

PROGRESS NOTED TOWARD REVENGE OF PEARL HARBOR

2nd Anniversary of Sneak
Attack Finds U. S. Well
on Way to Punish Japs.

Pearl Harbor, Dec. 7.—(U.P.)—Pacific fleet task forces putting to sea from Pearl Harbor steam past the torpedo-blasted hulk of the U. S. S. Oklahoma—and there are ships among them which the Japanese sank two years ago today and which we have raised and refitted for battle.

They sail for revenge. When the carrier-borne Jap bombers drew away from Pearl Harbor Dec. 7, 1941, the American problem was one of repair and replacement of torpedoed and bombed warships, of rebuilding installations, of getting new fighting planes to take the place of Hickam's charred fuselages.

Fleet Has Grown
A new problem arose late this summer. Taxed to capacity by new warships, Pearl Harbor just wasn't big enough to hold carriers, cruisers, destroyers, submarines and auxiliaries coming from the mainland.

On the second anniversary of the attack—a "military success" under a diplomatic umbrella—the United States has laid its stepping stones to Tokyo and already has commenced setting its feet down upon them. Naval authorities make no secret of the fact that Tarawa and Makin are the forerunners of more important battles.

Veteran Pacific correspondents like Frank Tremaine and William Tyree, who covered the Pearl Harbor disaster and now are out with the troops and the fleet believe that two-fifths of the war against Japan has been fought—that Dec. 7, 1946, will find American troops in the Japanese capital.

No Celebration
Naval officers don't want any "Pearl Harbor Day" celebrations. They will remember it as long as they live, but without fanfare. One officer suggested that when the war is over congress set aside Dec. 7 annually to "examine the state of the nation's defense, interrogate our naval and military leaders and study our relations with other nations."

On this anniversary, no investigations are needed. Rabaul sits precariously at the dagger tip of offensives pointing from Finschhafen, New Guinea, and Bougainville. A wedge has been driven into the central Pacific and Admiral Chester W. Nimitz is looking to extend his holdings farther north into the Marshalls and Carolines.

Nimitz has instructed his officers that if they encounter the Jap fleet or any part of it, they are to drop pre-arranged tasks and destroy every enemy vessel possible.

China Key To Victory
A Pacific victory, officers say cannot be envisioned without occupation or domination by air and sea of the Marshalls, Carolines, Truk and the Philippines but many lesser islands will be by-passed and they are expected

to fall as Kiska fell when Attu was occupied.
Nimitz has said that the war will be won from China, where land-based aircraft can swarm out to pulverize the enemy's homeland. Now he is doing his part in laying open a path to China.

Officers say that the war was nearly lost at Pearl Harbor and it is being won there now.
