

The World Community Day is described by the sponsors as "one of the greatest adventures in Christian unity attempted by church women. One of the most important features is that it establishes the council as a way that the denominations can work together on a state and national level, and a way to enduring peace."

The council expects about ten million will participate in the nation-wide prayer service.

WAC CARAVAN TO SHOW HERE NEXT FRIDAY, SATURDAY

Local Civilian Defense committees, cooperating with the Women's Army Corps "All-States" Casualty Replacement Recruiting campaign, indicated Saturday that they have swung into action in an all-out effort to enroll a woman for each Jackson county soldier reported killed or missing. The goal is fifteen recruits.

Mrs. Herbert Alford, American Legion Auxiliary recruiting chairman, expressed a hope that the goal would be reached by Friday, Nov. 5, when the WAC Carnival Caravan will arrive for a two-day showing here. The unit will be located at the courthouse and will be open to visitors between 10 a. m. and 5 p. m. Free movies concerning life in the WACs will be shown to women between the ages of 20 and 50 who are eligible for enrollment. A special program is being planned for Saturday, Nov. 6, and will be held in the courthouse auditorium at 3 p. m. Lt. Margaret Steelhead and Technical Sergeant Ardele Carter will be on hand at all times to explain the unusual opportunities offered to women during the "All-States" recruiting program. They will be assisted by members of the local Civilian Defense Council.

During the Saturday show winners of the local WAC essay contest will be announced and presented with prizes. Winner of first prize honors will also have her essay entered in the district contest which ends December 7.

TIN CAN SALVAGE TO REOPEN HERE

The salvage of tin cans will be resumed in the Medford district soon after Nov. 1 it was announced yesterday by Henry Zacharisen, salvage chairman for the county. Mr. Zacharisen asked residents to prepare their cans and wait for further announcements.

Collections are to be made by school children as was done last year, and in addition arrangements have been made with the Pinnacle Packing company to have the cans stored at Plant No. 3 on North Fir St. It was stated that anyone wishing to take the salvaged cans directly to the warehouse might do so and that they are to be placed on the north porch.

Mr. Zacharisen reminded people that the cans should be thoroughly washed, the labels and ends removed, the ends placed inside the cans and the can flattened. They should then be put in boxes or sacks for handling.
