Cottage Cheese Cottage cheese is difficult to digest. With a strong digestive system, it is a source of good supply of protein. Protein of excellent quality may be supplied the system by mixing in equal parts milk and navy beans. This combination is said to be equal if not superior in protein to porterhouse steak. It is much richer in vitamins and minerals, and a great deal less expensive. It is not advisable to substitute cottage cheese for milk, as it does not supply calcium in sufficient amount. Cottage cheese supplies only 154 milligrams to the cup. This is less than one-fifth of the recommended daily intake of calcium. A cup of milk supplies nearly twice as much. The food value received from cottage cheese is proportional to the ability of the digestive system to properly digest it. Also its value depends much upon the manner in which it is made.

GORDON MARX, 12 GETS MULE TAIL

Twelve-year-old Gordon Marx, son of Mr. and Mrs. Homer A. Marx of Kings highway, has a wonderful experience to tell his school mates this week. For Gordon, deer hunting in Lake county the past four days with his father and Dr. Stanley E. Phillips and Dick Payne, bagged a 150-pound mule tail doe with what Dr. Phillips described as the "best shot of the trip, right through the neck." It was the first he ever killed.

All four got deer, Dr. Phillips a buck and Marx and Payne does. They returned to Medford Sunday. Another successful hunting party, which returned today after six days in Klamath county, was composed of Oliver Tice and Jim Murray of Medford and Emmett Gillings, Rex Hyatt and Rex, Jr., of Klamath Falls. They got five mule tail bucks, averaging about 150 pounds.

Salem, Ore., Nov. 1.—(U.P.)—Three Oregon state prison convicts who broke from their cell block yesterday and subdued a prison power house guard in an attempted blackout escape were back in confinement today.

The three—Gaylord Sorahan, 30; George P. Bernese, 34, and Silas Griffin, 28—were serving long term sentences for assault and robbery. They occupied adjoining cells. The convicts, believed to have been planning their escape for weeks drilled rivets out of their cell doors and refilled the holes with putty before repainting sections of their cell bars to prevent the notice of prison guards.

After they had pried their way out of their cells and opened the door of the prison auditorium with a "home made" key, they subdued the guard of the prison power house and attempted to smash the prison master light switches.

Army officers reported the men of the Blue and Red forces were fighting over the battles of various maneuver phases and recalling the tests made on themselves and their combat equipment.

Early problems of the maneuvers were fought high in the desert east of Bend and final problems in the timberland along the Deschutes river near the city of Sisters.

Coming Speaker Is Authority on Russian History George J. Rony, who speaks at the high school auditorium in Medford Thursday night, lived through the Russian revolution, has written 14 books, acquired the world's largest film library, many of the films of a historical nature and experienced a hair-raising escape from Hitler following his production of the French propaganda picture, "The Greatest Gangster." Rony is 35 and is a graduate of the University of Leningrad. The Russian engaged in motion picture production even before his graduation and for many years produced films of a historical and propaganda nature in all parts of Europe. Coming to this country after the fall of France, Mr. Rony has since lectured before many groups in all parts of the country and is now considered one of this country's outstanding authorities on Russian and the European situation.
