

156 HEREFORDS SOLD IN ANNUAL SHOW, AUCTION

The annual California-Oregon Hereford Breeders Association show and auction at Klamath Falls October 31 and November 1, considered the most successful in history, saw 156 head of registered cattle sold at an average of \$447.50 each, with the top 10 bringing an average of \$1,800, according to John Day, owner of the Blue Moon ranch and a member of the sales committee.

The average sale price of 132 bulls was \$460, and for 24 females was \$383.75, Day said. The grand champion bull, Arthur Domino 5th, bred by Herb Chandler of Baker, was sold to W. A. Serruys of Klamath Falls for \$4,100. The reserve champion bull, S. and M. Defender 3rd, bred by Smith and Freeman of Washington, was sold to Maxine Liskey of Klamath Falls for \$4,000.

The top female of the show, Lady Mark 6th, consigned by Chandler, was sold for \$2,000 to Cecil B. Haley of Bonanza. Another high price was brought by Royal Lad 13th, which was sold by Smith and Freeman to Leonard Meschke of Tule Lake, Calif., for \$2,025.

The top pen of five bulls, consigned by the Horton Hereford ranch, Klamath Falls, went to Con Lynch of Lakeview at an average of \$455 each.

Day reported there was much enthusiasm at the show and auction and that a great many cattle ranchers were able to acquire fine herd bulls at the sale.

BIOFF THREATENED MAYER IS TESTIMONY

New York, Nov. 3.—(U.P.)—Testimony that William Bioff, convicted extortioner, had threatened Motion Picture Producer Louis B. Mayer was brought out today at the trial of eight Chicago gangsters and a Newark labor leader charged with complicity to extort \$1,000,000 from the movie industry.

Nicholas M. Schenck, president of Loew's, Inc., said the threat was made at a meeting in his Beverly Hills, Calif., home in 1937.

"There is no room for both of us in this world and I'll be here," Schenck quoted Bioff as telling Mayer.

INSURANCE CONCERNS RAKED BY MISSOURIAN

Washington, Nov. 3.—(U.P.)—Attorney General Roy McKittick of Missouri charged today that stock fire insurance companies were seeking an exemption from the antitrust laws to obtain "power to exact as much profit as the owners of the companies deem they want."

He appeared before the senate judiciary committee to oppose the Bailey bill which would, in title, "affirm the intent of the congress that the regulation of the business of insurance remain within the control of the several states."

LAGGING WAR PLANT IS CLOSED BY NAVY

Chicago, Nov. 3.—(U.P.)—More than 400 employees of the Ajax Engineering Co. sought new jobs today after the navy department closed the plant for failure to meet delivery schedules.

Navy-owned machinery and materials were moved out. The firm, incorporated a year ago as a wartime business, manufactured navigation instruments, binoculars, and sextants. Company officials declined comment.
